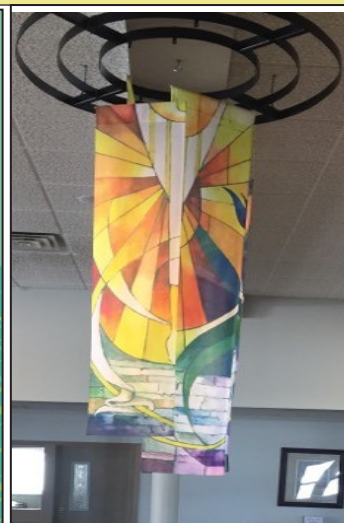

Weekly Words from The Rock

Memorial Day

Here are some of my thoughts on Memorial Day. “Memorial Day - a time to honor our fallen war heroes, a time to honor loved ones who have passed on, a time for quiet prayers of thanks for the battles fought for our freedom. Memorial Day is a time of remembrance shared by our entire nation.” These words come from the American Legion Auxiliary’s National News and define the heart of what Memorial Day is all about – a day of remembering, a day of reminiscing.

This remembering and reminiscing has been taking place for decades. For example, before Memorial Day was even dedicated as a national holiday by President Lyndon B. Johnson on June 28, 1968, women of the southern states placed flowers not only on the graves of Confederate soldiers, but of Union soldiers as well. This was due to the fact that most battles between the North and South during the Civil War took place on southern soil. Learning from their example, this action quickly spread across the nation. Why do we continue the very same practice today? For what purpose? It all centers on sacrifice.

If we reflect upon the history of this country, there have been many cherished moments, golden years a person might say. On the same note, there have also been dark periods, periods we would just as soon forget. This is not unique; it is true of countries the world over. And yet, through it all, golden years, dark periods, men and women have sacrificed. Again, why? So you and I can enjoy the gift of freedom, a liberty we can easily take for granted day after day.

On the obvious front, the sacrifice we speak about centers on life. We commemorate those comrades, both men and women, who have died in defense of this

country. Wars have raged on native soil (here we think of the War of Independence and Civil War) and across the vast expanses of ocean. Within the various battles, millions upon millions have died. What a tragedy if they be forgotten, or their accomplishments in the name of freedom were to go unnoticed.

We also pause on Memorial Day and remember the many people who sacrificed behind the scenes – men and women who easily go unnoticed. During war, not everyone bears arms. People remain behind to help in building up military might, to help in caring for the wounded and each other (especially when told of the loss of a loved one), and to help in producing food. Such people many times endure rations and stamps, shortages and countless hardships. And of course, they pray. They pray for victory, and they pray for loved ones, hoping death’s door never knocks. We can’t imagine or comprehend the sense of loss at the announcement of the death of a family member, relative or friend.

I know that I have only broken the surface when it comes to sacrifice and what people endure at the time of war. No amount or number of words can do justice when such a subject is touched. However, one fact remains – although it be only one day out of the year, we do remember! Our flags, signs and banners are thanks to the many people who have sacrificed and continue to sacrifice for this great country of ours. Without such people, freedom and liberty would be a mirage.

As people of faith, we ask God to protect and bless this country we call the United States of America, and with His guidance, may we, as a country, be courageous in leading the world into the twenty-first century and beyond.

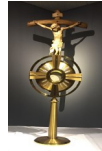

Many don't realize that staying in Ireland after my two years in Wexford were up wasn't an "automatic" thing. In fact, I decided pretty late in the game that I was going to take a leap of faith and turn down a full scholarship/assistantship offer at an American college in order to attend the Irish Pontifical University of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.

My first day was a blur. One of my lecturers even commented, "If you're an international student, I promise you this will be the hardest day of your graduate career." Boy was he right! Between figuring out the "school" language, finding classrooms with Irish names and no numbers, and not knowing a soul, I was pretty discouraged.

However, I found solace in attending daily Mass in St. Mary's Oratory. Little did I know that my decision to follow the Eucharist that day would lead to a two-year relationship with Ireland's National Centre for Liturgy (NCL), a body committed to promoting quality liturgy throughout the country.

That first day, the Director of Music for the NCL, Sr. Moira Bergin, picked me out of the crowd because she could hear me singing confidently and needed a cantor. Thus began my two-year tenure as the Cantor for the National Centre for Liturgy. I cantored daily Mass several times per week in addition to helping lead the occasional Evening Prayer. I also had the opportunity to participate in several televised Masses for RTÉ, (think CBS or NBC here in the U.S.,) which was a great honor.

Most importantly, ministering with the NCL connected me with people from around the world. I met African Priests and Sisters, Irish laypeople, and Chinese Seminarians, to name a few. Once again proving the universality of the Catholic faith, we were able to work, learn, and minister as one.

I hope you've enjoyed my Irish tidbits over the last few weeks. I'd be happy to answer any other questions you have about my time in Ireland!

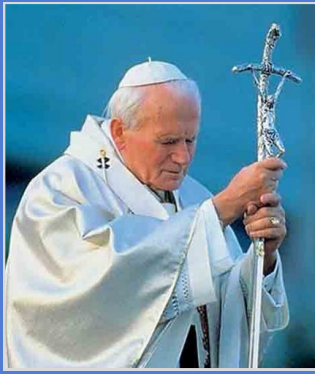
