Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is [Harper's Bible Dictionary](#), Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Bible Lands – the territories that provided a geographic setting for the narratives of the Bible. They include the modern state of Israel (with the West Bank and Gaza), Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, Turkey, Egypt, Ethiopia, Greece, Cyprus, and the Aegean Islands.

Birthright – the practice whereby the eldest son receives a larger (double) share of the inheritance than do his younger brothers. In the Old Testament, the law of Deuteronomy 21:15-17 protects the birthright of the eldest son although the sale of the birthright to a younger son is known (Genesis 25:27-34).

Bitter Herbs – vegetables with a characteristically bitter taste. Exodus 12:8 states, "They shall eat the flesh of the paschal lamb that night, roasted; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it." The herbs have been variously identified as certain types of lettuce, endive, and chervil. From the first century A.D., these herbs have been eaten at the Passover seder to represent the bitterness of the lives of the Israelites under Egyptian slavery.

Bitumen – a type of asphalt or mineral pitch, either occurring naturally or found as a by-product of burning coal or wood. The King James Version translates it as "slime." Throughout antiquity this black sticky substance was used as an adhesive or a caulk. Bitumen could also be used for waterproofing, as in the construction of Noah's ark (Genesis 6:14) and the bulrush basket of Moses (Exodus 2:3).

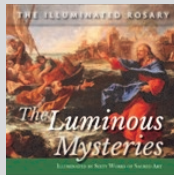
Month of the Rosary

In Catholic tradition, the month of October is dedicated to the holy rosary and includes the *Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary* on October 7 (Saturday). The best way to celebrate the month is to pray the rosary.

The *rosary* is a prayer based on the repetition of the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be. During its recitation, the believer reflects on the birth (Joyful Mysteries), death (Sorrowful Mysteries), revelation (Luminous Mysteries) and glory (Glorious Mysteries) of Jesus Christ and the role of Mary. A chain of beads resembling a garland of roses is used to recite these prayers – thus its name – the rosary. The beads are not essential to the prayer, but they do help keep count of the Hail Mary's.

In addition to meditation, the rosary leads to petition - it implores Mary's intercession in bringing our prayers to GOD. The origins of the rosary are obscure, but according to *Father Paul Turner*, it probably formed in imitation of meditative practices of Islam and after the Christian desire for prayer in a language more easily understood than the Latin of the Mass. Its popularity increased after the 15th century due to the encouragement of the followers of St. Dominic, who believed Our Lady had miraculously given the rosary to him. Since the faithful who attended Mass at that time had less to say, do, or see compared with today, the recitation of the rosary *during* Mass became a popular Catholic devotion. Today we are encouraged to participate in the Mass and to pray the rosary apart from the Eucharist.

A few years ago, before I started working at Resurrection, I attended a *Generations of Faith – Expanding Horizons* event where I learned how to make knotted rosaries from a former parishioner, Paul Whidden. Since that time, every time I make a knotted rosary, I pray the prayers of the rosary as I am tying the knots. I like to use the *Mysteries CD* by Danielle Rose as a way to mediate on the mysteries. I have also found the books in *The Illuminated Rosary* series from Gracewatch Media to be a powerful visual meditation. For each of the mysteries (Joyful, Sorrowful, Luminous and Glorious) sixty works of sacred art are illustrated—one for each bead. It's a great way to slow down your rosary and imaginatively enter each mystery.

Musical Musings from Joy

Any interesting conversations this past week about actively participating in the music?

What self-revelations did you make about your own musical participation in the Mass? Do you know what you're singing about? If you don't sing in church, were you able to give reasons as to why not? As always, no right or wrong answers here! A great read on this subject comes from the USCCB – *Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship*. You can find eBook versions online. If you're curious about the role of music in the Mass, this is the book to tell you all about that!

Here's this week's thought: *After the reforms of the Council of Trent (1545-1563), congregational participation lessened even further. This is owing to several reasons, but most especially because the prayers for this Mass are only spoken by the priest or the priest and the altar servers together. As said by Pope Pius X: "If you wish to hear Mass as it should be heard, you must follow with eye, heart, and mouth all that happens at the altar. Further, you must pray with the Priest the holy words said by him in the Name of Christ and which Christ says by him."¹ Therefore, the people's participation was considered interior. Yet, it is probably safe to assume that many people could not follow the words of the Mass because of the singular use of the Latin language as the language of the liturgy.*

This should especially jog the memories of those who remember the Mass as it was before the reforms of Vatican II. (Perhaps some of you gentlemen were even the altar servers that had to learn the Latin prayers!) For those of you who have memories of this time, did you know your Latin prayers? Did you ever recite anything along aloud? What was the music like? *Was* there any music?

For those of us that have not experienced pre-conciliar (pre-Vatican II) liturgy, what are your thoughts about a Mass where you couldn't readily understand the language? Would you be motivated to learn your prayers in this unfamiliar tongue? Would you be satisfied merely listening to the music and probably not being able to sing along?

As a Director of Faith Formation, I am always seeking out new resources to help families and myself grow in faith. One such resource is from *Growing Up Catholic* found at growingupcatholic.com. Here you will find resources for parish families "that coaches and empowers parents to form their own children in faith." Recall that as parents, you took a vow to "raise your children in the Catholic Faith." There are many tools of the faith to guide you on this journey. Grades 1-5: We will be learning about God's creation in our Monday classes this week. Our goals are: to recognize that living things need care; to describe how cooperation can make a difference in the world; to identify ways to show God our love; and to give thanks to God in prayer for a wonderful world.

He did this to show his love and *reverence* for Jesus and Mary. This month is a reminder for us to practice showing reverence as we enter God's house by slowing making the Sign of the Cross with holy water, genuflecting toward the tabernacle and participating in the Eucharist by kneeling, standing, singing and praying together. St. Hyacinth, thank you for teaching us about *reverence*. Pray for us! Amen.
