Weekly Words from The Rock

On the Second Sunday of Easter, we learned that on the first day of the week, after the crucifixion, the disciples had locked themselves together for fear of the Jews (see John 20:19-29). When Jesus came amongst them, the first word he shares with them is "Peace." The first words are "Peace be with you." In my homily of the Third Sunday of Easter, the question I asked was, what peace Jesus is trying to bring? I shared six thoughts that weekend and return to them today.

A peace that can never be taken away. I remember when my brother was growing up he had a blanket which he took with him wherever he went. Over the years, it became more and more tattered and due to this, smaller and smaller in size. Finally, it became so tattered thus small that my mom, not in front of my brother, took the remainder and burned it. That security/that peace for my brother was gone. But the peace of Jesus is different. At one point, Jesus says, "My peace I give you. My peace I leave you" - a peace that no one can take from us. A peace that brings forgiveness. Lately, I have been telling

forgive us (should we confess our sins and are contrite). I also remind them that after forgiveness is given through the prayer of absolution ask God later what sins they confessed and God's response would be, "I don't remember." That's how Peter got back on his feet. He never worried about God's retribution.

A peace that is clear. The Second Reading summarizes this beautifully. How can we be at peace? St. John defines it by knowing Jesus. And knowing Jesus means more than "knowing Jesus," it means we must keep his commandments. St. John states, if someone says, "I know Jesus, but does not keep the commandments, he is a liar" (1 John 2:4). Peace comes through knowing Jesus and in knowing him keeping his commandments.

A peace that brings mystery. No one at the time of Jesus expected a dead man to come back to life. The people believed in the spirit moving to another abode. They had even heard about ghosts (the gospel says as much – terrified they thought they were seeing a ghost). Yet, here is where it is different. A ghost does not bear marks in his hands and feet. A ghost does not have flesh and bones to see and touch. A ghost doesn't eat fish. Resurrection isn't about a spirit or ghost, it is

about a person – Jesus Christ.

A peace that makes all things possible. Is someone out there really willing to die for me? Yes. Can I, as bad/sinful as I sometimes can be, really be saved? Yes. When Jesus commands us to preach to all nations, to all peoples, this is the message he wants nations/people to hear.

A peace that brings mission.
John 20:21 declares, "As
the Father has sent me so I
send you." To what?
Witness. What you have
seen? Share. What you
have touched? Share.
What you have heard?
Share. Go, witness, to the
ends of the earth.

When we do each of these, we bring the world the peace of Jesus Christ.

Christ is risen!

May, the Month of Mary

We are still in the Easter season and the flowers, the sprinkling rite and the songs we sing at Mass remind us that there is life after death. Christ rose from the dead "Let all creation sing alleluia!" As we feel the water touch our skin during Mass and we make the sign of the cross, we remember that we are "Born from the darkness and clothed in the light! We are bathed in the glory of GOD". As we move from April to May in this Easter season, it is important to remember that while May is associated with Mary, the celebration of Easter continues.

The association of the word "May" and "Mary" is a natural one, though the two names were not originally related. The *Romans* named the month of May after the goddess Maia, the daughter of Atlas and the wife of Jupiter. The *pre-Christian European* people celebrated the coming of spring with rituals such as the Maypole and the May Queen. These rituals celebrated the cycle of the seasons and the return of life in the spring. Christians replaced these celebrations by making May a month of devotion to the Blessed Mother. Catholic tradition associates Mary with the new life of spring because she is the "New Eve", the Mother of Jesus, the life-giving Savior and of the world. Mary is the Virgin Mother of GOD whose "yes" allowed Our Lord to take human form. She had complete trust in GOD, and after her life, she was assumed into Heaven by the power of GOD and crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth. We honor Mary as a saint. We honor GOD by remembering the role of Mary in the beginning of our salvation. Devotion to Mary always leads us to Jesus Christ!

The statue of Mary that was in the Gathering Space has been moved to the sanctuary amidst the yellow and pink kalanchoes near the cross. The students from Saint Francis will join us on Tuesday, May 8 to crown the statue at a 10:00 AM Mass. All are welcome! The statue will remain in the sanctuary throughout the month of May as we continue to celebrate the Easter season and remember the Anniversary of Fatima (May 13) and the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (May 31).

> Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.

Musical Musings from lov

Thank you all so very much for your feedback from the bulletin article I wrote a couple of weeks back about **St. Mark** the Evangelist. I very much enjoyed getting to share one of my European faith experiences with you all! In fact, many of you still ask me about my time in **Ireland**. I thought I'd take some time this month to focus on my life and ministry there.

Firstly, a little bit of background information: I began serving with the **House of Brigid** program in 2013 after my graduation from Saint Mary's College in Notre Dame, IN. (http://www.houseofbrigid.org/) This service program



provides recent graduates with an opportunity to help re-evangelize the Irish Catholic Church at the local level using music ministry as the vehicle. My two years in this program were spent at Clonard Church of the **Annunciation** in Wexford.

One of the greatest things I had to get used to in my new parish was *how* to say things. (For anyone who has ever studied a foreign language and then used it in its native place, you know what I mean.) And you thought the Irish spoke English...!

For example, I usually was met with blank stares if I said I was "going to the parish". You see, "parish" in Ireland is a *geographical* boundary. The "parish" refers to the *city or town* the church building is in. Therefore, we rarely called my parish the "Church of the Annunciation" - it was "Clonard", the name of the town. It made more sense if I said I was "going to the Church". Also, the concept of a "parish family" was foreign to them. Instead, they referred to themselves as a "community".

While there are hundreds more examples, I'll leave you with one last one. The European way of referring to musical notation is <u>not</u> eighth note, quarter note, half note, etc. Instead, I had to quickly learn "quaver", "crotchet", and "semi-breve" to make it through choir rehearsals with clarity!
