

Weekly Words from The Rock

<u>Editorial</u>

In an article within <u>The Wanderer</u> (December 20, 2012), James Drummey speaks of the letters in the word "Christmas" and the meaning of each. Last week, we looked at the letters C,H,R,I,S. They are:

C is for the Christ Child, born on Christmas Day.

H for herald angels in the night.

R means our Redeemer.

I means Israel.

S is for the star that shone so bright.

We look at the final letters this week.

T is for three wise men, they who traveled far: The Bible doesn't mention that there were three wise men, but it does mention three gifts (gold, frankincense, and myrrh), and tradition gives the men the names Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. Although they were often identified as kings, the three were probably astrologers who studied the heavens for signs and observed a celestial event that caused them to travel a long distance, perhaps from Arabia or Persia. They actually visited the Christ Child in a house (cf. Matthew 2:11) and, after being warned in a dream not to report back to King Herod, they returned to their homes by another route.

M is for the manger where He lay: In the book and video entitled The Three Trees, one of the trees growing on the mountainside dreams of being made someday into a beautiful chest that will hold a great treasure. But instead the tree is made into a feed trough for animals and is terribly discouraged until one night a beautiful woman placed a newborn Baby in the trough. Then the tree realizes that his dream has come true, for he is holding the greatest treasure of all, the Son of God. The lesson is that God has a plan for all of us, one that we cannot even imagine.

A is for all He stands for: The key word here is "all." Ask some people what Jesus stands for, and they will produce His message to "be good" and "don't be judgmental." In fact, however, Jesus said that being good meant keeping the Ten Commandments.

He condemned "evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly" as sins that come from within and defile a person (Mark 7:21-23). He said that unless we eat His Body and drink His Blood, we will not gain eternal life (cf. John 6:53); that those who fail to help their needy brothers and sisters will be cast "into the eternal fire prepared for the Devil and his angels" (Matthew 25:41); and that those who live and believe in Him will also rise from the dead on the last day.

S is for the shepherds that came: Shepherds were near the bottom rung of society in Jesus' time, so it would have seemed inconceivable to the upper classes that the first announcement of the Messiah would be made to this lowly group. But Jesus often did the unexpected thing. He is the Good Shepherd who seeks first the lost sheep of Israel, who leaves the 99 sheep and searches for the one who was lost, who acts as a shepherd at the Last Judgment in separating the sheep from the goats, and who identifies Himself as the gate through which the sheep, i.e., those seeking salvations, must pass.

The Celebration of Christmas Continues...

Today we celebrate the **Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord**. Traditionally, the date is January 6 (the day on which it is still celebrated in the Eastern churches) but for us, it is transferred to a Sunday so that more of the faithful can celebrate the message and meaning. A tradition associated with this day is the blessing of the home. A piece of chalk is used to write an inscription on the inside lintel above the front door. The series of numbers, letters and crosses changes slightly from year to year. The inscription for this year looks like this:

20+C+M+B+18

- The *four digits* designate the year (2018) and appear at the beginning and end of the line. Since Epiphany comes so near the beginning of the New Year, the numbers represent an annual renewal of GOD'S blessing.
- The *letters* have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the magi: *Caspar, Melchior* and *Balthasar*. They also abbreviate the Latin words *"Christus mansionem benedicat."* which translates *"May Christ bless the house."* These letters recall the day on which the inscription is made (Epiphany), as well as the purpose of the blessing (to bless the house).
- The *crosses* between the digits and the letters represent Christ, whom we invoke, and the saintliness of the magi.
- The inscription is made above the *front door*, so that all who enter and depart this year may enjoy GOD'S blessing.
- Since the month of January still bears the name of the Roman god *Janus*, this blessing adds a Christian dimension to the traditional observance of the first month.

The inscription is made of *chalk*, a product of clay, which recalls the human nature taken by GOD'S eternal Word, Jesus Christ.

At the end of Mass today, we will bless chalk, invoking GOD'S grace and protection on those who use this chalk to mark their homes. Every family is invited to take one piece of chalk along with the instructions and prayers for blessing the home.

Tomorrow, January 8 is the **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord** – the last day in the Christmas Season. Thank you to *everyone* who gave their time and talent to create an experience of worship that was welcoming and prayerful: sacristans, lectors, ushers, greeters, decorators, star makers, musicians, singers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and you – the faithful that is the Church of the Resurrection.

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Has anyone been paying a bit more attention to the *Gloria* this Christmas season? What do you think about this reminder of Christ's birth at Mass? Do you find the *Gloria* too long? Are you able to recite it without looking? There are two predominant types of *Gloria*'s being sung in the new translation – through-composed and refrainbased. Those that are through-composed do not go back to the *Glory to God* refrain (e.g., *Mass of Renewal*); the refrain-based ones do (e.g., *Mass of Joy & Peace*). Do you think it's currently too long? Should composers only be attempting to do throughcomposed settings?

Now that we've discussed the most common musical elements of the introductory rites, I would like to reflect as a whole this week: Seemingly, there is a large amount of music called for in the introductory rites, even though the title suggests it is only preparatory for the rest, (and arguably more important parts,) of the Mass. However, "singing also fosters consciousness of community; indeed, in the context of worship, it is already a communal action."¹ Therefore, the various songs, chants, acclamations, and hymns interwoven throughout the Introductory Rites underscore the desire to bring the congregation together in a meaningful way. However, there are pastoral considerations to keep in mind, as well. The joint singing of an entrance hymn, the choral singing of a sprinkling rite, the acclamation of a Kyrie litany, and the joyful hymn of Gloria in excelsis can inevitably last for several minutes, therefore markedly lengthening the Mass. It is here that an acute pastoral sense must be exercised in order to help decide what is best for a particular church or congregation: "In all attempts at reform... what is important is pastoral awareness, that is to say, a psychological sensitivity towards the degree of openness of the parish in question. What is good and acceptable in one parish may do harm in another."² For instance, such a lengthy opening may be quite normal in a large American parish, whereas, in an Irish country parish, it could be met with some resistance.

What do you think? Certainly, if all of these musical elements were sung in one Mass, it would lengthen the introductory rites significantly. Do you think such musical importance should be given to a "preparatory" part of the Mass? Why or why not? Would you like more or less singing during this point? Does where you worship really affect this? Feel free to share your thoughts!


