Father's Day

To all of our fathers, I want to wish a blessed Father's Day. Last month, I shared a few thoughts about my mother and now it is time to do the same with my father. My father raised us on a farm a mere one and a half miles from his father. We raised hogs, corn, soybeans and wheat. We grew wheat for its grain but mostly as bedding for the hogs. My dad was a hard worker. He was meticulous – proud of his equipment and proud of his fields. Not being the biggest farmer in the area, it was amazing what he was able to do. We had a roof over our heads, food on the table, and clothes on our back. He was able to send all four children through college.

Some of my greatest memories of my father were spent hunting and fishing. We have stories from falling out of duck boats to being stopped by a game warden believing we were transporting drugs. Now as he has reached the age of 84, the roles are reversed. I am now the one who takes him to the hunting grounds or lakes in search of a walleye, perch or bullhead.

My father is a man of great faith. His example of prayer and believing in the power of the Mass is something each child has cherished. Too, I was fortunate to have a father who supported me in my priestly vocation. As family, it was a treat when we jumped into the car and headed to A&W Root Beer. We would order a root beer and ice cream cone. My mother and father were always worried about us spilling our cone so they would constantly yell, "Hurry up! Hurry Up! Eat your cone!"

Those were the days!

From the Book of Blessings, I would like to offer a blessing for our fathers today.

God our Father, in your wisdom and love you made all things. Bless these men, that they may be strengthened as Christian fathers. Let the example of their faith and love shine forth. Grant that we, their sons and daughter, may honor them always with a spirit of profound respect. Grant this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Suicide: A.


C. The killing of a human being.

This wheel depicts the entire Liturgical Year that began with the First Sunday of Advent. Some of you may have taken your personal copy at the "New Liturgical Year" last December.

It is the perfect time to dedicate ourselves to family prayer time. Prayer is essential for our families. You may be thinking that prayer is difficult, boring, frustrating or challenging. It can also be peaceful, soul-renewing, breath-taking, or energizing. If little children are involved, it can be silly, funny, and wiggly. If adults are participating, it can be wonderful! It doesn't matter if you are a family of one soul or an army of prayer warriors. It is important is

that your family takes time every day to pray together. As you teach your children, you can pray in the morning over your cereal or taking a shower; you can pray during the day when you are grateful or stressed out; you can pray before, during, and after suppertime; you can pray as you watch your children play sports or as you go for a walk; you can pray at the end of the day with your guardian angel as you lay your head on your pillow.
