<u>Biblical Terminology</u>


We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible</u> <u>Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Matthias – according to Acts 1:15-26, the successor among the Twelve Apostles to Judas Iscariot. After prayer, Matthias was chosen by lot over another candidate, Joseph called Barsabbas. According to Acts, both men had been with Jesus from the beginning of his ministry until his Ascension. The New Testament contains no other reference to Matthias.

Burial – the disposition of a human corpse to prevent its desecration. Because of the warm climate of Palestine and the popular belief that a dead body was ritually impure, burial usually took place as soon after death as possible, usually within twenty-four hours. Among the Jews interment or burial of the body was the common practice, and to allow the body to decay above ground or be subject to destruction by vultures or dogs was the greatest of dishonors. Anyone who discovered a corpse by the roadside was required to bury it. While the complete mortuary rituals among the Hebrews are not described in the Bible, most elements are represented in a variety of passages. As soon as the individual expired, the eldest son or nearest relative present would close the eyes of the decease. The mouth was bound shut, the body washed and then anointed with aromatic ointments. The body was wrapped in cloth (usually linen) although individuals of high rank would frequently be clothed in fine garments. Both

archaeological and biblical data indicate that individuals of wealth or political rank enjoyed burials that included robes, jewelry, furniture, weapons, and pottery. While cremation was widely practiced among the later Greeks and Romans along with the Canaanites, it was the Hebrew custom to inter the body. The only exceptions to this practice occurred when the bodies were in an advanced state of decay after mutilation or there was the threat of a plague. After preparations of the body were complete, the procession to the grave or tomb began with the corpse being carried on a wooden bier, usually by friends, servants or relatives. The procession was led by professional mourners, followed by family members who filled the air with cries of sadness and agony. A variety of burial sites were utilized by the ancient Hebrews depending on the occasion of death, the time allotted for burial, and the geological characteristics of the area. The most common type of burial arrangement was the simple shaft or trench grave, which was often lined with mats, wood or stone slabs. These simple graves were sometimes marked by a tree, although in the case of famous individuals, the burial plot was identified by a pile of stones placed over it. The Bible does not mention the use of pits for burials, but some have been discovered at various sites in Palestine. Caves were frequently used for burials either for their convenience or because time or money did not permit the cutting of a tomb from rock. Sarah and other members of Abraham's family were buried in a cave. Rock-cut tombs are the best documented burial sites known today and they display a wide variety of forms. Some were designed for a single interment, but most were designed for multiple burials, usually by one family (Isaiah 22:16). The tombs of the wealthy were frequently located in gardens (Matthew 27:57). Some tombs were marked by monuments or pillars (2 Kings 23:17) or whitewashed on the outside (Matthew 23:27) to prevent Jews from accidentally touching them and being rendered ceremonially unclean. Rock-cut tombs were sealed with square slabs of stone or, as was common in the Roman period, with rolling stones (Matthew 27:60).

All Saints and All Souls

Wednesday, November 1, is the **Solemnity of All Saints**. On this day we gather to rejoice with our brothers and sisters in Christ who have entered the glory of heaven. Many men and women have been officially recognized as saints by the Church, but there are many more who, though unnamed, sit at the heavenly banquet. On this day we recognize all of them as saints. The very next day, *Thursday*, *November 2*, the Church gathers for the *Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed – All Souls Day.* On this day, the Church prays for all the souls in purgatory, those faithful departed who await the day when they will join the company of the saints. These two liturgical celebrations, one right after the other, state in a profound way the mysterious union between the saints in heaven (the Church triumphant), the faithful on earth (the Church militant) and the souls in purgatory (the Church suffering). Together, we call this the *mystical Body of Christ*. The *Church militant* joins her prayers with the *Church triumphant* to supply what is wanting to the *Church* suffering. Talk about the power of prayer!

The celebration of Mass has always been for the Church, the principal means of prayer for the living and the dead. Every Mass that is celebrated is offered for someone – living or deceased. In the bulletin, you will find the names of the people for whom the Mass is offered. Notice as well, how one Mass on every Sunday is offered for the *living* members of the parish. At *every* Mass, during the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest remembers all those who have fallen asleep in the Lord - asking GOD to grant them a place of happiness, light and peace.

Things to Do: Visit a cemetery and pray for the dead during the Octave of All Saints Day (November 1 through November 8). Spend a little time after Mass thanking God for all the unnamed saints, some of whom could be our own relatives. Pray the Litany of the Saints - you could make it really special by chanting it *(check the hymnals for different versions)*. Use the prayer card with the names of the deceased from our parish *(available next weekend)* and pray for them throughout the month. Bring the prayer card of a deceased loved one to Mass and intentionally offer your prayers at Mass for her/his soul.

Next weekend, November 4/5, we remember in a special way, those whose funerals we celebrated this past year at the Church of the Resurrection. Their names will be read at each Mass and a candle will be lit for each one. These candles will be placed in the church windows and will remain burning throughout the month. Their names will be written in the Book of the Dead and this book will be enshrined by the baptismal font during the month, where everyone is invited to add the names of their loved ones as we remember all the faithful departed.

Musical Musings from Joy

What did we all think about the beginnings of the Liturgical Movement last week? What

impact did this have on musical active participation in the Church? *Did* it have any impact? Are there any memories out there of dialogue Masses or Protestant hymns being used before Vatican II?

As a fun exercise, I encourage you to go through our hymnals and see which songs might have originated in the Protestant Church. Does it make a difference to you? Did you ever know you were singing something of non-Catholic origin?

Here's this week's thought:

A pillar of the Liturgical Movement, and of Pius XII's papacy (1939-1958), is the document Mediator Dei. Pius XII felt that active participation was the ultimate way in which one could honor the sacrifice occurring on the altar. As manifested in the encyclical: "Through this active and individual participation, the members of the Mystical Body not only become daily more like to their divine Head, but the life flowing from the Head is imparted to the members."¹ Thus, by actively participating in the liturgy, Pius XII believed that congregations were growing ever-closer to Christ.

In the culmination of Mediator Dei, Pius XII urged: "Try in every way, with the means and helps that your prudence deems best, that the clergy and people become one in mind and heart, and that the Christian people take such an active part in the liturgy that it becomes a truly sacred action of due worship to the eternal Lord in which the priest, chiefly responsible for the souls of his parish, and the ordinary faithful are united together."² Not only was Pius XII calling for the active participation of both the religious and the laity, but he was encouraging them to do so in order to achieve unity in worship.

If we decide to take this call for active participation as a musical one, (remembering Pius X's *Motu Proprio* from last week,) how does all of this sit with you? Remember, even though they may seem "outdated," papal encyclicals and documents are still in effect. Does this change your desire to sing or not to sing in Mass? Why or why not? I hope this sparks some interesting conversation this week!

Adapted Examen: Begin with the Sign of the Cross Prayer. Ask for the intercession of a Saint.

1. Shine your light upon me Lord. Help me pray and give thanks with my whole heart.

2. I thank you for this day. How did you bless me today? Help me to remember the things that made me happy today. (Each person share what you are grateful/happy for.)

3. **I am truly sorry for hurtful choices.** Help me to see how I made choices that were hurtful to others and to you Lord. (Was there a time I did not share, said hurtful words, or did not help.)

4. **Help me with my day tomorrow.** Jesus, help me to be the person you want me to be. I know you are always by my side. Jesus I trust you with my tomorrow! St. Hyacinth may I be like you, more reverent and respectful to my faith. In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

When an object is blessed, it is set apart for God and prayer. As a sign of reverence, we never put a blessed object on the floor, or in the garbage, even if it is broken.
