Biblical Terminology We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is Harper's Bible Dictionary, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Calvary – the site of Jesus' crucifixion. Three Gospels record

both the Semitic name of this site, "Golgotha," and a translation, "Place of the Skull" (Matthew 27:33; Mark 15:22; John 19:17). Luke 23:33 records only a shorter and more accurate translation, "Skull." The name "Calvary" derives from the Latin translation of this word (calvaria). It is likely that the site was so named because of its habitual use for executions. Less likely is an explanation rooted in the physical appearance of the place. Apart from the name very little is confidently known about Calvary. John 19:20 and Jewish and Roman execution customs indicate that it was located outside Jerusalem's city walls. Roman crucifixion customs and the reference to passers-by (Matthew 27:39) also suggest it was near a thoroughfare, while the fact that the cross was visible from afar (Matthew 27:55) could indicate an elevated location. Nevertheless its precise location remains in dispute.

Liturgical Ministry – Lectors and Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion

A few weeks ago Father Schuster invited everyone to fill out a *Connections Form* with your current information (who you are, where you live, how we can reach you) along with your interest in volunteering for different ministries and activities within the parish community. We are starting to put your information into our data base, so if you haven't yet filled out a form, please do so. I also want to take this opportunity as the Director of Liturgy and RCIA to extend my invitation to you to consider how you might serve this community as a Liturgical Minister. Here are some opportunities you might consider:

Lectors proclaim the scriptures readings – sharing the stories of our ancestors in faith and reading the letters written by the apostles to the early Church. These are the story of salvation, the story of GOD'S great love for us. The early church passed on these stories by word of mouth, and as the lectors stand at the ambo – they are continuing this tradition. A lector prepares for their ministry by reading the scriptures. I often suggest that if it is your turn to read on Sunday – read the readings the Sunday before – for the first time. Carry the reading with you (in your thoughts and in your heart) into the week. Make it your own. If it resonates with you, rejoice in that. If you struggle with what is says, pray about it. Every lector here at Resurrection receives a workbook to help in their preparation. The workbook contains the readings for all Sundays and Holy Days, gives the context for the reading and a pronunciation guide.

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion help to distribute the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful. What an intimate moment, to stand in front of another person, to look them in the eye holding the consecrated host or the communion cup and proclaim "The Body of Christ" or "The Blood of Christ." What we proclaim, is what we believe, is what we become. Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion can also be called on to visit the homebound – those brothers and sisters of our faith community who cannot join us at Mass. When we go to them, we share with them the scripture readings that were proclaimed at Mass, we pray the prayers of the faithful with them, and after praying the Our Father – share Holy Communion with them. Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion must be Confirmed Catholics.

If either of these opportunities interest you, or any of the other Liturgical Ministries, please fill out a Connections Form and give me a call.

Musical Musings from Joy

What did everyone think about the history of evening Mass last week? What about your

thoughts on Holy Week? What Mass do you usually attend? What if an evening Mass wasn't an option for you? Or, what if the Easter Vigil wasn't?

If you've never gone to a Vigil Mass, I encourage you to try it when your schedule permits. There is something really beautiful about the darkness surrounding us outside while the light of Christ shines in the Church.

Here's this week's thought: Of the many reforms in the Second Vatican Council, the ones concerning call for active participation are most often highlighted. In the pinnacle liturgical document, Sacrosanctum Concilium, Article 14 states: "Mother Church earnestly desires that all the faithful should be led to that fully conscious, and active participation in liturgical celebrations which is demanded by the very nature of the liturgy." It was a concept that did not require much argument in order to be included. As seen particularly in the reforms of the 1950s, "that 'active participation' was not the subject of extensive debate is due to the fact that, by the time of the Council, it had already had a long history in the liturgical movement and had been regularly employed in papal documents."² The topic of debate and conversation, however, became concerned with the new term: "fully conscious." By adding this phrase, the writers of Sacrosanctum Concilium concisely summarized all the preceding scholarship on the subject. Yet, while active participation remained, how it was to be implemented was open to interpretation.

As we move into more "familiar" territory, (Vatican II), I pose you this question: What is YOUR interpretation of "fully conscious, and active participation"? How do you fully, consciously, and actively participate in the Mass? What makes you feel like you can, or cannot, participate in this way? I can't wait to hear your thoughts pour forth!
