

Weekly Words from The Rock

Story for the Week

As Catholics, we take a very strong stance on the dignity of life. We cherish and teach life is God-given from conception to natural death. All people have dignity. Here is a story someone sent via e-mail and while I do not know who the author is my presumption is that it is a nurse. I hope you enjoy it.

It was a busy morning, about 8:30, when an elderly gentleman in his 80s arrived to have his stitches removed from his thumb. He said he was in a hurry as he had an appointment at 9:00 am. I took his vital signs and had him take a seat, knowing it would be over an hour before someone would be able to see him. I saw him looking at his watch and decided, since I was not busy with another patient, I would evaluate his wound. On exam, it was well healed, so I talked to one of the doctors, got the needed supplies to remove his sutures and redress his wound.

While taking care of his wound, I asked him if he had another doctor's appointment this morning, as he was in such a hurry. The gentleman told me no, that he needed to go to the nursing home to eat breakfast with his wife. I inquired as to her health. He told me that she had been there for a while and that she was a victim of Alzheimer's Disease. As we talked, I asked if she would be upset if he was a bit late. He replied that she no longer knew who he was, that she had not recognized him in five years now. I was surprised, and asked him, "And you still go every morning, even though she doesn't know who you are?" He smiled and said, "She doesn't know me, but I still know who she is." I had to hold back tears as he left, I had goose bumps on my arm and thought, "That is the kind of love I want in my life."

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible</u> <u>Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Angel – a spiritual being, subordinate to God, who serves at God's command and pleasure to deliver his messages, help his people, and punish his enemies. In the Old Testament, angels appear in the stories of the patriarchs (i.e., Genesis:16:7-14; Judges 13:3-5). There is some ambiguity, however, about what form these messengers take, exactly what type of beings they are, and just what their relationship to God is, especially in the earlier materials. Since God frequently confronts humans directly in the Old Testament texts, the appearance of angels is somewhat sporadic. As religious thinking developed, and as God came to be understood as increasingly transcendent, the perceptions about angels also began to change. Ideas developed about good and bad angels, a hierarchy of angels

before God, and specific duties assigned to each angel or group of angels. By the New Testament period, angels were understood as spiritual beings who were allied with God in opposition to Satan and his "angels," the demons. Angels had many functions. They praised God, served as his messengers to the world, watched over God's people, and were sometimes instruments of God's judgment.

Anna – a Jewish prophetess who, together with the prophet Simeon, witnessed the dedication of the infant Jesus in the Temple and spoke of him and the expected redemption of Israel (Luke 2:22-38).

The Annunciation – the announcement to Mary by the angel Gabriel, that she would bear a son who would be "holy, the Son of God." The story is found in Luke's account of the birth of Jesus (Luke 1:26-38). In the development of the Christian calendar, the events came to have significant status, and March 25 was set aside to commemorate the annunciation. The medieval church developed the prayer "Ave Maria" partly from this Lucan passage. There have been numerous artistic depictions of the annunciation.

The Antichrist - the final opponent of Christ and thus of God. This designation is found only in the Letters of John. The author supposes that his audience has heard the term before (1 John 2:18), and he suggests that it now refers to individuals ("antichrists") whose religious influence is a danger to the church. Earlier, Jewish thinkers, amidst persecution by the Greeks, believed that the blasphemous "little horn" (Antiochus IV) would be vanquished by the sudden rule of "the saints of the Most High" (Daniel 7). Soon thereafter it was believed that a coming Messiah would terminate persecution, whether it was inflicted by Greece or Rome. Early Christianity continued the practice of depicting the enemy as an individual or beast who would be defeated at the Messiah's (Christ's) return. The enemy is variously referred to as "the lawless one" (2 Thessalonians 2:8), Belial (2 Corinthians 6:15), and Gog and Magog (Revelation 20:8). The church has continued to use this designation (the "antichrist") for its enemies of every age, both within and outside of its membership.

This Sunday, August 13, following the 11:30 a.m. Mass, we will have a special procession carrying a statue of Our Lady of Fatima in celebration of the 100th anniversary of Mary's appearance to three humble

shepherd children, who demonstrated their radical trust in Mary in the face of great opposition. If you do not know the story of Fatima, I encourage you to learn more about it. (There are some great Fatima movies on FORMED.org.) Pope Francis said, "Let us invoke Mary's intercession. May she help us to be open to God's surprises, to be faithful to him each and every day, and to praise and thank him, for he is our strength."

If you have ever moved to a new city or a new state, you know the excitement of discovering new sights, sounds, flavors, and people. It also requires radical trust. It can take time to build friendships and a sense of belonging. We can help others to feel that Resurrection is their home by the warmth in which we smile, make eye contact and introduce ourselves. Have you ever considered inviting someone from Church over for a meal or out to eat? Inviting someone new to your home requires radical trust as well. Imagine how Resurrection would be transformed if more parishioners were willing to offer this radical hospitality. It begins with each of us.

Last weekend we had the opportunity to meet Joy Viceroy, Resurrection's Music and Choral Director, briefly after all of the Masses. Thank you to all of you who have extended your hand in welcome. In order to give you a better idea of her background, the following is her formal biography. Look for her column in coming weeks.

Originally from Cleveland, OH, Joy Viceroy has served both voluntarily and professionally in the capacities of chorister, cantor, and director for various liturgical music groups across the U.S. and Ireland since 1999. At the age of nine, Joy became a founding member of the

Cappella Children's Choir at her home parish of St. Bartholomew. She was soon trained as a cantor, later joining the Traditional and Contemporary Adult Choirs. While attending Saint Mary's College in Notre Dame, IN, Joy continued to serve as a music minister through Campus Ministry, eventually earning an internship as a Pastoral Music Leader. Upon graduating magna cum laude with her degree in Music, Theatre, and French in 2013, Joy accepted a position at the Church of the Annunciation in Wexford, Ireland with the House of Brigid. This postgraduate volunteer program, (using liturgical music as its foundation,) promotes the re-evangelization of the Irish Catholic Church at a local level. There, Joy was director of the Vigil and Youth Choirs, a member of the Folk Group, and a music leader in the Family Liturgy Group. While serving in the House of Brigid, Joy also earned a Certificate in Liturgy from the University of Notre Dame. Not ready to leave Ireland after two years, Joy accepted an offer to the Masters in Liturgical Music program at the Pontifical University of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. There, Joy served as the Director of Music at St. Coca's Church and as a substitute cantor throughout the Archdiocese of Dublin. She was also musically active with Ireland's National Seminary and National Centre for Liturgy. Though concentrating in plainchant and oratorio, Joy was asked to add liturgical composition to her musical studies at the end of her first year. Her compositions have been featured at notable workshops and conventions in Ireland and the U.S. Joy is also a certified cantor through the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM), earning her Cantor Colleague Certificate this past winter. She is now working towards becoming a Certified Cantor Trainer and has been invited to sit on the NPM Cantor Steering Committee. Upon completion of her masters in 2017, Joy made the move to Rochester, MN to begin serving the people of the Church of the Resurrection as their Music and Choral Director.

Liturgy Notes from Joann

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This week, on Tuesday, August 15, we celebrate the *Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary*. The Catholic Church believes that Mary, the mother of Jesus, was assumed body and soul into heaven at the end of her life. The image below is the Assumption Mosaic at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington D.C. As I was preparing the music to celebrate this Solemnity, I ran across a wonderful explanation by Rev. Paul Turner, a priest from the diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph who holds a doctorate in sacred theology. Here are his words:



We believe in the resurrection of bodies that decay after death, but Mary needs no resurrection of the body because hers was preserved from corruption. This belief is the counterpart to the Catholic belief in the Immaculate Conception of Mary. To prepare a womb for the coming of the Word-made-flesh, God preserved Mary from all sin – including original sin, which leads to further sin and death. Hence, sinless (immaculate) Mary did not experience death as mortals do. She was assumed into heaven.

In the preface for this Solemnity, we pray:

For today the Virgin Mother of GOD was assumed into heaven as the beginning and image of your Church's coming to perfection as a sign of sure hope and comfort to your pilgrim people; rightly you would not allow her to see the corruption of the tomb since from her own body she marvelously brought forth your incarnate Son, the Author of all life.

The entire church is on a pilgrimage toward heaven. Mary, who has already achieved this goal, is a sign of hope and comfort for all of us who are on the journey.

Mary gave birth to the divine Son. We too, as children of GOD, are called to give birth to the presence of the risen Christ for others. We are called to lovingly nurture Christ within ourselves so that through us others can joyfully encounter him. To do this, we must constantly return to the source of our own blessedness – our loving GOD. We do this through daily prayer and the recognition of GOD who dwells within ourselves and in those whom we meet in the everyday circumstances of life.

Our Masses on the Solemnity will be celebrated at 8:30 AM and 7:00 PM.


