A Thought to Consider

Two weeks ago, I began asking you to think about the uniqueness of a church. We all agree that there are articles found in a church you would not find in a doctor's office, classroom, etc.

Too, churches are different from other churches. What do we find in a Catholic Church that makes it unique form other Christian Churches (i.e., Lutheran, Presbyterian)? Here is my list (not meant to be exhaustive).

- 1. Kneelers
- 2. Stations of the Cross
- 3. Tabernacle
- 4. Sanctuary Lamp/Candle (Lit next to the Tabernacle)
- 5. Reconciliation Room
- 6. Votive Candle Stand
- 7. Holy Water Fonts
- 8. Ambry (An article which contains the Holy Oils)
- 9. Crucifix (as compared to a cross)
- 10. Stain-Glass Windows depicting various stories of Jesus.

The stain-glass windows at Resurrection portray the four seasons (spring, summer, winter, and fall). Can you think of more?

Question for Father

I am asked by people from time to time the following questions:

- Did you have counselling courses in the seminary?

Understandably, people may be shocked at this fact; however, it does show how important our theological studies are over the graduate years.

My favorite hobbies are hunting and fishing. Because of this, whenever I see a fish, I take notice. Do you know why people place the symbol of a fish on their car (i.e., the rear bumper)? Here is the story.

During the persecution by the Roman empire of the first few centuries after Christ, the early Christians used the fish symbol to mark meeting places and tombs or to distinguish friends from foes. When a Christian met a stranger on the road, the Christian sometimes drew one arc of the fish outline in the dirt. If the stranger drew the other arc, both knew they were in good company. Too, because fishing was a common form of commerce in those days, they could use the symbol of a fish without much suspicion.

So when you see the symbol of a fish on the rear bumper of a vehicle it is safe to assume you are in good company.

And that leads to my question to ponder for the week. Sometimes within the symbol of a fish we note the letters – IXOVS. What do they mean?

Liturgy Notes from Joann

Ordinary Time

Today, we return to Ordinary Time in our liturgical calendar. Ordinary Time isn't a

season like Advent, Christmas, Lent, the Paschal Triduum and Eastertime, but a way to describe the weeks between these liturgical seasons. While the word "ordinary" can be defined as "regular, commonplace, average and familiar", it also means "counted". *Ordinary Time is "counted time"*.

So what are we counting? We count every week. The first week in Ordinary Time begins right after the *Baptism of the Lord*. We also count Sundays. The Sunday after the Baptism of the Lord is the 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time because we are beginning the 2nd week in Ordinary Time. We do all this counting so that we can know which scripture to read when we assemble for liturgy.

At every Sunday Mass during Ordinary Time we read bit-bybit through one of the synoptic gospels. This year, we read Matthew's Gospel, next year Mark's Gospel is read and the year after that we read from Luke - returning to Matthew in the following year. The biggest feast that occurs during these winter weeks of Ordinary Time is the Presentation of the Lord on February 2. This Feast is a turning point in the liturgical calendar as we look back to Christmas and look forward to Lent and Easter.

We do not *endure* Ordinary Time, waiting for the next important season or feast. We dedicate every Sunday of the year as a day to enter into Paschal Mystery of Christ. Before there was any sense of a liturgical year, before there were any seasons or feasts, before there was even a Christmas or an Easter, there was simply SUNDAY. It is the original feast day for Christians: the Lord's Day, the Day of Days, the Eighth Day, the Day of New Creation that has begun the new era of Christ. This weekly remembrance and celebration of Sunday predates any annual celebration that ultimately found its way into our calendars. It is the basic foundation from which flows every other solemnity, feast, memorial or season. Sunday is the primary focus of Ordinary Time and so we count these days – designating them as the Lord's Day.

All of time is special. All of time has been marked by the life, Death and Resurrection of Christ. All of time is *changed* because Christ's coming redeemed us and made all things sacred. With each Eucharist, we give thanks for the enduring victory of light over darkness - that began with the Incarnation that we celebrated at Christmas.

Psalm Refrain for January 22 – 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time (Psalm 27:1)
