

Weekly Words from The Rock

Editorial

In an article within <u>The Wanderer</u> (December 20, 2012), James Drummey speaks of the letters in the word "Christmas" and the meaning of each. We will look at these over the next two weeks.

C is for the Christ Child, born on Christmas Day: The importance of this Child is indicated in the word "Christ," which is a Greek translation (*Christos*) of the Hebrew word *Messiah*, a title meaning "anointed one."

Throughout the Bible the anointing of a person with oil signified that the person was dedicated to God. A well-known example would be Samuel's anointing of the youthful David to be future king of Israel, "and from that day on, the spirit of the Lord rushed upon David" (1 Samuel 16:13). That same Spirit was upon Jesus from the time of His birth in Bethlehem (also the birthplace of David) and would manifest Himself on such occasions as the Baptism of the Lord in the River Jordan (cf. Matthew 3:16) and His temptation by Satan in the desert (cf. Luke 4:1).

H is for herald angels in the night: Angels have played a major role in salvation history. Among their many appearances in the Old Testament, they visited Abraham (Genesis 18), led Moses and the Israelites to the Red Sea and protected them from the pursuing Egyptians (Exodus 14), and struck down 185,000 Assyrians

(Isaiah 37:36). So, too, in the New Testament, angels accompanied Jesus from the Incarnation to the Ascension, first heralding His birth to the shepherds in the fields near Bethlehem and singing, "Glory to God in the highest/and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests (Luke 2:14). Angels were also active in the early Church and guard and guide us still.

R means our Redeemer: Even over the idvllic scene in that cave in Bethlehem there was the shadow of the cross, the symbol of our redemption. One of the gifts presented to the Christ Child was myrrh, a burial ointment. What an odd gift for a baby, unless the Baby was destined to give His life for the salvation of the world. The Child's name would be Iesus, the Angel Gabriel told Mary (cf. Luke 1:31), a name that means "Savior." And forty days after His birth, an old man named Simeon told the Blessed Mother that her Son would be a sign of contradiction and that a sword of sorrow would piece her heart (cf. Luke 2:34-35).

I means Israel: Ever since the triumphant reign of David (1010-970), Israel had been waiting for a descendant of David who would restore Israel to its former glory. Many at the time of Jesus were expecting a political/military leader who would overthrow the hated Romans, so they did not recognize Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah, even though He alone fulfilled all the prophecies from the Old Testament. He was, for example, descended from the "stump of Jesse" (Isaiah 11:1), born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:1), worshiped by kings bearing gifts (Psalm 72:10), betrayed for thirty pieces of silver (Zechariah 11:12-13), and "pierced for our offenses, crushed for our sins"

(Isaiah 53:5). God had established a covenant with Israel, but that covenant would not be completely fulfilled until the coming of Christ, who would establish a new and everlasting covenant.

S is for the star that shone so bright: While the mystery of the bright star that led the Magi to Bethlehem may never be completely solved, there is astronomical evidence of a confluence of planets at the time of Jesus' birth that could have produced a star bright enough to guide the Magi hundreds of miles to Bethlehem. Or the star could have been the miraculous intervention of God.

Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

Today's feast has been on the Church calendar for about one hundred years, often on different dates. It is a "devotional" or "idea" feast that was inaugurated by Holy Family associations. Everything we know about the Holy Family (which is not much) comes from the Gospel accounts. So what does it mean to be "holy"? Here is a reflection from the book *Living Liturgy* published by Liturgical Press.

To be "holy" means to be consecrated, that is, set apart for a purpose. We find facets of that purpose in today's gospel: to be a family who lives by God's law; to be a man who keeps his eyes open for the Christ no matter how long the wait; to be a woman who speaks a word of hope to those who have lost hope. Next week, we see an image of that purpose in the wise men who follow the signs of the times in search of Christ. Finally, at the end of the Christmas season, we will see the fullness of that purpose in Christ as he is baptized in the Jordan.

Because the Feast of the Holy Family coincides with New Year's Eve, this reflection and Simeon's canticle (found in today's Gospel) might be an inspiration to end the last day of 2017 with a simple liturgy called *Compline* or Night Prayer. This liturgy comes from the *Liturgy of the Hours*, also known as the Divine Office. The basic structure begins with a brief examination of conscience followed by a penitential act similar to what is said at Mass, and a psalm or two with a brief Scripture reading. The liturgy concludes with the singing or recitation of the Canticle of Simeon, also called the *Nunc Dimittis*. As we let go of the old year, Simeon's words invite us to reflect back on it to reveal how our eyes have seen GOD'S salvation.

From Night Prayer

Canticle of Simeon (Nunc Dimittis)

Lord, now you let your servant go in peace; your word has been fulfilled: my own eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of every people: a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel.

Monday, January 1st, is the **Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of GOD**. This year, the obligation to attend Mass has been lifted, but I can think of no better way to start a new year than to celebrate this, the oldest feast of Mary in the Church. On this day we honor Mary as *Theotokos* or "GOD-bearer". We, too, are called to be GOD-bearers: to give birth to GOD in every life he comes to enter and transform in his love and light. Our Mass on this Solemnity will be at 9:00 AM.

Psalm Refrain for January 1 - Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God (Psalm 67:2)

May GOD bless us in his mercy.

Psalm Refrain for January 7 - The Epiphany of the Lord (Psalm 72:11)

Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

Musical Musings from Mass Intentions

What are everyone's thoughts on the sung *Kyrie*? Did you recognize this addition? What

about the Greek? Any issues or comments there? Again, I'm really enjoying your feedback!

I challenge each of you to look up the three different ways the penitential rite may be done during Mass. Two of them are quite common, and there is one form that is not as common. You may be surprised when you look at the rubrics how they're all very similar, yet so different!

The next sung part of the Mass whose history we're going to discuss is the Gloria in excelsis: Historically, similar to the Introit, "it is not clear just when the Gloria was introduced into the Roman liturgy." The Gregorian chant settings of the Gloria in excelsis that still exist today would certainly be suggestive of this. However, there is still evidence that proposes a possible unknown history of the Gloria: "In the Apostolic Constitutions, the Gloria, with its numerous biblical citations, has a clear tripartite structure (three stanzas). In its traditional Latin form, however, it seems to lack a logical progression and to be unclear or, possibly, not fully developed. The Trinitarian scheme is very clear in the Greek prototype."² Therefore, there may actually have been intentions for the Gloria to be reformed in order to better represent its Greek model. However, there has been little reform of the Gloria in excelsis since Franco-Germanic times. In fact, the only reform of the Gloria was actually in practice and not in model or structure. Yet, one wonders if there had been further motives to make the Latin version of the hymn closer to its Greek forebear: "There would have been many advantages in rewriting the Latin hymn, but evidently the reform commission was unwilling to tamper with this...perhaps because of all the musical settings made for it from the period of Gregorian chant through the Palestrinian and classical periods down to the present time."3 If this was the case, though, it was not brought to realization during the times of Vatican II.

How interesting! Has anyone ever looked up the Greek translation of the *Gloria in excelsis*? Did you know that titular part of the hymn is based on what the angels sang to Jesus the morning he was born? Therefore, every time we sing the Gloria in Mass, it is as if we are recounting Christ's birth again and again! What do you think about this? Do you find the *Gloria* too long? Are you able to recite it without looking? I can't wait to hear your thoughts!


