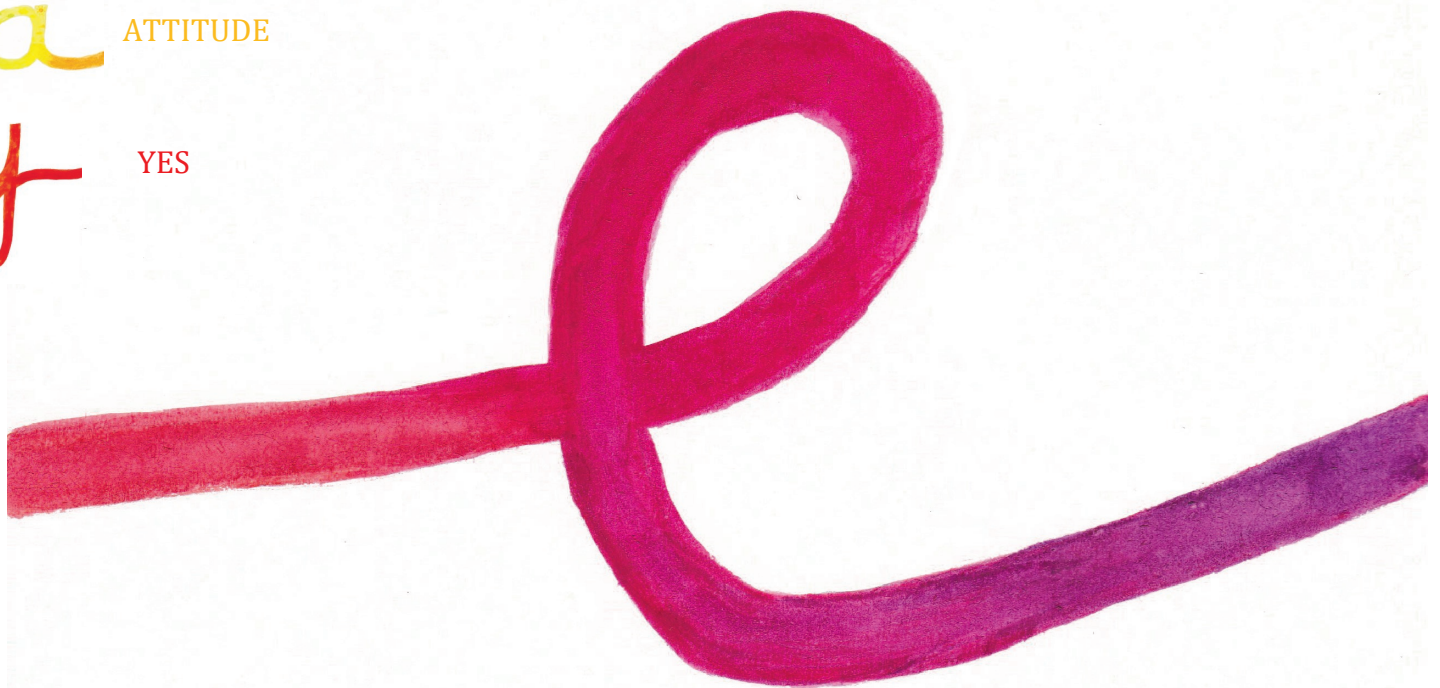

Weekly Words from The Rock

I have been asked to teach a lesson on the Lord's Prayer in the days ahead. Let me provide the thoughts that I will share on the prayer that Jesus taught us to pray.

Our Father – Use of the word “our” instead of “my” shows us that prayer should not be selfish. It also reminds us that we are part of God’s family – others are our brothers and sisters because God is their Father too. We should treat all others like family members. The word “Father” teaches us that we should pray to God (the Father). Like a caring Father, God listens to our prayers and always gives His best. Sometimes, this may not always be exactly what we want – sometimes a loving parent even has to use the word no!

Who art in Heaven – We should not think of God being in a far away place because God is everywhere. This line of the prayer reminds us to acknowledge God’s sovereignty over the universe. Also, the Father is in heaven, the place of life, joy, and peace (there is no evil, no sin in heaven).

Hallowed be thy Name – “Hallowed” means “holy.” Keeping God’s name holy means that He should be honored and respected and admired for who He is and what He has done. There is a commandment that speaks to this. The second commandment reads, “Thou shall not take the name of the Lord, thy God in vain.”

Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven – God is King so he has a kingdom. By saying “thy kingdom come” we are praying for the advancement of God’s kingdom and remembering the part we have to play in that. Asking for God’s kingdom and for God’s will to be done is really surrendering to God, because His rule and His plans are the best things for our lives. It is a reminder to us that we are to pray for God’s plan in our lives and the world, not our own plan. We are to pray

for God’s will to be done, not for our own. In heaven everyone submits to God – that is the way it is in heaven – there is no selfishness, no cruelty, no lies but plenty of love, peace and happiness. This is the life we are called to live “on earth”.

Give us this day our daily bread – “Daily bread” symbolizes everything we need for our life, for that day. It is agreeing that God is the one who gives us life and sustains us each day – we depend on God for daily physical and spiritual food.

Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us – We need to ask God to forgive us our sins – that is all the wrong things we have done – this includes our actions, our thoughts and what we have said. We have to be sincere in saying sorry to God but we must forgive others too. Jesus teaches that if we don’t forgive others then God will not forgive us.

And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil – This part of the prayer is asking God for protection so that we will be able to stand against all the bad influences in the world, we will be able to achieve victory over sin. Will we be tempted? Yes, but with God’s grace we can overcome. When we are in a bad situation/evil (i.e., gossip at work), we ask God to deliver us/get us out of the “evil” in which we find ourselves.

Amen – It means “so be it” or “it is so.”

Answer for the Week

Question: Can Father Schuster serve in a diocese other than the Diocese of Winona?

Answer: It depends. When I was ordained to the priesthood, I promised that I would serve in the Diocese of Winona. That means I could be assigned to serve anywhere within the boundaries of the Diocese of Winona. However, at the discretion of the diocesan bishop, it is possible that I could be assigned to serve elsewhere. I recall Msgr. David Kunz, a priest for the Diocese of La Crosse, Wisconsin was asked to serve as the rector of Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary in Winona. His bishop approved the request and Msgr. Kunz served within the Diocese of Winona (outside of his home diocese) for a period of years. Today, he once again is serving within his home diocese.

And that is what I mean when I say it depends. We are ordained to serve for a diocese but the bishop of each diocese has the discretion of where to assign his priests.

I’ll provide the answer next week.

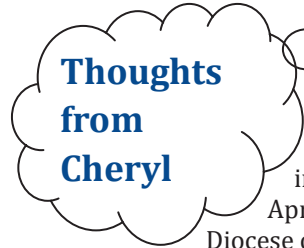

Liturgy Notes from Joann

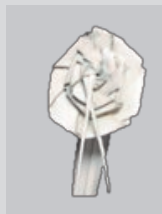
What to do with NEW palms!

On **Palm Sunday** (April 9 this year) the liturgy begins in the gathering space. We hold palm branches and are joined by the priest and servers for the Collect prayer, the blessing of the palms and the reading of the Gospel account of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. Then the joyful procession begins, as we follow the cross and recall how the people of Jerusalem welcomed Jesus into the city.

So what do we do with those blessed palms after Palm Sunday? The simplest and easiest thing to do is to take the palm and place it behind a crucifix, icon or religious picture in your home. By displaying the palm branch in this way, we are reminded of Palm Sunday, the passion of Christ and the great love story of GOD.

Some people take the fresh blessed palms and braid/weave them into religious symbols of our faith. These braided/woven palms are then displayed on the crucifix, icon or religious picture. When I was preparing to burn the palms from a previous year's Palm Sunday – I found these wonderful braided/woven palms:

Thoughts for Lent: *Empathy* can help us be more patient and tolerant of others and love our neighbor as Jesus taught. It doesn't always come naturally so it's good to take some time during Lent to practice being more understanding and share the feelings of those around us. Use these quick steps: **1. Watch and listen** look at their body language and pay attention to what they're saying. **2. Remember** a time when you felt the same. **3. Imagine** how you would feel in the same situation. **4. Ask** what the person is feeling. **5. Show you care** through your words and actions.
