## Weekly Words from The Rock

### Question for the Week

In February 1993, Karl Keating in the periodical This Rock composed a quiz entitled "The World's Toughest Catholic Quiz." Trust me, it is difficult. Over the course of the next weeks we will look at certain questions from the quiz. Last week, I provided two questions for you to think about and see if you could come up with the correct answer. Here are the questions and answers.

Question: Parish Councils

- a. Were set up by Vatican II to oversee the work of parish priests.
- b. Prevail against the opinions of pastors if at least two-thirds of the council members agree on an issue.
- c. Advise the pastor and help him with administrative duties, but have no authority over him.
- d. Were instituted by Vatican II because the Church is now a democracy, not a monarchy.
- e. None of the above.

Answer:

- a. Wrong, because Vatican II did not set up parish councils and because such councils are not

above parish priests.

- b. Wrong, because this is just a "supermajority variation" of a.
- c. Correct, because parish councils are under the pastor who, under canon law, is subject in his running of the parish only to his bishop and to the Vatican.
- d. Wrong, because Vatican II did not institute them (parish councils predate Vatican II) and because the Church remains a monarchy, not a democracy – it mirrors the organization of heaven, which is a monarchy.
- e. Wrong, because c. is correct.

Question: Mortal sin

- a. Is nowhere mentioned in Scripture.
- b. Is a theological construct from the Church of the Middle Ages, and since Vatican II we recognize that there are only two kinds of sins, venial and serious.
- c. A sin with grave matter that is committed with full knowledge and deliberate consent.
- d. Makes it impossible for you ever to get to heaven, no matter what you do.
- e. None of the above.

Answer:

- a. Wrong, because mortal sin is mentioned in 1 John 5:16: "Not all sin is mortal," which implies that some sin is.
- b. Wrong, because serious sin is

exactly the same as mortal sin. Only the words differ.  
c. Correct, these are the three conditions singled out in the catechism (Catechism of the Catholic Church, number 1857).

d. Wrong, because you can go to heaven if you die after repenting of a mortal sin.

e. Wrong, because c. is correct.

Here is one final question for you to think about in the week ahead.

Question: Apologetics means

- a. Never having to say you're sorry.
- b. The art of apologizing for being a Catholic.
- c. A course that seminarians used to have to take but that they now are exempted from by canon law.
- d. Giving reasoned explanations and defenses of the faith.
- e. None of the above.

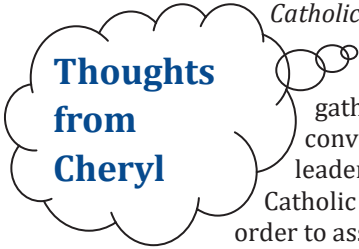

*Catholic Leaders: the Joy of the Gospel in America*, but today I took time to listen online to the U.S. bishops as they shared their hopes for this gathering. The United States Bishops will be convening an unprecedented gathering of key leaders (3-4,000 strong) from the dioceses and Catholic organizations from all across the country in order to assess the challenges and opportunities of our time.

This unique event, which is actually a national conversation inspired by Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, will allow those gathered to discuss the following three questions.

1. What are the challenges and opportunities we face this moment in time, in this culture and in the Church within the U.S.?
2. Given this age, what does it mean to be a Church on mission or missionary disciples?
3. What are the most effective ways for advancing the gospel now and into the future?

Let us pray for Bishop Quinn and his delegation from Winona attending this convocation. If you would like to know more about the event, visit the [usccb.org](http://usccb.org) website. Let us desire to hear what was discussed and recover for ourselves the joy of being a child of God, renewing a sense of confidence to share Christ's love with others. This is a time to 'pedal faster' and give it our all.

Now we will have a team of talented and skilled leaders with more resources to support our music ministry, build our understanding of the call to full and active participation, and draw new volunteers into service. As we consider the importance of having a strong adult initiation program to receive people who desire to know more about the Catholic faith, new energy will be able to be devoted to this aspect of parish life as well.

Looking back on all that we have accomplished in this year alone and the great work that we hope to continue in the years to come stems from not only the strong leadership of staff, but parishioners who devote themselves in carrying on the mission of Jesus Christ.

# Liturgy Notes from Joann

## Ordinary Time

Our journey through the calendar year brings us to this first Sunday in July with celebrations of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July starting to be heard. Summertime is here - with picnics and travel, cool Minnesota mornings and long evenings. Living is easy.

Our liturgical calendar is also into “easy living” as we have entered the season of Ordinary Time – “ordinary” because it is “ordered” time – numbered time. When you come to Mass this Sunday, we will celebrate the 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Thirteen you say? When did we celebrate Sunday 1-12?

We actually began the season of Ordinary time (ordered time) back in January after the Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord. The week *after* the Solemnity is always the first *week* of Ordinary Time. The Sunday that followed was the Second Sunday in Ordinary time and we celebrated Sundays three through eight in January and February up until Ash Wednesday when we began Lent. After Lent we celebrate the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter) which took us into the Easter Season! The last Sunday of the Easter Season was Pentecost. The week after Pentecost was the ninth *week* in Ordinary Time. The following Sunday would have been the 10<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time – however, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity on this Sunday. The Sunday after Trinity Sunday is always the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ which brought us into the 11<sup>th</sup> *week* in Ordinary Time. Last Sunday we celebrated the 12<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time which was followed by the 12<sup>th</sup> *week* in Ordinary Time which brings us to today!

So why is all of this important to know?

During the Second Vatican Council, it was decided that we, the faithful, should hear a more complete proclamation of the Scriptures during the celebration of the Eucharist than what was being heard at the time (the Second Vatican Council met from 1962-1965). To ensure that this happened, the Lectionary (the collection of readings that are read at Mass) was revised so that throughout Ordinary Time, the semi-continuous reading of the books of the Bible would be heard during Mass. Our Gospel story today is from Chapter 10 of the Gospel of Matthew. Next week we will continue with Chapter 11 and so on. Ordinary Time is important because we are spending this time walking with Jesus – listening to his words – as he teaches his disciples then and now – how to be open to the life and love of GOD.
