<u>Fasting and Abstaining Procedures</u> <u>for Lent</u>


Ash Wednesday begins our Lenten journey. The norms regarding fasting and abstaining are as follows:

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics.

In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.



RCIA - Rite of Sending and Rite of Election

During the season of Lent, those of us who are already baptized into the life of Christ, spend this time practicing the good habits of praying, fasting and giving alms. We do this to remind ourselves of what it means to be disciples of Christ and to prepare ourselves, at Easter, to renew the promises that we made at baptism, or that were made for us.

For our catechumens - **Jackie and Sophia Klein** - this season of Lent is a time of final preparation for baptism at the Easter Vigil. It was the grace of GOD that motived them to inquire about baptism and this grace continues to be with them as they have learned about GOD'S great love for us in the stories of salvation history. The story has changed their lives. They are more open to the presence of GOD in their lives and they are eager to be called children of GOD - to walk as sisters of Christ. They have found strength in GOD'S grace and support in our community.

This weekend, at the 8:00 PM Mass, the community celebrates the **Rite of Sending** with Jackie and Sophia. In this rite we testify that Jackie and Sophia are indeed ready for the final weeks of preparation to receive the Sacraments of Initiation - Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil. From this community, we *send* them with our prayers and the promise of our continued support to Bishop Quinn - the Bishop of the Diocese of Winona.

Bishop Quinn receives these young women and other catechumens from across the diocese at a special liturgy called the Rite of Election which takes place on Sunday, February 18 at 3:00 PM at Queen of Angels in Austin. In this rite the bishop affirms that these catechumens have been chosen by GOD and are called to the Sacraments of Initiation. As a sign of commitment to GOD and the new life they will receive at baptism – the catechumens write their names in a special book called the Book of the Elect. To be elected means to be chosen by GOD. In this final time of preparation – we refer to Jackie and Sophia no longer as catechumens – but as The Elect.

All the baptized are GOD'S chosen people. In each of our lives, Christ continues his mission of bringing peace and light into the world. We do this in very simple ways - by living as Christ in our families and in all our daily interactions. The Elect are chosen not simply for the Sacraments of Initiation – but for mission - Christ's mission. Please take a *bookmark/prayer card* from the Gathering Space and spend this time of Lent praying for Jackie and Sophia, our Elect.

Musical Musings from loy

To begin, I want to alert you to some of the musical changes you'll hear and experience in

this season of Lent: We are putting the *Gloria in excelsis* aside and instead doing the same setting of the *Kyrie eleison*. Our Gospel Acclamation will also be changing to reflect the lack of the "A-word" in Mass. The response the entire season will be:

"Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory!"

You'll also notice quite a bit of repetition in the song choices. This is to mark the season's penitence, but also to let you pray more deeply with the hymns and songs that help make up this special time of journeying.

Last week, I gave you a historical context for the Responsorial Psalm. This week, I spend some time discussing the structure and composition of these Psalms that are most familiar to our modern ears.

There are two different versions of the Psalter (Book of Psalms), the **Hebrew (Masoretic)** and the **Greek Septuagint**. While both contain 150 Psalms, the divisional breaks are different, giving many of the same Psalms different numbers between the two. Though liturgical books generally follow the Greek numbering, the Hebrew numbering system is being increasingly used by Roman Catholics, especially for English translations of the Psalter. (Anglicans, Protestants, and Jews already use this system.) The Latin Vulgate also makes use of the Greek numbering. The difference in numbering means that most of the Greek numeration is one behind that of the Hebrew. For instance, the ever-popular Psalm 23, "The Lord is my Shepherd..." is Psalm 22 in the Greek numbering. American lectionaries make use of the Hebrew numbering system, whereas other English-language lectionaries would use the Greek.

Today, many English-language composers use the Hebrew numbering, even if they live outside of the United States, because they are more marketable to the "big" American publishers, as well as to other Christian denominations. Rarely will you find the Greek numbering system in an American hymnal. However, on a personal note, when I was studying composition during grad school in Ireland, I actually did have to make use of the Greek system – talk about confusing at times!

Next week, we will wrap up the discussion of the Responsorial Psalm by talking about the four different Psalm genres you hear used in the Mass.

Hymnal Scavenger Hunt: How'd you do with last week's Hymnal Scavenger Hunt? It was *The Cry of the Poor*, which can be found in your red hymnal at #33 and your green hymnal at #829. Here's this week's clue:

On **Wednesday**, we celebrated the start of **Lent**. This song is named exactly for the sacramental we received on our **foreheads** that day!

Hint: This song may be found in both hymnals.
