Random Thoughts from Fr. Schuster

What I want to do in this column is to offer some random thoughts There is no ebb and flow; the key word is random.

This coming Monday is the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral in Winona. It was one year ago that we hosted the Chrism Mass at Resurrection. It was a moment I will never forget. To see so many people come together to host the event is heartwarming. Every priest who hosts the event wonders, "How many people will come?" Last year the church was full with overflow into the Gathering Space. To all who helped, thanks for the wonderful memories. If you have the opportunity to attend this year, it is on Monday, March 26 at 7:00 pm.

At our February staff meeting, the topic of preaching came up. What is it like to preach? First, it is a tremendous responsibility. Having people look you square in the eye and expecting something from you.

Second, even preachers look back and say about a homily, "I wish it would have been better. I owe the people something more." Yet, it is to such homilies that people say, "Thanks Father, I needed to hear that." Go figure.

And third, I don't expect people to remember every word I say. I don't expect people to be engaged in every word I say. My hope is that I can leave you with one word or thought.

If I were to sit down with a group of youth, the questions I would like to ask are, what does the future look like to you? What are we doing to help you on your journey through life? What are we not doing to help you on your journey through life? What can you bring that I cannot bring? What would your generation like to teach us?

I am forty nine years old. What does that mean? It depends upon how you look at life. The glass is either half full or half empty. You can either say, "Half of my life is already over," or, "I still have half of my life to live."

God has a way of humbling you. When I was a teenager, I refused to get out of the pew with my family to have my feet washed. Now, I am washing the feet of others.

Faith is a lot like life. It has its ups and downs but in the end it is really about the spin you put on it.

To some, I am young. To others, I am old.

It is getting to that time of Lent where things are getting a bit more trying.

The enthusiasm at the beginning is being tested.

Always remember. Actions first, words second.

Is it normal that when you wake up in the morning the first thing you ask is, "what day is it?" Follow that by the second question, "what do I have to do today?"

Many elderly find themselves questioning their value and worth. I tell them there is one thing you have, the time to do that many do not. You have time to pray.

If you could read your life story before it ever began, would you?

To lose once in a while is good for the soul. After all, what is life if we always win?

Why do we remember so many Christmas songs yet would struggle to sing five Easter songs? Perhaps the answer is, because we understand birth. We all have been born. But resurrection? That is a mystery.

Growing up on a farm, what is the difference between living in a city versus living in the country?

Answer: In the country, at night, when all is still, I am amazed at how far sound travels. It is nothing to hear a car two miles away.

Growing up on a farm, what is the difference between city folk and country folk? Nothing really. People are people. All are trying to put a roof

over their head, food on the table, and clothes on their backs. Mix them together in the same church and you soon realize that country folk and city folk are after the same thing – the hope of heaven.

A priest's closet is pretty simple – black shirts, black slacks, black socks and black shoes. How can you mess that up? Actually, there is one way. Forget your white roman collar.

Everyone says that time goes fast and for the most part it does. There is one exception, eternity. Time is irrelevant because nothing is finite. Imagine a life where watches and smartphones are unnecessary. That gives you a view of heaven.

Someone once described heaven as follows: I can walk along with one person only to come across another person. When I leave the first to walk with the second, there is no sense of loss or remorse. All we experience is goodness and love.

<u>Fasting and Abstaining Procedures</u> <u>for Lent</u>

The norms regarding fasting and abstaining are as follows;

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

What to do with NEW palms!

On *Palm Sunday* - March 25 this year - the liturgy begins in the gathering space. We raise our voices and sing HOSANNAH as we gather around the baptismal font, holding our palm branches. We are joined there by the priest and servers who greet us and we begin the Mass with the Collect prayer, the blessing of the palms and the reading of the Gospel account of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. Then the joyful procession begins. We follow the cross and recall how the people of Jerusalem joyfully welcomed Jesus into the city.

So what do we do with those blessed palms after Palm Sunday? The simplest and easiest thing to do is to take the palm and place it behind a crucifix, icon or religious picture in your home. By displaying the palm branch in this way, we are reminded of Palm Sunday, the passion of Christ and the great love story of GOD.

Some people take the fresh blessed palms and braid/weave them into religious symbols of our faith. These braided/woven palms are then displayed on the crucifix, icon or religious picture. When I was preparing to burn the palms from a previous year's Palm Sunday – I found these wonderful braided/woven palms:

Musical Musings from Joy

Last week, we began our discussion of the music of the Liturgy of the Eucharist by

discussing the **Preparation of the Gifts**. This week, we will begin looking at the music of the **Eucharistic Prayer** by looking at some of what is called the **Ordinary** of the Mass.

The **Ordinary** of the Roman Mass is comprised of those parts which <u>do not</u> change from Sunday-to-Sunday. (The opposite being the **Proper** of the Mass, which are the parts that do change.) In the Eucharistic prayer, the musical parts of the Ordinary include the *Sanctus*, **Memorial Acclamation**, and the **Great Amen**.

The *Sanctus*, better known in English as the *Holy, Holy, Holy*, is a "great cosmic acclamation of praise." 1 Of every possible sung part in the Mass, the *Sanctus* is what first and foremost belongs to the people. <u>Everyone</u> is called to sing this acclamation altogether.

The **Memorial Acclamation** takes on three different forms: "We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again"; "When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your death, O Lord, until you come again;" and "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection, you have set us free." No matter which acclamation is used, the faithful are invited to "participate in keeping the memory of Christ's Paschal Mystery."²

The **Great Amen** is preceded by the presider's Doxology and is meant to "give assent to the entire [Eucharistic] prayer."³ Though we find ourselves saying "Amen" (tr. "so be it") many times during the Mass, the *Great* Amen should be just that – greater than all of the others, as we are affirming this truth.

The GIRM encourages all of these acclamations, particularly on Sundays and solemnities, to be sung. Therefore, here at Resurrection, these parts are not typically sung for a Daily Mass unless it happens to be a feast or solemnity. However, on Sundays, one will always here these parts being sung.

Currently, we are singing these parts from the *Mass of Charity* and *Love* by Steven C. Warner. At Easter, we will change to the *Mass of Renewal* by Curtis Stephan.

Next week, we will take a look at the music of the Communion Rite.
