Weekly Words from The Rock

Teaching

In The Catholic Servant, October 2017, Rachel Petruconis writes an article from a youth's perspective. I would like to share her article on "The Resurrected Body: Stronger, More Powerful, More Brilliant than Before."

"Every single Christian child at one point has asked, "Mom, what is Heaven going to be like?" And mom usually has a description about a place where everyone is with God, and everyone is happy. However, we know a bit more detail than this. Jesus' time on earth between the Resurrection and the Ascension, which St. Luke reports in chapter 24 of his Gospel, gives us a glimpse at what our characteristics will be like in heaven. The risen Jesus has a physical body.

He says to the Apostles, "Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have" (Luke 24:39). Jesus clearly shows that He still has a tangible human body even though he has risen from the dead.

Jesus also performs ordinary physical acts. Luke writes, "They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence" (Luke 24:44). This further proves that the risen Jesus is not a ghost, for a ghost would not be able to eat food.

Furthermore, Jesus' risen body is the same body he had before the resurrection. He tells his disciples to recognize him by "his hands and his feet" (Luke 24:40), presumably because his hands and feet still bear

the marks of the crucifixion. At the end of time, all of us will get our physical bodies back – not just any physical body, but the exact one that we had while we lived on earth, but in a perfected form.

Although Jesus' body is physical, it also has metaphysical powers. Jesus can vanish and appear at will. After breaking bread with the disciples in Emmaus, "he (Jesus) vanished from their sight" (Luke 24:31). He also "appeared to Simon" (Luke 24:34) during the same day he was with the disciples at Emmaus. Later that evening, "Jesus stood among them [the apostles]" (Luke 24:36). This language of vanishing and appearing is only used to describe the risen Jesus. It is called *agility:* the ability to move at the speed of thought. Similar to this is the property of subtlety, meaning that we will be free of any physical restraints. This is how Jesus was able to walk through locked doors and the sealed entrance to his own tomb.

Impassibility is the quality most parents teach their young children: no pain, suffering, or death. No paper cuts, no depression, no loss of loved ones. Our physical bodies will be happy the same way our souls will be. Jesus gives us a slight hint of this in Luke's gospel:

Jesus' risen body remains somehow unaffected by physical labor. Jesus walks for about "seven miles" (Luke 24:13) on the road to Emmaus, yet when he arrives at the village he "walks as if he were going on" (Luke 24:28). This might mean that Jesus was not worn-out by the walk to Emmaus, hinting that his risen strength is stronger than an ordinary human body.

Another characteristic of the glorified body is called *clarity*. Even before his resurrection, Jesus manifests this quality to Peter, James and John at the Transfiguration: "As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightening" (Luke 9:29). Jesus emits a luminous glow that is unlike anything seen on earth.

The gospel reports about Jesus after the resurrection offer a glimpse into Jesus' glorified state. The risen Jesus retains the physical body he had before the resurrection, but with new, metaphysical abilities. In the same way, we will get our own bodies back, but stronger, more powerful, more brilliant than ever before.

Ash Wednesday (February 14)

Ash Wednesday begins our Lenten journey. The norms regarding fasting and abstaining are as follows;

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

The Lenten Season

Ash Wednesday is this Wednesday, February 14 - the beginning of our annual Lenten retreat. We will have Mass with Distribution of Ashes at 8:30 AM and 7:00 PM. Ash Wednesday is our overture for Lent. On this day we get a glimpse of what our Lenten journey will look like prayer, fasting and almsgiving. We gather to remember that we "are dust and to dust we shall return" not as a put down but as a reminder that



it is GOD who breathes life into us and sustains us. The word "discipline" and "disciple" come from the same root word, which means "follower". To be a disciple (follower) of Christ means to practice discipline (following).

One of the great prayer disciplines of the Lenten season is the **Stations of the Cross**. This year we will pray the Stations of the Cross as a community on Friday evenings at 6:00 PM followed by a simple soup supper. Different groups in the parish have been invited to host these Friday evenings by leading the stations and providing dinner. If you are interested in hosting a Friday evening Stations/Soup please contact me at the parish office.

Vespers, also called **Evening Prayer**, is part of the Liturgy of the Hours - the Divine Office. In the Liturgy of the Hours, the Church fulfills Jesus' command to "pray always". Through this prayer, the people of GOD sanctify the day by continual praise of GOD and prayers of intercession for the needs of the world. Bishops, priests, deacons, and many men and women in consecrated life pray the Liturgy of the Hours each day. Their work is organized around this prayer, keeping GOD always at the center of their days. Lay people are encouraged to pray the Liturgy of the Hours as well, especially Morning and Evening Prayer. We will pray **Evening Prayer** every Sunday during Lent at 5:30 PM. If you have never prayed this prayer before come and experience this communal prayer of the Church. If you normally pray this prayer alone, come and pray it in community. All are welcome.

As you begin your Lenten journey, be sure to pick up a Little Black Book for the season of Lent. This daily reflection book will walk us through the Passion according to Mark. It also offers a variety of timely quotes, suggestions and information. We will also have weekly bookmarks with a prayer for the week, almsgiving opportunities and an RCIA prayer card for two very special people - Jackie and Sophia Klein - who will receive the Easter Sacraments this year at the Easter Vigil! More about Jackie and Sophia next week....

Musical Musings from Joy

This week, I will transition into the Liturgy of the Word and discuss the musical elements that

make up that part of the Mass. The most obvious musical piece here is the Responsorial Psalm. Proclaimed by a Cantor, this musical element existed in worship long before Christ's coming. The Psalms are poems of praise. It was the prayer book that Iesus used throughout his life. In fact, even while he was dving, Jesus' final prayers came from the Book of Psalms. The Psalms teach us how to bring our own life story before God, which includes both the good and the bad, the thanksgiving and the lament. Especially in the history and struggles of the Israelites as depicted in the Psalms, some might recoil against their startling honesty. Therefore, the Psalms permit us to use words we would likely not dare to say out loud ourselves. The use of the Responsorial Psalm in the Mass "is an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word [and] has great liturgical and pastoral importance, since it fosters meditation on the Word of God." (GIRM 61) They have been an important part of Christian worship since the early days of Christianity, and their continued use is an echo to that past and tradition.

Last week, I shared an image that depicted a strange-looking musical setting of Psalm 147. As it turns out, musical notation in the mid-centuries was actually quite advanced for its time. Since modern recording technology did not exist, the Psalms were passed down both orally and aurally from Cantor-to-Cantor from the early centuries onward. Eventually, this rudimentary form of musical notation came about that helped Cantors learn the music just by looking at it. However, memory and the ear were still relied on very heavily, and the notation turned out to be more of a "memory jog" than anything. It was not until the 19th century when a group of French monks at the Abbey of Solesmes, led by Dom Guéranger, began trying to decipher the several hundredsyear-old manuscripts to understand what the notation meant. While they did come up with a solution, there are still debates amongst scholars as to how "correct" the interpretations are. (What our ears associate as Gregorian chant is a result of their work.) Unfortunately, we will never know "for sure," meaning we have to trust the monks' instincts and prayerful enlightenment.

Solesmes' rediscovery of the Gregorian chant Responsorial Psalms paved the way for their use in the Mass during the first half of the 20th century. After Vatican II, vernacular Psalms began to be composed and used regularly. Next week, I will spend some time discussing the structure and composition of these Psalms that are most familiar to our modern ears.

Hymnal Scavenger Hunt. How'd you do with last week's Hymnal Scavenger Hunt? It was *Fresh as the Morning*, which can be found in your red hymnal at #507. *Here's this week's clue*: This song is based on *Psalm 34* and reminds us that the *Lord* hears the *call of the needy*. It was written by *John Foley*, one of the St. Louis *Jesuits! Hint:* This song may be found in both hymnals.




