Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible</u> <u>Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Blasphemy – a term derived from a Greek word meaning to injure the reputation of another. In the Bible it means showing contempt or a lack of reverence for God (Leviticus 24:16; Mark 2:7) or something sacred (Matthew 26:65). Blasphemy would include claiming for oneself divine attributes by word or deed (Mark 14:64; John 10:33).

Blindness – sightlessness. It is God who has the power to make people blind (Exodus 4:11) as well as to restore sight (Psalm 146:8). In Genesis 19:11 the angels of God who visited Lot struck the evil men of Sodom with blindness. Through Elisha's prayer God struck the Syrian army with blindness (2) Kings 6:18). In Isaiah 42:7 God commissions his servant "to open the eyes that are blind." Blindness was one of the blemishes disqualifying descendants of Aaron from performing sacrifice to God (Leviticus 21:16-24). Likewise, it was forbidden to offer blind animals in sacrifice (Leviticus 22:22; Deuteronomy 15:21; Malachi 1:8). The blind were to be protected in accord with God's covenantal instructions: no stumbling block was to be placed in their way (Leviticus 19:14); and anyone who misled a blind person was cursed (Deuteronomy 21:18). Isaac, Eli and Ahijah suffered the blindness of old age. One of the expectations of the eschatological age was the opening of the eyes of the blind by God. In the New Testament Jesus' healing of blindness was one of the "deeds of the Christ" illustrating and bringing about the Kingdom of God. There are several examples in which the blind had their sight restored by Jesus: the faith of two blind men enabled them to be healed by Jesus; he healed a blind and dumb demoniac; by healing the blind in the Temple Jesus restored them to the worshiping community. The concept of blindness was particularly appropriate for metaphorical use; it often characterized spiritual "blindness" or lack of insight into revelation.

Blood - a term understood in biblical writings not only as that which is essential to life but also as the seat of life's power. Though sometimes used simply to designate mortal life (usually in conjunction with the flesh), it is often connected with God, the life-giver. Injunctions existed against consuming blood. Blood plays an important role in the theology of the Old Testament, the institution of sacrificial atonement, and the work of the priests. Applied to the altar. blood becomes a powerful expiatory agent as sin offering, especially on the annual Day of Atonement. The priest, who is himself set apart by blood consecration, alone is qualified to apply the blood. The Passover celebration remembers the blood on the doorposts of Hebrew houses in Egypt and the deliverance accomplished by the God of the Covenant. The New Testament writings vary in the degree of development of the image of blood, but where the image appears it focuses on the shed blood of Jesus and his atoning character. Interpreted in terms of his obedient surrender of his life to God, it becomes the foundation of God's new covenant of grace. The people of faith celebrate this grace at the Lord's Supper; the cup of blessing is the new covenant of grace.

Last weekend, Father Shawn mentioned the Miracle of the Sun at Mass and encouraged us to look up the information on the internet. Here is what I found...

The **Miracle of the Sun** is a miraculous event witnessed by as many as 100,000 people on 13 October 1917 in the Cova da Iria fields near Fátima, Portugal. Those in attendance had assembled to observe what the Portuguese secular newspapers had been ridiculing for months as the absurd claim of three shepherd children that a miracle was going to occur at high-noon in the Cova da Iria on 13 October 1917.

According to many witness statements, after a downfall of rain, the dark clouds broke and the sun appeared as an opaque, spinning disc in the sky. It was said to be significantly less bright than normal, and cast multicolored lights across the landscape, the shadows on the landscape, the people, and the surrounding clouds. The sun was then reported to have careened towards the earth in a zigzag pattern, frightening some of those present who thought it meant the end of the world. Some witnesses reported that their previously wet clothes became "suddenly and completely dry." Estimates of the number of witnesses range from 30,000-40,000 by Avelino de Almeida, (writing for the Portuguese newspaper *O Século*), to 100,000 estimated by Dr. Joseph Garrett, (professor of natural sciences at the University of Coimbra), both of whom were present that day.

The event was attributed by believers to Our Lady of Fátima, an apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary to three young shepherd children in 1917, as having been predicted by the three children on 13 July, 19 August, and 13 September 1917. The children reported that the Lady had promised them that she would on 13 October reveal her identity to them and provide a miracle "so that all may believe." According to these reports, the event lasted approximately ten minutes. The three children also reported seeing a panorama of visions, including those of Jesus, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of Saint Joseph blessing the people.

Musical Musings from Joy

I hope last week's thought sparked a lot of conversations! Especially for those that have memories of postconciliar liturgies, did anything jog your memory? If I asked you to tell me a prayer or two in Latin, could you do it? What about music? Was there any? For those of us who don't have memories of this, what were your thoughts? Could you handle a Mass where you couldn't readily sing along?

There has been a surge of popularity in recent years in Latin Mass, particularly among millennials. If anyone is interested in more information, I encourage you to check out the Rochester Latin Mass Society: http://www.rochesterlatinmasssociety.org/.

Here's this week's thought: Despite popular belief, the term "active participation" did not originate in Vatican II's Sacrosanctum Concilium. Its first official use is found in Pope Pius X's Motu Proprio on sacred music, the Italian-language Tra le sollecitudini, promulgated on the Feast of St. Cecelia in 1903: "We deem it necessary to provide before anything else for the sanctity and dignity of the temple, in which the faithful assemble for no other object than that of acquiring this spirit from its foremost and indispensable font, which is the active participation in the most holy mysteries and in the public and solemn prayer of the Church."¹

It should be noted that Tra le sollecitudini's understanding of active participation is entirely musical. For Pius X, active participation was to be achieved by means of Gregorian chant, which he calls for the revival of throughout the Motu Proprio. He explicitly encourages the Church "to restore the use of the Gregorian Chant by the people."² His appeal can be traced to the work of Dom Guéranger and the monks of Solesmes on the restoration of Gregorian chant in the late nineteenth century. With this revival of the Gregorian tradition, the call for the reintroduction of chant also served as a means of saving Latin in the liturgy.

Therefore, the Church has been officially called to musical active participation for over one hundred years. Was Gregorian chant ever taught to any of you in schools? What do you think about chant in the 21st Century? Is this body of music something that still has a place in the modern Church? How about adaptations to it? (English-language translations, etc.) I'll be interested to hear your thoughts this week!

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


