Answer: e. Judas Maccabeus (for his story see Biblical Terminology below). The other choices are rather well known figures except for Silas/Silvanus. His story I will also share under Biblical Terminology.

- · I am the mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
- · I am the simple parish priest who was tormented by the devil because my great sanctity brought my people closer to God.

Remember, match the name with the brief description.

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible</u>

Dictionary, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Judas Maccabeus – the third of five sons of Mattathias. After Antiochus IV Epiphanes polluted the Temple in 167 B.C. ("the abomination that makes desolate") Mattathias moved with his family to Modein (1 Macc. 2:1-14). When officials of Antiochus sought to force Mattathias and his family to apostatize, Mattathias rose up in defense of the law and the covenant, killed an officer, and led his sons into the wilderness in revolt (1 Macc. 2:15-48). Upon the death of his father, Judas successfully led Israel in numerous battles against the Syrians. He defeated a combined army of Syrians and Samaritans, after which the Temple was purified. Judas continued to lead Israel in battle with great success, liberating Jews from surrounding territories and even making a treaty with Rome. Finally, against a Syrian army led by Bacchides, Judas fell in battle in 160 B.C.

Silas/Silvanus – generally regarded as alternate names for the same person, Silas/Silvanus was a leader in the early church and an associate of Paul. The Letters of Paul and 1 Peter refer to him as Silvanus but Acts prefers Silas. According to Acts 15:22-35, Silas and Judas Barsabbas, prophets in the Jerusalem church, were sent along with Paul and Barnabas to take the apostolic decrees from the Jerusalem conference to the church in Antioch. Silas's background was probably similar to that of Barnabas and John Mark, and it was thus perhaps no accident that they encountered one another more than once in early Christian history. For example, when Paul and Barnabas at Antioch quarreled over Mark, Paul chose Silas to accompany him on a mission tour of Asia Minor and ultimately into Macedonia and Achaia. Silas (Silvanus) is mentioned in the Letters of Paul (1 Thess. 1:1; 2 Thess. 1:1; 2 Cor. 1:19) and in 1 Peter (5:12). Except in 2 Cor. 1:19, he is connected with the writing of the Letters. He is either a coauthor (in the case of Paul) or a secretary or courier (in the case of 1 Peter). Certainly Silas was an important figure in the churches in Macedonia (Acts 18:18 suggests that he may have remained in Macedonia when Paul left) and may have been regarded as an apostle (1 Thess. 2:6). His early connections with the church in Jerusalem were no doubt helpful in giving added theological legitimacy to the Pauline mission. Silas's Roman citizenship, reported in Acts 16:37-38, would also have been of considerable personal help to Paul on his travels.

Liturgical Ministry - Sacristans, Altar Guild and Pew Police

A few weeks ago Father Schuster invited everyone to fill out a *Connections Form* with your current information (who you are, where you live, how we can reach you) along with your interest in volunteering for different ministries and activities within the parish community. As the Director of Liturgy and RCIA I also want to extend an invitation to you to consider how you might serve this community as a Liturgical Minister. Here are some opportunities that you may not be aware of.

Sacristans work behind the scenes preparing the bread, wine, vessels and liturgical books used at Mass and then cleaning the vessels after. The number of hosts and the amount of wine prepared depends on the number of people at Mass. The sacristan, after preparing a certain number of hosts for the Mass, counts the number of people in attendance so that hosts can be added or removed from the offertory plates before they are presented at the altar. This may seem like a strange detail to attend to, but ideally, a person attending Mass should receive Holy Communion from what has been presented at the offertory and consecrated at the Mass they are attending. So the job of a sacristan, while behind the scenes, plays an important role in our celebration at the Eucharistic table.

Members of the **Altar Guild** clean the vessels after daily Mass and care for the linens and altar clothes used at Mass. A purificator is a special cloth used at Mass to clean the vessels and wipe the rim of the Communion Cup. It is labeled with a red cross. Purificators and other linens that come in contact with the Body and Blood of Christ, are first rinsed in water before being laundered. The purpose of this rinse is to remove any remnants of the Body and Blood of Christ. The rinse water is poured directly into the ground in a special sink called a sacrarium (consecrated items are either buried or burned). After this rinse, the linens can be laundered as usual.

Pew Police are the folks who help clean up the pews after Mass. Whenever worship aides are used at a liturgy (weddings, funerals, Liturgy of the Hours) or envelopes and cards handed out - one or two or three or more always show up in the book holders in the pews. Sometimes they are scrunched into the bottom, sometimes they end up on the floor. The Pew Police help to straighten up the book racks and the pews so that our place of worship is welcoming and inviting for everyone. They see to it that hymnals are available in every pew and that kneelers and chairs are safe to use.

These ministry opportunities are open to families and individuals in high school and older. All involve some training. Fill out the Connections Form and give me a call. I am happy to show you what happens behind the scenes.

Musical Musings from Joy

Thinking back to last week's insights, what are everyone's thoughts regarding musical

active participation? Do you sing, or not sing, in Mass? Are you inspired to sing any more (or less!) than you already do?

Whether or not you regularly sing along, I challenge each and every one of you to pick up the hymnal and turn to the songs the next time you're at Mass. For those of you that already are - fantastic! For those of you that aren't, consider prayerfully following along. You may even surprise yourself and start singing!

Here's this week's thought: *In the 1950s, the Roman Catholic* Church was on the brink of reform. Local permissions began to be adopted on a universal level. Indeed, they underwent a domino effect as soon as they began. For example, "in 1953, permission was granted for the evening Mass throughout the whole Church; vernacular hymns during Mass were granted universal permission in 1955, along with the universal restoration of the Holy Week Rites; and in 1957, a shorter Eucharistic fast was promulgated for the universal Church." As recently called for in Mediator Dei, these reforms encouraged more active participation from the people.

These changes were also instrumental in uniting the body of Roman Catholic worshipers at the liturgical level. Particularly, this modification of Holy Week had a powerful impact on congregations: "The revision was made with the intention of bringing the laity back to an active participation in the solemn lituray of Holy Week, which had almost become the preserve of the clergy and which had little significance for the handful of the faithful who managed to attend."2 For many modern-day Catholics, Holy Week is considered the pinnacle of the Liturgical Year, which is likely a direct result of these 1950s Holy Week reforms.

Especially in light of the upcoming change in the last Sunday Mass here in Rochester, what do you think about evening Mass only being permitted from the 1950s onward? Or, can anyone imagine Holy Week before the revisions at this time? What about for those that remember it firsthand? I can't wait to hear your thoughts!


