Answer for the Week Question:

Father, this weekend we celebrate First Holy Communion. What do you remember about your First Holy Communion?

Answer: When I was a child, I was prone to earaches. The night before my First Holy Communion I came down with an earache. I remember going to my parents room and they had me sleep on a heating pad. In the morning, with the pain still present my mother called our family physician Dr. Mark Virning. Dr. Virning told my mother to meet him in Wells so mom loaded me up and off to Wells we went. When I arrived, Dr. Virning did a battery of tests and told me I had the symptoms of an earache. Without studying medicine, I almost told him that I could have diagnosed that. He told me that I would need a shot so I started rolling up the sleeve of my shirt. He told, "No, I have to give you this shot in another region of your body." To make a long story short, I had to lower my pants and got a shot in the backside of my lower region (that is correct, in my buttocks). I still remember how that hurt.

When it was time to go I had almost made my exit. Dr. Virning stopped me and said, "Peter, I normally don't come to my office on Sunday but when your mother called and told me what had happened I came in to help you. I understand today is your First Holy Communion and I would ask one thing of you. Please say a prayer for me at Mass today. I firmly believe there is no way God would turn down the prayer of someone receiving their First Holy Communion." Coming from a physician, that impressed me.

When the time for Mass had arrived, I noticed Dr. Virning at Mass. He was a very devout and faithful Catholic. Thus, my First Holy Communion encompassed an earache, a shot, a prayer request and receiving the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ for the very first time. Pretty impressive!

We hear proclaimed today the great gospel story of the two disciples walking to Emmaus when Jesus (unrecognized by the disciples) joins them. As the two disciples arrive home and invite Jesus to dine with them, they finally recognize him in the breaking of the bread.

Thoughts from Cheryl

Every year since 1996 the Resurrection Confirmation Candidates have experienced their own unique ‘Walk to Emmaus’ (April 19) prior to receiving the sacrament of Confirmation (Sat. April 29). Each candidate is paired up with another candidate and together they take a journey to Emmaus.

They travel to six different stations where Faith Sharing leaders are positioned to engage them in an important faith question. Each candidate is given an opportunity to explore and discuss this question. The questions simulate the awareness that dawn upon the two disciples in today’s gospel. As each candidate articulates their response, they give witness to what is in their hearts. Whenever we share our faith, we grow in faith. This is the single most significant thing that you can see and feel happening as the night progresses. There is a change in our candidates in direct proportion to their ability to take a risk and share who Jesus is and what he means to them.

Another major aspect of this walk is doing it with another person. *“True friendship is a necessary part of Christian living. Jesus never intended on a person journeying to Him on his or her own. This is why Jesus had a group of twelve—the twelve needed each other for accountability, fellowship, and support. We grow in faith even more when we pray with one another and for one another.”* -YDisciple

Sierra Welch, one of Resurrection’s Youth Care Team members gave an impressive testimony at the beginning of the evening. Sierra also encouraged each candidate to get involved in parish life. She demonstrated both the power of witnessing to faith and the importance of being a part of the parish community.

Among the three other tasks involved in the candidate’s walk is a meeting with one of the Pastoral Council members. As a council member I had the privilege of spending a few minutes with over a dozen individual candidates. Wow, incredible young men and women. Their parents should be very proud of them and in themselves for instilling the importance of faith and an openness to ask the questions that are on their minds, and a willingness to wrestle with the mystery and believe. How incredible would it be if each and every Confirmation candidate became involved in one parish ministry; sharing their gifts with the community as an usher, a lector, a greeter, a Eucharistic minister, a musician, an artist, a social activist, an adorer, etc. This is our hope.

The two other stops during the evening were a visit with Fr. Schuster or Fr. Shawn and checking in with the Director—Rosemary Byrne. A final check to make sure all the requirements are fulfilled and to ready their hearts, minds, and soul to fully enter into the sacrament of Confirmation.

I would like to express my gratitude to Rosemary for her leadership and the quality of instruction that she provides for our youth and Faith Sharing leaders. Together they are making a great team.

Continue to pray for our candidates and may you recognize that you have an important part to play in encouraging our candidates to grow in faith and to acknowledge their gifts that they have been given.

Liturgy Notes from Joann

Christ is risen! Christ is risen, indeed!

Christ is alive!

Last weekend, I attended the Divine Mercy Healing Mission that was hosted here at Resurrection. On the last day of the mission, the prayer of the presiding priest was that one thing that he said would be etched in our hearts. For me, the words that begin this column are what resonate in my heart – Christ is alive! What this means for me is that the Risen Christ is here, walking with me, every moment of every day. With that assurance, I know that whomever I meet, whatever happens in my day, the Risen Christ will be a part of every encounter.

With this perspective, I look back at the journey that I have had with some very special people: Kayeng, Garrett and Steven – who were Baptized, Confirmed and received their first Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil; Melissa and Ranae – who were brought into Full Communion with the Catholic Church on Divine Mercy Sunday; and Elizabeth, Jacqueline and Liz – who were confirmed this weekend by the Bishop. Each of these people came to me at some point and asked a question – what do I have to do? This initial encounter began a journey for each one of them that has changed their lives. If you are an adult who never received the Sacrament of Confirmation, if you were baptized in another faith tradition and want to be in Full Communion with the Catholic Faith or if you have never been baptized and desire to live as a child of GOD – ask the question.

Today, as we rejoice with the young children in our parish who receive Jesus for the first time in Holy Communion, it is good to remember that the Eucharistic food we receive unites us as the body of Christ. The disciples in today's Gospel recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread – and we are called to do the same. At every Mass the priest “breaks the bread”. He takes a very large host – a host that is the Body of Christ – and breaks it as we sing the Lamb of GOD. What a powerful moment in the Mass. The Body of Christ is being broken so that we can see and remember that we are called to do the same – to surrender our own bodies so that others can be fed. What does this mean? It means trusting that the Risen Christ is with you. What you receive is what you become – the body of Christ. United in faith, united in love, the Risen Christ walks with us and calls us forth to share the gifts that we have been given. Yes – Christ is alive!

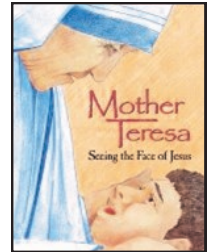
