## Weekly Words from The Rock

Last week we celebrated the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Looking at questions pertaining to the Mass, I would next like to look at the effects of the Eucharist. Why is it important? What does it provide?

**A private audience.** It is almost impossible to gain access to very important people for a personal encounter. It would be extraordinary and rare to have a private audience with the pope, a personal meeting with the president or a backstage pass to visit a famous reporter. But in the Eucharist, Jesus is neither remote nor protected behind layers of security. The Eucharist gives the recipient unhindered access, not to a famous person, but to the Son of God, and not just a handshake or a few pleasantries, but for extended quality time with the Lord.

**An intimate conversation.** While it is possible to speak with Jesus in prayer anytime, anywhere, the Eucharist provides a privileged and heightened opportunity to converse with him. The Eucharist is the real presence of Jesus; it is an intensified and heightened presence. It is an invitation for the communicant to have a close and intimate conversation with Jesus, who is totally available for a warm and personal exchange.

**Companionship.** Through the Eucharist, Jesus is faithful to his promises, "I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20) and "I will not leave you orphans" (John 14:18). Life is a journey, and along the road are many twists and turns, ups and downs. It is foolish to travel alone. The Eucharist is bread for the journey, and when Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist, he remains with us and walks with us as a faithful companion, not only when the road is smooth, but also, and particularly if, we pass through a dark valley. In the worst of times when it seems that one more step is beyond what we can do, Jesus sets us on his shoulders and carries us.

**Transformation.** When we receive Jesus in the Eucharist and he takes up residence within us, it enables us to become more like him. St. Paul aptly wrote, "I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Galatians 2:20). We are to become who we receive. If Jesus is loving, truthful, generous, merciful, self-sacrificing and obedient to his father, the recipient is supposed to be more loving, truthful, merciful, self-sacrificing and obedient to God, and the Eucharist provides the grace that facilitates this spiritual transformation.

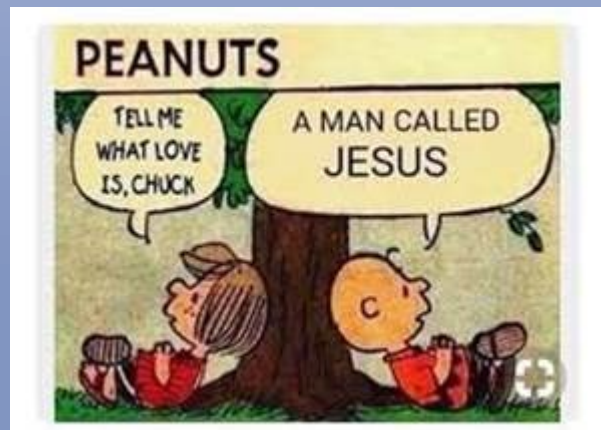
**Communion with the community.** The reception of the Eucharist unites the communicant with everyone else who receives Holy Communion. It places a person in fellowship with other believers, those attending that Mass, the other members of the parish and Catholics throughout the diocese and the world. It keeps a person linked to an immense spiritual family, the body of Christ – the Church – and establishes and strengthens a spiritual bond that is shared with brothers and sisters in faith everywhere.

**Spiritual power, strength and endurance.** Physical food is necessary for healthy muscles that have strength to do work over a long time. The Eucharist is spiritual food that gives strength and power to do mighty deeds: to study and master difficult subjects; to speak and uphold the truth, even in the face of fierce opposition; to perform endless household chores cheerfully; and the capacity to take on a major task or carry a heavy load for the long haul.

**A spiritual defense mechanism.** Physical food strengthens the immune system, so antibodies can fight off germs that can harm or kill the body, and the Eucharist is spiritual food that equips a person to fend off temptations that can harm or kill the soul. The Eucharist fortifies a person's internal defense mechanisms, equipping the person with potent spiritual weapons that repel or neutralize the injurious and lethal attacks of the devil, and to preserve a sterile environment, a soul that is clean and pure.

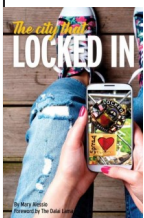
### Medical Professionals Needed for Catholic Medical Association.

## Reflections from A “Middle of the Night Adorer”

I look back with awe at the gentle ways God has nudged me to come to Him. I am someone who chooses to get up in the middle of the night to drive to the church to pray at 3:00am. And I look forward to it, God is amazing!

I did not always look forward to going to church. In fact, I spent most of my 20's trying to run away from it. I was living in Los Angeles California when I turned 30. I distinctly remember the day I was roller blading along the beach. The wind was blowing in my face and I felt free. Free from the Catholic Church, free of her rules, free to rid myself of the bondages the church had imposed on me.

Free? Quickly I realized I was spiraling out of control and within 2 years I was battling depression. There is no freedom in being the victim of your own pride and selfish ways. I had to learn this the hard way.

It was the Eucharist that nurtured me and began to give me life again. I realized that I was missing something that no trained counselor could give to me and I started going to Mass again. That was the start of my slow and steady conversion.

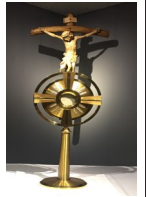
Eventually I came back to the Catholic Church, praise Jesus (and thanks to my Mother for praying for me!), and joined Resurrection. I was fascinated that there were enough devoted parishioners to be present in a chapel 24 hours a day. Wow! That is a lot of prayers! I was starting to recognize the impact of the Eucharist in my own life.

I heard stories of how Adoration changed the lives of other people. But I hadn't taken the time to experience it for myself.

But there is something to be said about the total silence being alone with Jesus that begins as a whisper and calls you back to His love again. I began to experience a peacefulness that I could take into a chaotic world.

And so now here I am a regular adorer at 3:00am, however, this time I am running to the Eucharist instead of running away from Him. It is quiet, it is peaceful and it is where I can open my heart to the whisper of Our Lord. I am home. I am at peace. I am a "Middle of the Night Adorer".

### What ages can be involved?

Anyone in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and up may join this group. Ideally, if a child below 8<sup>th</sup> grade wants to take part, I encourage them to do so with their family, or else consider joining the **Children’s Choir**. I will certainly take everyone on a case-by-case basis, though!

### What instruments are allowed?

If singing isn’t for you, but you play an instrument, (piano, guitar, violin, flute, trumpet, etc.,) you are more than welcome to join this group!

### What if I already Lector/Eucharistic Minister/etc.?

For those involved in other liturgical ministries, it is advisable not to “double dip” in a weekend, if at all possible. *Our policy here at Resurrection is that one may participate in two ministries during a single mass **once per month**.* This is not to be the “norm” by any means. Since this group will only be singing twice per month, on average, my hope is that any other ministries you’re involved with can still be a regular part of your Mass experience.
