
Transformed Hearts

Fasting and Abstaining Procedures for Lent

Ash Wednesday begins our Lenten journey. The norms regarding fasting and abstaining are as follows;

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

Week Two: Family Promise Ministry assists homeless and low income families to become independent. We provide evening and overnight hosting, meals,

support child care and other various needs for the families in the program. We partner with Pax Christi and Holy Spirit parishes and host families four to five times per year; one week at a time (Pax Christi).

Our dates for 2018 are February 25th-March 4th; June 17th -June 24th; August 5th-August 12th; September 30th-October 7th.

This organization opened its doors to guests in March of 2001 and relocated to its current location in January of 2003. Family Promise Rochester, a 501(c)3 non-profit, is managed by an executive director and governed by a local board of directors.

Family Promise Rochester served 612 adults and children; had over 1,700 volunteers donate their time and were lucky enough to have 40 different Host Sites for our families in 2017. Gospel Readings During Lent

Every year, the Gospel reading for the Second Sunday of Lent is always the story of the Transfiguration of Jesus. This account is actually proclaimed two times every year - today and again on August 6, the Feast of the Transfiguration. Why does the Church proclaim the story of the Transfiguration during Lent? The Collect Prayer of the Mass provides an insight:

O GOD, who have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son, be pleased we pray, to nourish us inwardly by your word, that, with spiritual sight made pure, we may rejoice to behold your glory. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one GOD for ever and ever.

Cycle A Readings at Mass

Next week and for the following two Sundays (Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent) we will use the readings from Cycle A at Mass. The Church uses these readings whenever the Scrutinies are celebrated with the *Elect*.

Scrutinies are rites for self-searching and repentance that have a spiritual purpose. They are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective or sinful in the hearts of the elect; and to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong and good. The *Elect* (those who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil) have the intention of an intimate knowledge of Christ and his Church and are expected to progress in self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.

We celebrate three *Scrutinies* so that the Elect are gradually instructed about the mystery of sin, from which we all long to be delivered and so that their spirit is filled with Christ the Redeemer, who is living water (Gospel of the Samaritan woman in the first scrutiny), the light of the world (Gospel of the man born blind in the second scrutiny) and the resurrection and the life (Gospel of Lazarus in the third scrutiny). From the first to the last scrutiny, the Elect should progress in their perception of sin and their desire for salvation.

We will celebrate the *Scrutinies* with our Elect – Sophia and Jackie Klein – at the Saturday Night 8 PM Masses. In solidarity with them - we will use Cycle A readings at all the Masses on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent. We return to the readings from Cycle B on Palm Sunday.

> Psalm Refrain for March 4 -3rd Sunday of Lent (Psalm 95:8)

If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

Musical Musings from Joy

Last week, I gave you an overview of the two different versions of the Psalter. This week, I

want to spend some time on the four different Psalm genres used in the Mass.

The first Psalm genre encompasses the **Psalms of Lament**. These emotional Psalms ask God to heal and to save the afflicted from evil. They also implore God to listen to all suffering. Nearly one-third of the Psalms are Laments. Psalms of Lament are significant because they express a certain trust in God, even when He does not seem immediately present.

Example: Psalm 25 (Green Hymnal #28)

The second Psalm genre heard in Mass are the **Psalms of Thanksgiving**. These Psalms praise God in the form of worship for something He has already done. Thanksgiving Psalms are characterized by an immediate praise of God for this done deed and often has a tone of joy. Therefore, the Psalm of Thanksgiving is a response to God's action as asked for in a Psalm of Lament.

Example: Psalm 138 (Red Hymnal #74)

The next genre of Psalms are **Hymnic Psalms**. These Hymns explicitly praise God. They usually address the community and offer a reflection on what God has already done for the people. Therefore, the Hymnic Psalms are not expressed out of any one experience, but praise God for who He is because He is.

Example: Psalm 103 (Red Hymnal #59)

The final genre of Psalms are the **Royal Psalms**. These Psalms sing of the spiritual role of kings in their worship of God. The topics might include the king's coronation, a marriage, or even battles. No specific king is ever mentioned, but God's Kingship is touched upon in several Psalms. Therefore, the role of the earthly king is juxtaposed with the Heavenly King.

Example: Psalm 45 (Green Hymnal #46)

As an exercise, try to discern yourself from week-to-week what the genre of the Responsorial Psalm is. Why is that? How does it fit in with the readings? With the liturgical season? Do these Psalms evoke the genres they belong to? Why or why not? I would love to hear your thoughts on this!

Next week, I will round out talking about the Liturgy of the Word by giving background and information regarding the Gospel Acclamation.

When her parents both died and left her an orphan, St. Kateri asked to be baptized and then promised her life to God. Her non-Christian relatives made fun of her belief in God. but St. Kateri remained true to her faith. She journeyed over 200 miles on foot to a Christian settlement of Native Americans and lived the rest of her life there, praying for and serving the people. After her death, people prayed to her for help, and miracles were performed through her intercession. St. Kateri pray for us, that we may have the strength of God's grace and be pure and simple in our hearts, as you were. Amen.
