

For the week ahead, I am going to provide you with ten more statements on the 12 apostles. Your work is to determine whether the statement is true or false.

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is Harper's Bible Dictionary, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Camel's Hair - type of material for clothing mentioned only in Matthew 3:4 and Mark 1:6. John the Baptist wore clothing made of camel's hair, a common form of dress in the Middle East even today...Some scholars link Elijah's "garment of haircloth" (2 Kings 1:8), a sign of his prophet office (Zechariah 13:4), with John's camel's hair garment, thereby identifying Elijah as John's prototype.

Cana – a village of Galilee, mentioned only in the Gospel of John as the site of Jesus' wedding feast miracle (John 2:1-11), of the long-distance healing of the Capernum official's son (John 4:46-54), and as the home of Nathanael (John 21:2).

Nathanael – One of the chosen disciples of Jesus mentioned only in John's Gospel; brought to Jesus by Philip (John 1:43-51; cf. 21:2). Described by Jesus as "an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile." Nathanael is characterized as resolute in his devotion and piety to God. Nathanael's confession is exemplary: "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" Nathanael is also noted, however, for his earlier scornful question, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Because his name is absent from the apostolic lists in the other Gospels and Acts, many scholars have identified him with one or another of those listed, most commonly Bartholomew.

Thanksgiving Gratitude

Thanksgiving Day may be observed with a special Mass at Catholic churches throughout the United States. The day is a secular holiday with strong religious roots. On this day we give "thanks" for the many graces and blessings that we have a received from GOD, and what better way to celebrate this feast, than to join in prayer at the table of the Lord, for the very word "eucharist" means "thanksgiving".

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) chooses what days occur on the liturgical calendar for this country and have included Thanksgiving Day as an *Optional Memorial*. This means that parishes are not *obliged* to observe the day with special prayers for Thanksgiving and may celebrate whatever weekday Mass would otherwise fall on this day. This year, November 23 is also the Optional Memorial of *Pope St. Clement I, St. Columban and Blessed Miguel Agustín Pro*.

The ROMAN MISSAL (the big red book the Presiders pray from during Mass) offers prayers for every Sunday of the year, all the Solemnities and Feasts, and every day during the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. On the weekdays, if the day is designated as a Memorial for a saint, the Missal will offer special prayers to that saint. There are also special prayers for special occasions...like Thanksgiving.

We give you thanks, O Lord, for the fruits that the earth has given to benefit the human family and we pray that, as the working of your supreme providence has produced them, so you may cause the seed of justice and the fruits of charity to spring up in our hearts.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. AMEN.

So, how do YOU fully, consciously, and actively participate in the Mass? This week, we start exploring some interpretations of this often-debated phrase from the Council Fathers.

Whether or not music is your way to fully, consciously, and actively participate in the Mass, I do hope it makes an effect on your prayer life. I challenge each of you to find some time to tap me an email or seek me out and let me know if you think the music at weekend liturgies helps to enable this or not. (Feel free to be honest!)

Here's this week's thought: *Though commentators* disagree as to how active participation was to be understood in Sacrosanctum Concilium, one significant way in which it could be realized is through liturgical intelligibility. Gelineau offers a succinct explanation: "The whole liturgical reform was based on active and conscious participation, that is to say the intelligibility of the rites and the results we are aware of them having on us."1 Therefore, in order to be fully conscious and active within the liturgy, the liturgy itself must be comprehensible to those participating in it. Moreover, this is a reciprocal relationship, as those who are participating need to be aware of what is going on. This puts full responsibility for active participation on both the religious and the laity. No longer is it a question of one working to serve the other. Instead, it is the responsibility of both parties.

Interesting! How do you find liturgical intelligibility to be here at Resurrection? Can you recall a Mass where you didn't understand what was going on or being said? Have you ever attended Mass in a different language? (Even Latin!) Can you hear the music? The cantor? Do you understand the words we sing? Feel free to include these thoughts in your emails to and conversations with me!
