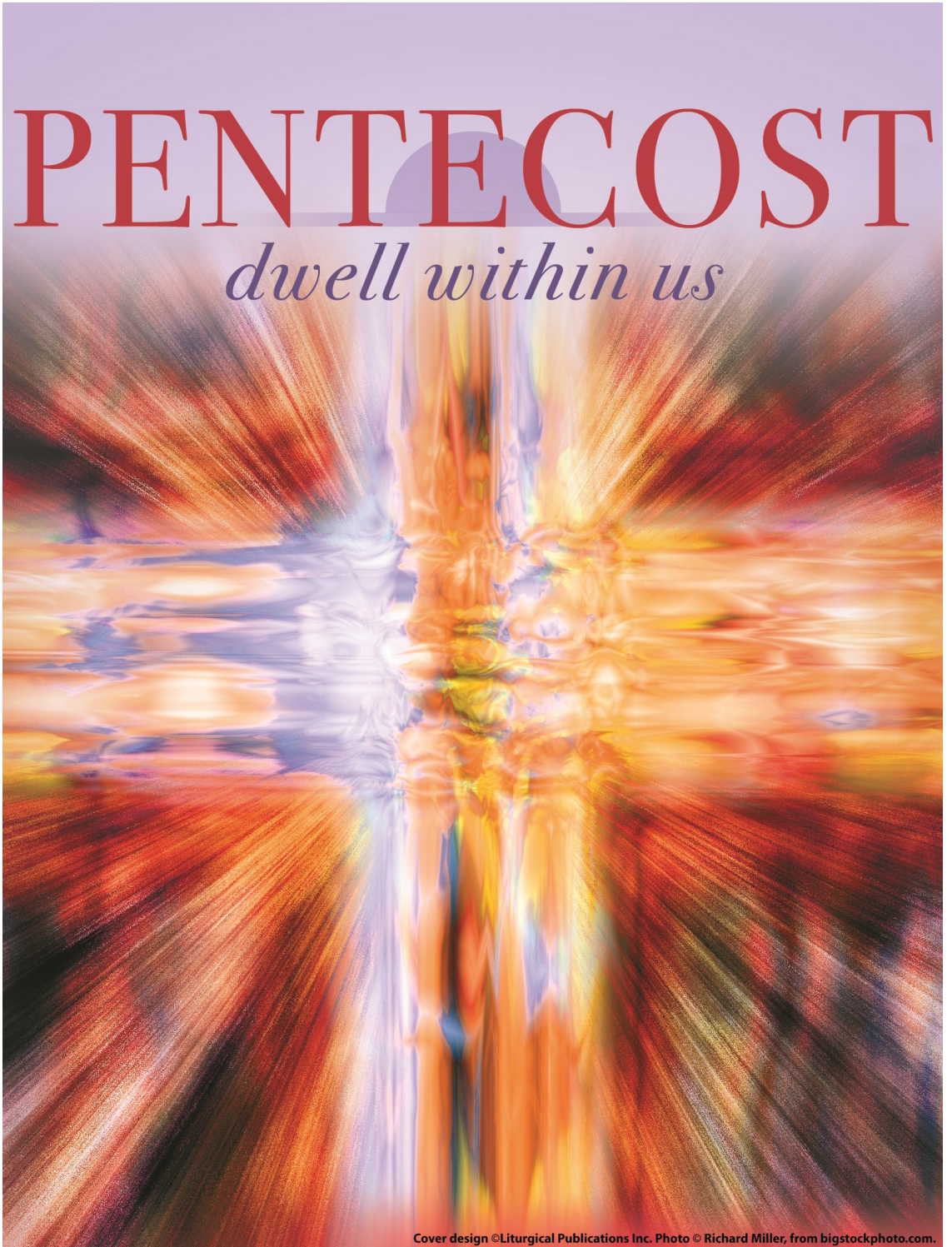

## Weekly Words from The Rock

### Pentecost

Jesus Christ is Risen. Alleluia. Alleluia. For fifty days, we have celebrated and proclaimed this message. With Pentecost, the Season of Easter culminates and moves us back into Ordinary Time. Pentecost surrounds the giving of the Holy Spirit to the Apostles. It is the birthday of the Church. I want to share with you some of our beliefs around the Holy Spirit with the following taken from the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults, pages 101-110.

Question: What is our faith regarding the Holy Spirit? Answer: To believe in the Holy Spirit is to profess that the Holy Spirit is one of the persons of the Holy Trinity, consubstantial with the Father and the Son: “with the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.” (citing the Nicene Creed)

“The Holy Spirit is dynamic, transforming our bodies into temples of God and our souls into dwelling places for Christ. Sometimes called the Paraclete, a term that describes him as advocate and consoler, the Holy Spirit wants to fill us with inspiration and encouragement” (page 103).

Question: What are images of the Holy Spirit in Scripture? Answer: In Scripture, some of the images of the Holy Spirit are fire, cloud and light, seal, hand, finger of God and dove (page 107).

Before the Ascension, Jesus said to his Apostles: “You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth” (page 108).

Question: How is water a symbol of the Holy Spirit? Answer: Water signifies the Holy Spirit’s action

in Baptism, since after the invocation of the Holy Spirit it becomes the efficacious sacramental sign of new birth (page 107).

Whenever the Father sends his Son, he always sends his Spirit: Their mission is inseparable (page 108).

The gifts of the Holy Spirit are wisdom, understanding, counsel (right judgment), fortitude (courage), knowledge, piety (reverence), and fear of the Lord (wonder and awe in God’s presence) (page 108).

The fruits of the Holy Spirit are charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control and chastity (page 108).

Both the Hebrew and Greek word for the Spirit originally meant a “breath,” or “air,” or “wind.” The Holy Spirit was thus understood to be the source of inspiration, life, and movement within God’s people (page 104-105).

The Holy Spirit builds up, animates, and sanctifies the Church. He prepares us to go out and bring others to Christ. He opens our minds to understand Christ’s death and resurrection. He makes present for us the mystery of Christ, especially in the Eucharist, and brings us to communion with God that we may bear much fruit (page 109).

I wanted to take this opportunity to thank all of you for sharing your lives with me. In the past ten years we have experienced many things together, some good and some bad, some that brought great joy and some that brought copious tears. I will cherish all the memories, but here are a few that I wanted to share with you:

November 11, 2008 - The first funeral that I prepared, sang and played for at the Church of the Resurrection was for my godfather, Albert Dieser. Father Tom Loomis had met with the family, and when he gave me the information, I was stunned. Could it really be my godfather? I had lost track of where he was living as I hadn't seen or talked to him in years. I had no idea that he was living in Rochester or that he was a member of the parish. For me, it was a sign from GOD that I was in the right place at the right time. I have felt that way ever since.

February 3, 2009 - the Feast of Saint Blaise. The priest at this weekday morning mass decided that we would do the traditional blessing of throats during mass and asked me to move the Easter candle into the sanctuary. I didn't understand why we needed the Easter candle and didn't ask. I moved the candle and when it came time for the blessing of throats, the deacon and the priest took the crossed candles used for the blessing and lit them from the Easter candle. Everyone who came forward for the blessing had wide eyes as the lit candles were placed near their necks...and hair, and scarves, and coats. Not only did people receive the blessing, they got a little wax as well.

Speaking of candles...every November it has been my privilege to place lit candles in the windows of the church as we remembered those who had passed away the previous year. We kept a candle burning for each soul. As the candle burned down and needed to be replaced, I would take the flame from one candle and light a new one. As I did, I would say the name of the soul for whom that candle was lit and would pray...eternal rest grant upon him/her and let perpetual light shine upon him/her...and may the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of GOD rest in peace. Amen.

I am grateful for these memories and I am grateful for all of you!

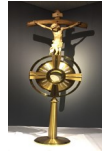

## Musical Musings from Joy

One of my greatest joys over the two years I served in Wexford was producing **fully-staged, musical plays** based on the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. I inherited the project from an alumna of House of Brigid, (who happened to be a music, theatre, AND French classmate of mine at Saint Mary's!), and it led to discovering a wonderful way of evangelizing the Irish.

My first year, they were fresh off of a "Passion Play", so I was asked to do a "**Resurrection Play.**" While we may be used to hearing dramatic accounts of the Passion narrative, witnessing the Resurrection stories played out isn't part of the norm. I pulled out my trusty Bible and began at the Acts of the Apostles to figure out what I was going to include!

**I began the story at the Crucifixion and led it all the way through Pentecost;** roughly, the 50 days of Easter. We included the account of the three Marys at the tomb and Jesus meeting the disciples on the Road to Emmaus. I also used historical documents, (though non-biblical,) to craft a sub-plot of Pontius Pilate trying to recapture Jesus.

The best part of this endeavor? Every piece of music was originally written for liturgical use! I purposely chose music with the intent of it becoming familiar to parishioners by the next Easter. **Resurrection's new song, I Send You Out, is one of those pieces!**

The following year they asked me to go back to the traditional Passion story. Using my classmate's original script, I reworked it to make the music entirely liturgical. **I was also able to recreate a "real" River Jordan for Jesus' baptism and change water into wine ONSTAGE.** (How? I'll never tell!)

On the whole, **Irish culture stems from the oral/aural tradition of music and storytelling.** Therefore, **musical drama is a viable means of evangelization.** Was this Mass? No. BUT, every element was liturgical in nature, whether it be the music or the singular use of the Bible as script material. The Gospel Message was still being spread, even in this non-direct way. My hope is that the Easter Season was a bit fuller for those who attended the plays. And, if they didn't come to Mass beyond Easter Sunday, at least they still heard the Word proclaimed in an accessible way.

Fr. Burke Masters was recently the guest on Relevant Radio's "Morning Air" program. The same is true for our bodies. When we are treating our bodies properly, eating well and exercising, we feel better and have more energy. And we need to take care of our temple of the Holy Spirit.

**Virtues in Practice:** Zeal is defined as being driven by an intense love for God. During May, we look to St. Dominic de Guzman to help us practice the virtue of zeal. He was so energetic about spreading the faith that he is sometimes called the "athlete of Christ." St. Dominic wanted to make sure everyone knew the truth about God. To do this, he started the Dominican Order to teach everyone about God and His good news of salvation, St. Dominic and his Dominican brothers travelled to many places in Europe on foot, spending their days and nights teaching and preaching about God to the people, some of whom were spreading confusion and error about God and His Church. At one point these people tried to kill St. Dominic, but his only response was to rejoice that God found him worthy to suffer for the truth in imitation of Jesus. St. Dominic's zeal inspires his brothers and sisters to continue to teach about God throughout the world. St. Dominic, pray for us.

**Pray the Rosary for Peace with Pope Francis:** Pope Francis has called on all Catholics worldwide to join him in praying the rosary during the month of May for peace in the world. He said he will be praying especially for Syria, Nigeria, and the Koreas. He issued his call on Sunday, April 29, after reciting the Regina Coeli prayer with some 30,000 pilgrims from many countries, including Italy, India, Pakistan and Portugal. He told them that on the afternoon of May 1 he will go to the Shrine of the Madonna del Divino Amore, on the outskirts of Rome, where he will "recite the Rosary, praying especially for peace in Syria and in the entire world." He invited the faithful "to join him spiritually [on that occasion] and to prolong for the month of May the prayer of the rosary for peace." A movie, "Pope Francis-A Man of His Word"—plan to go when it comes to Rochester.
