

Weekly Words from The Rock

<u>Question for the Week</u> This week our exercise is under the category of matching. Below, I have categorized different members of the Catholic Church. On the right, I have provided a description of each of the members of the Catholic Church.

What your exercise entails is matching the appropriate description with member. Please remember your work is to match. Good luck and look for the answers next week.

Pope	A. Baptized Catholics who are not members of the clergy. Bring the presence of Christ to their life in the world and attain holiness by fulfilling their own particular vocation in the world.
Cardinal	B. An ordained member of the clergy, ranked under bishops and priests. He can either be transitional or permanent.
Archbishop	C. Someone who belongs to a religious institute or order. They take a vow of poverty, chastity, and obedience in order to follow Christ more faithfully.
Bishop	D. Honorary title given to a diocesan priest in recognition of his contributions to the life of the Church.
Monsignor	E. Recognized leader of the Catholic Church. He is known as the Bishop of Rome and is looked upon as Peter's successor. Holds his position until his death.
Priest	F. Heads an important Church post or heads a diocese ranked an archdiocese because of its significance in Catholic history or popularity. Retirement age of 75.
Deacon	G. The chief pastor and head of a specific diocese. He has charge of all matters of Church life within the designated boundaries of the diocese. Retirement age of 75.
Religious	H. Attached to a specific diocese, he is under the authority of the local bishop. Co-workers with the bishop in the mission of teaching, sanctifying, and leading God's people.
Laity	I. An important honorary rank bestowed upon members of the clergy by the pope. Until he reaches the age of 80, this person is allowed to vote in the election of a new pope.

<u>Biblical Terminology</u> We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Abomination – usually something contrary to proper religion. The Hebrew term recurring in Leviticus 11 designates "unclean" creatures that are not to be eaten. Two other Hebrew terms closely aligned typically refer to foreign gods, their images, or related worship practices as detestable. They also denote improper ways of worshipping God and wicked or unlawful conduct.

Abraham – a Hebrew patriarch and an important figure in three living religions: Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Earlier known as Abram, he is perceived as the patriarch of several peoples from the regions of Palestine.

He is called "the father of many nations" (Genesis 17:5) and the friends of God (2 Chronicles 20:7).

Abraham's bosom – a metaphor in Jesus' parable about the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31). To be in someone's bosom means to recline to the right of the host (the place of honor) at a meal. Christians later used this metaphor as another designation for Paradise.

Liturgy Notes from Ioann

Weddings and Customs - Part II

During the seasons of summer and fall, we have many weddings at the Church of the Resurrection. It is my honor to meet with couples who are preparing for the Celebration of Matrimony to talk about the readings, the rites and the music.

Last week, I introduced four customs that are popular at weddings: the lighting of a unity candle, presenting flowers to a statue of Mary, the blessing and giving of arras and the blessing and placing of the lazo. While lighting a unity candle and presenting flowers to a statue of Mary are not official rites of the Church - we do allow for them at weddings. The blessing and giving of arras and the placing of the lazo are official rites of the Church.

The Blessing and Giving of Arras

Arras are thirteen coins poured from one spouse's hands to the others. The custom

comes from the Hispanic tradition and is an optional rite during the celebration of Matrimony. During the rite, the priest blesses the coins and then hands them to the husband who pours them into the hands of his wife saying: *Receive these arras as a pledge of* God's blessing and a sign of the good gifts we will share. The wife then takes the arras and pours them into her husband's hands saying the same words. Originally, the coins went in only one direction - from groom to bride - indicating his financial responsibility to her. In the United States, the bride gives them back to her husband as a sign that both share responsibility for the family, pledging their mutual support. Thirteen coins are a kind of "baker's dozen" that signify abundance. God has been good to the bride and groom and they pledge to put their blessings to use for the good of each other and their family.

Placing of the Lazo

A *lazo* is a double rosary placed over the shoulders of the bride and groom. It is first blessed by the priest or deacon as a symbol of unity and commitment and then placed over the shoulders of the couple, usually with the help of family members or friends. The ritual occurs in the celebration of



Matrimony after the Eucharistic Prayer and before the Lord's Prayer which leads into Nuptial Blessing. In this way, the couple receives the nuptial blessing while wearing the lazo. It is removed after the blessing. The continuous double loop of the lazo implies the eternal nature of the couple's commitment, and the nature of the lazo - a double rosary - suggests that their commitment will be strengthened not only by God but also by their devotion to Mary and to prayer. This custom also comes from the Hispanic tradition and is an optional rite during the celebration of Matrimony.

stores, but I am one of those people that is energized by


organization, matching binders, and new markers.
