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

Quiz Question

Answer: c. Dove.

We often associate the dove with baptism or confirmation not the Eucharist. The story of the pelican is that a female pelican is willing to rip open her breast to feed her young with her own blood, to avert their death. Jesus does the same in the Eucharist by providing his body and blood to keep us from

death (spiritual death).

Let us try this again with a different sacrament.

a. Shell with water

b. Baptismal font

c. Keys

d. Font with dove

e. Running water

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible</u> <u>Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Beatitudes – declarations typically associated with the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew (Matthew 5:1-12) and the Sermon on the Plain in Luke (Luke 6:20-23). They are pronouncements that confer an end-time blessing upon persons who are characterized by what they are (e.g. the poor) or do (e.g. the peacemakers). The blessing assures the addressees of the vindication and reward that attend the salvation of God's end-time Rule and thus provides encouragement in time of difficulty. Looking at Matthew's Beatitudes, "the poor in spirit" are those who are not only economically deprived but who also stand before God with no illusions of self-righteousness or self-sufficiency. "Those who mourn" are those who grieve over sin and evil in the world.

"The meek" are those who are lowly and powerless, whose only hope is God. "Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness" are those who yearn for the final salvation that only God can effect. "The merciful" are those who eschew judgment and forgive. "The pure in heart" are those who are undivided in their allegiance to God. "The peacemakers" are those who work for the wholeness and well-being that God wills for a broken world. "Those who are persecuted for

righteousness' sake" are those who incur tribulation because, as disciples of Jesus, they serve God. What is promised these various persons is essentially the same benefit, the end-time salvation that attends God's kingly Rule.

Beer – this isn't what you think (it is not the drink). 1. A location where the Israelites dug a well in the Transjordan (Numbers 21:16-18). Its exact location is unknown. 2. The place to which Jotham fled for refuge after implicitly attacking the kingship of Abimelech (Judges 9:21).

Beggar – one who is poor and needy, who begs for food or asks for alms. Frequently the beggar was lame (Acts 3:10), blind (Mark 10:46-52; John 9), or afflicted with sores (Luke 16:19-20). The most famous beggar of the Bible was Lazarus, who, upon death, was received into the bosom of Abraham in contrast to the rich man who went to the torments of Hades (Luke 16:19-30). In Mark (10:46-52) the blind beggar whose sight is restored by Jesus outside Jericho is identified as Bartimaeus, son of Timaeus.

The Beloved Disciple – a disciple mentioned only in the Gospel of John and never identified by name. Appearing first at the Last Supper, reclining at Jesus' bosom, at Peter's bidding he asks the identity of Jesus' betrayer (13:23-25). At the crucifixion, standing beneath the cross with Jesus' mother, he is entrusted with her care (19:25-27). On Easter morning, he outruns Peter to Jesus' tomb and finds it empty (20:2-10).

Later, in Galilee, he identifies for Peter a figure standing on the shore as the risen Jesus (21:7). Finally, Jesus parries Peter's question about whether the Beloved Disciple will live until Jesus' return (21:20-23), after which-at the end of the narrative-he is identified as the witness behind, and apparently the author of, the Gospel of John (21:24).

References to this disciple have also been seen in the "other disciple" who gains for Peter admittance to the courtyard of the high priest (18:15-16) and the trusted witness of John 19:35, although in these instances the person is not named. In every case except 19:25-27, 35, the Beloved Disciple appears alongside Peter. The assumption that the Beloved Disciple must have been one of the Twelve led to the traditional view that he was John the son of Zebedee.

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Liturgy Notes from Oann, Director of Liturgy & RCIA, dirlituravrcia@rescathroch.ora. **Archangels**

This week, we celebrate the Feast of Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael, Archangels. Here is an explanation of this feast day by Reverend Paul Turner:

Every September 29 the Catholic Church celebrates a feast of three archangels: Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. The word "archangel" appears once in the Bible in reference to Michael (Jude 9). Tradition has added the other two names to the list because both play significant roles in the Bible. *Raphael* appears in the Book of Tobit, where he is both matchmaker and healer. *Gabriel* is best known for his appearances in the New Testament. He announces to Zechariah the forthcoming birth of John the Baptist (Luke 1:13, 19) and most famously announces to Mary that she will conceive Jesus (Luke 1:26-38). *Michael* appears in the book of Daniel as a defender of the chosen people (Chapters 10 and 12). In Jude he disputes with the devil over the body of Moses and in Revelation he and his angels fight the dragon. Michael is the patron of police and others who protect the welfare of people.

No church had ever been dedicated to Michael until the sixth century, when the faithful erected one on the Via Salaria in Rome. It was dedicated on September 29, which became the Feast of St. Michael on the Roman calendar. The other two archangels were added to this day after the Second Vatican Council. The Collect for the Mass stresses two functions of the archangels: they defend the Christian people and they minister to GOD in heaven.

A fourth archangel, Uriel, is acknowledged in Christian tradition, though he does not appear in the Bible and hence has no place in the liturgical calendar. The apocryphal gospels (writings by early Christians not included in the Bible) say he carried John the Baptist and his mother Elizabeth to join Jesus, Mary and Joseph on the flight into Egypt. Uriel is one of the characters in Leonardo de Vinci's masterpiece, Virgin of the Rocks. Mary is with the infant John (on the left) and Uriel is with the infant Christ.

Musical Musings from Joy

Once again, Music Ministry registration will continue through the end of September. Do consider joining your voice or instrumental skill to any one of our choirs. If you have questions about what's involved, don't be afraid to come talk to me or to ask one of the current choir members. All of us would be happy to share our experience of the ministry with you!

Last week, I mentioned the call for "fully conscious and active participation" as outlined in the Vatican II document, Sacrosanctum Concilium. Over the next several weeks, I want to unpack what this means for music in the liturgy. The information I share with you will be adapted from my master's thesis: Realizing the Roman Rite: Applying Ritual Theatre Studies to a Postconciliar Understanding of Liturgical Active Participation. (Don't worry, I have no intention of boring you all! But, if you ever have any questions about my research, I'm always happy to answer them!) I'll give you all of the information in small doses and then provide a question for you to think about over the coming week. There is no right or wrong answer; but, perhaps it'll be a great conversation starter for the dinner table!

Nearly every contemporary Catholic has heard the phrase "active participation." Usually, it is attributed to the documents of Vatican II. Did you know, though, that this concept has been in existence long before the 1960s? In fact, it has been from the first days of Christianity! While it may not have been a great aspiration of the early Church, "many patristic writings of these times reveal to us that the faithful have always had a very active part in liturgical celebrations." This participation, however, may have been more internal than external, as it was "with great attention and devotion" that the people worshipped.²

Therefore, from the earliest of times in our faith, the notion of active participation has existed. However, there was a distinction between *internal* versus *external* participation. I pose this question to you: Do you think that silently praying with the music at Mass is still a way of actively participating even though you are not lending your voice to the mix?
