### Thought for the Week

Happy New Year!

What is amazing about the Catholic Church is our new year doesn't begin with January 1. The Church's new year begins with the First Sunday of Advent. I can't say it begins November 27 or December 1 because the First Sunday of Advent falls on a different day each year. Just do a comparison between 2016 and 2017.

The First Sunday of Advent in 2016 was November 27th. This year the First Sunday of Advent is December 3rd, 2017. Yet, whatever day it falls upon the theme is constant – "Advent". It is about preparing and waiting.

The Church on January 1 celebrates the new calendar year with the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. As we begin our new year, we invoke the intercession of Mary. We pray for peace, a new hope, and maybe even a new lease on life. So many resolutions are promised with a new year; however, we must never forget our faith. How can we challenge ourselves to grow in faith? What tools could we use to increase our faith?

### Family History

**Cookie Saturday/Donut Sunday,** next weekend, See the sign up sheets on the display in the Gathering space to volunteer.

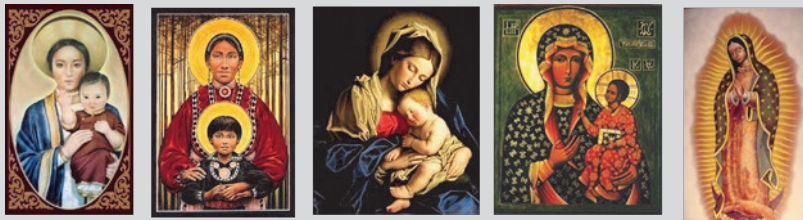

# Liturgy Notes from Joann

## Mary, Mother of Us All



Today, on this first day of the New Year, we gather to celebrate the **Solemnity of Mary the Mother of God**. On the *Liturgical Calendar*, every day since Christmas Eve has been a celebration of the Nativity of the Lord. Today is the eighth day of the celebrations and so today is also called the *Octave of the Nativity of the Lord*.

Since Christmas was on a Sunday this year, the octave of Christmas (today) also falls on a Sunday. When Christmas falls on a week day (Monday – Saturday) there is always a Sunday between Christmas and today's Solemnity – the Sunday when we usually celebrate the *Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph*. This year, the feast of the Holy Family was transferred to December 30. Even though you may not have attended Mass on this day, today's Solemnity honors the Holy Family in that Mary is the Mother of this Family.

Mary is the Mother of God. Mary is the Mother of the Church. Mary is the Mother of each of us. Her motherhood is not limited to the Holy Family, but extends to all who need her guidance and care, her courage and strength, her wisdom and intercession.

The entry for today in the *Little Blue Book*, which we have been using through the Advent/Christmas season, talks about the "Black Madonna" which refers to images of the Blessed Mother in which her skin is dark. There are various reasons for her to be represented in this way, *authenticity* is one. Some say that the Crusaders, in their travels, saw images of Mary as a darker-skinned Mid-Eastern woman, and introduced the Black Madonna upon their return to Europe. Another reason is *Symbolic* - anything placed close to the sun turns dark. Christ is the Light of the World, so Mary, because of her closeness to him, has dark skin. The last reason, the one that speaks to us today, is that *Mary is Mother to all*. "Black Madonna" often refers to dark-skinned art works depicted by African or African-American artists. This is done for the same reason that people in the Far East depict her with their features or, for that matter, why this Jewish woman is depicted with European or American features. She is Mother to all.

Just as Mary pondered in her heart the mysteries that were unfolding before her, so we too must ponder these mysteries. Like Mary, we must be open to all of God's overtures to us. We must take each event – no matter how difficult or how delightful – as revealing God's plan for us. Mary is our Mother and model. She shows us how to open ourselves to God's Presence, power and possibility – all of us!

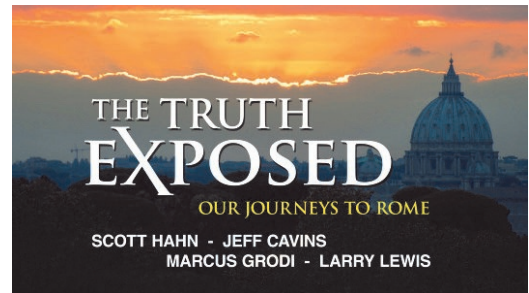
