

Biblical Terminology

We continue our work of defining words and names from the pages of the Bible. My source for this is <u>Harper's Bible Dictionary</u>, Harper & Row Publishers, Copyright 1985.

Chaff – the covering of the grain removed during the process of winnowing. Nearly all references in the Hebrew Bible are to chaff blown in the wind (Job 13:25; Hosea 13:3; Daniel 2:35). In the New Testament it is what is burned as worthless "with unquenchable fire" after the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit has gathered the wheat into the granary (Matthew 3:12; Luke 3:17).

Winnowing – the process by which threshed grain is separated from chaff, the extraneous, nonedible stalks and husks (Ruth 3:2). In the ancient Holy Land, the threshed grain and chaff was placed on a flat open surface, piled on a cloth, a wide but shallow basket, or a sieve. It was then raked or thrown into the air where the brisk afternoon wind removed the lighter chaff (cf. Psalm 1:4). The heavier grain dropped back to the ground and was gathered. The threshed and winnowed grain was then ready for use or storage in granaries. The same procedures are still used in many places in the Near East today. John the Baptist used the process of winnowing as a metaphor for divine judgment (Luke 3:17).

Granary – a storage facility for threshed and winnowed grains such as wheat and barley. The facility ranged in size and format from an entire building of rooms or compartments to plastered or unplastered pits or silos to individual jars or containers. The presence of large granary structures in the ancient Near East implies a surplus production of wheat to guard against famine years as well as some type of organized system for redistribution of the grain (see Jeremiah 50:26; Matthew 3:12).

Church of the Resurrection and Channel One are serving about 100 students at Ben Franklin Elementary with extra food items to have over the weekends when children are not in school. We are very appreciative to the committees who pack the bags of food each week. In November over a period of two weeks, our friends at St. Francis School did a food drive for this program collecting boxed potatoes, stuffing, canned vegetables, and fruits. These items were added to the food bags to help with the students at Thanksgiving. Thank you St. Francis students! Items were also donated to St. Vincent de Paul. The donation of food is an on-going ministry. Ben Franklin has a food shelf where students in need may ask for extra food to take home during the week. Winter gear: We have been keeping up with the requests of winter coats, hats, and gloves, due to the donations received last year during Almsgiving. Keep in mind if you have gently used winter outerwear and boots, we would be happy to take them. Parishioners, thank you for all of your continued support to this ministry. Communal Sacrament of Reconciliation

Father Schuster reminded us last week at Mass that Jesus **will** come. It is not a possibility but a certainty. One way to prepare for Christ's coming is to make a place for him in our hearts. We do this by looking into our hearts and seeing those things that we need to let go of in order to make room for love – to make room for Christ. The Sacrament of Reconciliation helps us to do this. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a healing sacrament, one that we can receive many times – and we should - for this is our encounter with the mercy and forgiveness of GOD.

Sin breaks relationships – between us and GOD and with each other. Sinners (me) hide in the shadows. We don't like who we are and we don't want others to see (pride). When we seek forgiveness – we bring our sin into the light of GOD. Then we are able to see again in the light of love. If you have not received this Sacrament for a while, Advent is a great time to get back into the habit. The Church of the Resurrection will offer the *Communal Sacrament of Reconciliation* on Tuesday, December 12 at 6:30 PM.

If you have not been to a Communal Sacrament of Reconciliation, this is what will happen:

Gathering Rite: We gather in the Church and begin with a song. Father greets us, welcomes us and prays for our healing in the Sacrament.

Scripture Readings: We hear a reading from the New Testament, sing a psalm and listen to the Gospel.

Homily: Father opens up the scriptures for our understanding.

Examination of Conscience: We reflect on our love for God and love for our neighbor.

Rite of Reconciliation: We recite the Confiteor and pray for God's mercy in a penitential litany. Individual confession and absolution follows.

There will be 10-12 priests available to hear confessions so the time commitment will be the same as Sunday Mass. Our children who will be making their First Holy Communion in the spring will also be present to celebrate their First Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is a powerful witness to come together as a community to receive this sacrament for we are all sinners. Let us not stumble in the darkness, let us walk together in the light of GOD.

To reiterate our last questions, has anyone ever experienced a rite or "difference" in the

Mass from what you're used to? What was it? Did it hinder or help your prayer? How about music? Have you ever encountered multicultural music at Mass? Was it easy or difficult to pick up on?

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Sometimes, subtle differences can exist even between parishes. How about between Resurrection and another parish you've belonged to in your life? Which one is "right" and which one is "wrong"? What if I were to tell you they're likely both RIGHT? The beauty of our postconciliar Church is that these "differences" don't have to be perceived as wrong – just as a different way of doing things!

Here's this week's thought: Though not all agree, the official inclusion of the call for active participation in Sacrosanctum Concilium has forever changed the shape of the Church. On the whole, "the promotion of active participation was largely accepted and taken for granted, though it was joyfully recognized as a significant dimension of the document. For instance, Cardinal Spellman of New York supported the need for the active participation of the laity in the Mass, though Cardinal McIntyre of Los Angeles was a dissenting voice when, late in the debate, he commented that 'Active participation of the faithful in the Mass is nothing but a distraction."¹

Though there are many judgments about Sacrosanctum Concilium, it cannot be denied that "the ultimate purpose of the council is the conscious participation and active insertion of the people of God in the worship life of the Church."² Therefore, no matter what one's understanding of "fully conscious, and active participation" may be, it cannot be denied that the intentions of the Council were to enrich the lives of the entire worshipping body of the Church, both lay and religious. Through the intercession of the Holy Spirit, it is desirable to act as one body in all liturgical celebrations.

Do you find active participation a distraction? When does participating become "too much"? Musically, are there ever times you feel that you are being taken away from the Mass because of those around you? Or yourself? Or the cantor/choir/ instrumentalists/director? This passage closes our discussion of the historical timeline of active participation. Next week, we'll move on to bolder topics!


