




Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and they asked Peter and the other apostles, "What are we to do, my brothers?" (*First Scripture Reading today, Acts 2:36-37*),

As I was listening Sunday to Kelly Turner, Ph.D. talking about people who have experienced radical remissions

from cancer on the FoodRevolutionSummit.org, I was struck by one comment she made in particular. Kelly, who has counseled thousands of patients diagnosed with cancer, mentioned how the medical community uses the term "spontaneous remission" for a patient who goes into remission or becomes cancer free without the use of drugs. She prefers to use the term radical remission, because what these people all have in common is that they have worked really hard to make positive lifestyle changes that have impacted their health: increasing green vegetables

Thoughts from Cheryl consumption, including exercise as part of their daily routine, addressing their anger issues, participating in a cancer support community, etc.

This is true in choosing to live as a disciple for Christ. "What are we to do?" Do we allow him to be the Lord of our life? Jesus asks us to make radical life-giving choices. To think of others in front of

our own needs: Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, house the homeless, visit the imprisoned and sick, bury the dead, counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, comfort the afflicted, bear wrongs patiently, pray for the living and the dead; to make Sunday a priority in our lives; to forgive and ask forgiveness; and to share our gifts and talents within the parish community in building up the Body of Christ. How are we doing with our spiritual health? What changes are necessary in your life? It will require determination and firmness in faith, but well worth the effort. Today let us begin.

Watching the First Communicants receive Jesus' body and blood for their first time last weekend was a powerful reminder of the precious gift that is offered at each and every Mass. Let us pray for our first communicants and their families that they continue to grow in faith, hope and love. May we desire to receive Jesus with new hearts and see him with fresh eyes.

The Basilica of the National Shrine of the **Immaculate Conception** in Washington, D.C. has taken on a prominent place in the life of American Catholics. Liturgy Notes from Joann

May, the Month of Mary

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

We are still in the Easter season and the flowers, the sprinkling rite and the songs we sing at Mass remind us that there is life after death. Christ rose from the dead and "with Jesus, who leads us, by grace we will rise up with him". As we feel the water touch our skin during Mass and we make the sign of the cross, we remember that we are "Born from the darkness and clothed in the light! We are bathed in the glory of GOD". As we move from April to May in this Easter season, it is important to remember that while May is associated with Mary, the celebration of Easter continues.

The association of the word "May" and "Mary" is a natural one, though the two names were not originally related. The *Romans* named the month of May after the goddess Maia, the daughter of Atlas and the wife of Jupiter. The *pre-Christian European* people celebrated the coming of spring with rituals such as the Maypole and the May Queen. These rituals celebrated the cycle of the seasons and the return of life in the spring.

Christians replaced these celebrations by making May a month of devotion to the Blessed Mother. Catholic tradition associates her with the new life of spring because she is the "New Eve", the Mother of Jesus, the life-giving Savior and of the world. Mary is the Virgin Mother of GOD whose "yes" allowed Our Lord to take human form. She had complete trust in GOD, and after her life, she was assumed into Heaven by the power of GOD and crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth. We honor Mary as a saint. We honor GOD by remembering the role of Mary in the beginning of our salvation. Devotion to Mary always leads us to Jesus Christ!

The statue of Mary that was in the Gathering Space has been moved to the sanctuary - amidst the orange, yellow and pink kalanchoes - near the cross. The statue of Mary will remain there throughout the month of May as we continue to celebrate the Easter season and remember the Anniversary of Fatima (May 13) and the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (May 31).

Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.
