St. Paul died by

Answer: A. The sword. With St. Peter, St. Paul was martyred in Rome.

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is [Harper's Bible Dictionary](#), Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Day of Atonement – a fast day on which no work was done, observed in Israel ten days after the fall new year to atone for the sins of the past year. An offering of incense was made by the high priest in the innermost chamber of the Temple, the Holy of Holies, the only time in the year he entered there. The sins of the people were symbolically placed upon the “scapegoat,” which was driven into the wilderness. Hebrews 8-9 draw heavily on the Day of Atonement to explain Christ's sacrifice.

Baal – a Canaanite god. Baal is a weather god associated with thunderstorms. Clouds were thought to be part of his entourage. Lightning was his weapon. Rain was important

to Canaanite agriculture, and Baal was consequently a god of fertility—a prodigious lover as well as the give of abundance. As one would expect, worshiping the one, true God, opposition to Baal is a persistent theme of the Israelite literature.

Babel – the Hebrew name for Babylon. It was the site of the episode in Genesis 11:1-9, which recounts the origin of separate languages. Once humankind spoke in one language, but when people settled in Shinar, they purposed to make bricks and building materials and build a city and tower “with its top in the heavens, and make a name for themselves, lest they be scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth” (Genesis 11:4). God, beholding this, concluded that with a single common language humankind could do anything it wished, so he confounded human speech, creating linguistic havoc and scattering the people over the earth. Thus, the name “Babel” because it was at this site that the Lord confused the language of all the earth.

Bag – a knapsack like bag, usually of leather, for carrying goods and provisions. It is distinguished from a purse (Luke 10:4; 22:35-36) and belt for carrying money (Matthew 10:9-10; Mark 6:8). It was not a beggar's bag. The disciples during Jesus' ministry were not to carry such a bag of provisions on their mission but to trust in God's provision.

Personal Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary

On September 8, Bishop Quinn consecrated the diocese to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. This weekend, we consecrate the parish to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Below is a prayer that can be offered whereby a person consecrates themselves to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

I, _____, a faithless sinner, renew and ratify today in your hands, ever Virgin and Immaculate Mother of God, the vows of my baptism; I renounce forever Satan, his pomps and works; and I give myself entirely to Jesus Christ, the Incarnate Wisdom, to carry my cross after Him all the days of my life, and to be more faithful to Him than I have ever been before:

In the presence of all the Heavenly Court I choose you, this day, oh Mary, for my Mother and Patroness.

I deliver and consecrate to you – to your Immaculate Heart – my body and soul, my goods, both interior and exterior, and even the value of all my actions, past, present and future; leaving to you the entire and full right of disposing of me, and all that belongs to me, without exception, according to your good pleasure, for the greater glory of God, in time and in eternity.

I also consecrate to your Immaculate Heart all the members of my family; protect their souls and bodies, their spiritual and physical integrity.

Fulfill in me and through me your heavenly plan for these troubled times.

I want to be an instrument in your hands for The Triumph of Your Immaculate Heart as you have prophesized at Fatima. Amen.

Take A Closer Look

Two weeks ago I took a little vacation and traveled to New Mexico. On the way I traveled through the great states of South Dakota, Nebraska and Colorado and on my return I motored through the states of Oklahoma and Iowa. I share this with you because on the journey, I stopped at many places along the way and learned a lot about this country that I never knew before – all because I choose to take a closer look.

Sioux Falls, South Dakota was my first stop. Honestly, I have driven through Sioux Falls only one other time in my life, and that was many years ago on my way to Yellowstone. I didn't stop then, but this time the brown signs directing me to the falls were a gentle invitation which I decided to embrace. In the short time that I was there I climbed to the top of the lookout tower to see the falls from a birds-eye view and then walked the path near the falls. The cool mist from the river was a welcome relief to the heat of a summer afternoon and signs along the path provided information about how this marvelous area was formed so many years ago.

As I traveled through Nebraska, those brown signs invited me to take a closer look at the Sand Hills. Sand Hills? I had never heard of these and my curiosity was the impetus I needed to pull off. As I stepped onto the trail that lead me to the look-out point I was walking on sand – just as if I had been on a beach – and the view was truly amazing, miles and miles of grass-stabilized sand dunes. When I looked on the internet, I learned that these sand dunes were designated a National Natural Landmark in 1984.

Colorado offered me the opportunity to learn about hot springs, waterfalls and downshifting (when traveling through the passes); Oklahoma has an area called the Flint Hills – miles and miles of dense tall grasses which cannot be tilled because the soil is too rocky; and Iowa has rest areas with distinct art that tells the story of some part of her history.

I offer these experiences as a reminder for all of us to take a closer look at the celebration of the Mass. We travel the same road every Sunday to come to this place and offer our common prayer of thanksgiving to GOD. Do you see the brown signs along the way? Do you see the invitation to greet the stranger? Do you prepare for the encounter with Christ by reading the scriptures for Sunday before you hear them proclaimed? How much do you know about Paul and his letter to the Ephesians? The parish is offering a scripture study on this topic in the fall. Consider this your first “brown sign”. Are you open to the experience of the Sunday Mass – the songs, the preaching, the people sitting around you? My challenge for all of us is to be open: to extend a hand, share a smile, read the scriptures and open your hearts – I think we will all be amazed at what GOD has to offer us when we do.
