What is grace? Grace is the free and undeserved assistance God offers us so that we might respond to his call to share in his divine life and attain eternal life. God's grace, as divinely offered gift, does not take away or restrict our freedom; rather, it perfects our freedom by helping us overcome the restricting power of sin, the true obstacle to our freedom. (Page 329 of the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults). Grace is our sharing in the salvation and redemption of humankind that was accomplished by the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. When we are in the state or relationship of grace, we, as individuals, have been created again so that the life of Christ continues and evolves in our individual human existence. In a way that only God can bring about, we live Christ's life in our own. God does not make us sharers and participants in the life of Christ whether we want to be or not. God offers us the new life of Christ as a gift that we are invited to accept. "Being Catholic Archbishop Daniel Pilarczyk".

Liturgy is rich with signs, symbols and gestures. We are all very aware of our "Catholic calisthenics" which are a routine part of the Liturgy, namely sitting, standing and kneeling at various times. These postures serve an important purpose and reveal the significance of the action taking place. "Sitting" may be seen as our "learning" mode. We think of the various times at which we sit during the Sacred Liturgy, in particular the Scripture readings from the Old and New Testaments as well as during the homily. "Standing" may be seen as our "preparing" mode. We stand at various times during the Liturgy, most importantly when we are preparing to receive the Lord in His Word through the proclamation of the Gospel and receiving His Body and Blood in Holy Communion. "Kneeling" may be seen as our "adoring" mode and certainly has its proper place in Mass. A gesture reserved to the principal celebrant is the extension of the hands during the various "greetings". As a sign of unity within the priesthood, the principal celebrant and concelebrating priests extend their hands together at different times during the Eucharistic Prayer, during the offering of the Lord's Prayer or for a blessing. These are just a few examples the many important actions and gestures which are part of the Liturgy. Our worship as Catholics is very rich with signs, symbols and gestures, many of which have ancient origins. What do they mean to you? What do they signify and reveal? Make these actions and gestures part of your own personal participation in the Liturgy and offer them with care, devotion and sincerity. They are not just "empty actions" but help reveal to us the great Mystery of God. Living the Liturgy, Fr. David J. Dohogne

Musical Musings from Joy

What an action-packed week I had at the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM) annual convention earlier this month! I came home completely recharged and rejuvenated in the power of the sung Word. Here are some highlights from my week: On the first day, I attended a three-hour **Composers' Forum** where one of my original Psalm settings was workshopped with many notable liturgical composers and publishers present. (Including Christopher Walker, Paul Inwood, and Tom **Kendzia!**). I adjudicated nearly one dozen cantors in their Basic Cantor Certifications. They add to four of our cantors here at Resurrection who recently based their own certifications! I went to a very intimate talk given by **David** Haas, who discussed the launch of his new website, http://www.davidhaas.us/, which includes many wonderful resources for musicians and non-musicians alike! One of the best features, in my opinion, is the **daily** mediation/reflection. He assured us that he does NOT sell our email addresses to third parties, so feel free to sign up and receive some wonderful words from a Minnesotan composer every day!

Marty Haugen gave a great workshop of his new music and talked to us a bit about his own faith journey. Did you know that his first parish music ministry job was supposed to be a **six-month** temporary position? Look where he is now! Motivational speaker, singer, and composer ValLimar **Jansen** gave us a really enlightening and powerful talk on music in our everyday lives. My favorite insight from her was the realization that we all start in the womb with music - it's the rhythm of our own heartbeat against our mother's. During a liturgy session, Michael Joncas and Paul Turner gave amazing insight to the Church music documents before, during, and after Vatican II. They also clarified some of the more confusing parts for us, and helped to remind us that the implementation of Vatican II is still happening! Finally, on my last day, John Angotti (composer of our newly-learned song, I Send You Out,) offered a wonderful workshop on passing on the faith and our lay ministry efforts to youth. Using his own compositions to ground us, John sent us on the journey of a minister/youth relationship alongside one young man he mentored from a young age. What an inspirational way to end the week! If anyone has any questions or wants to know more about these experiences, feel free to reach out to me!

R.C.I.A. (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults)

Frequently Asked Questions:

What is the difference between a Candidate and a Catechumen?

Candidate: Someone who has been baptized in another Christian Faith. The Catholic Church recognizes the baptism bestowed by most Christian denominations (ex: the baptism was performed with flowing water and the words "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" were used.) Since baptism confers an everlasting mark on the soul, the Church does not "re-baptize". When entering the Catholic Church at Easter, the candidate makes a "profession of faith" in Catholicism.

Catechumen: Someone who has never been baptized into any Christian faith. They will be baptized at the Easter Vigil.

What is the difference between a Sponsor and a Godparent?

Sponsor: All candidates and catechumens must have a sponsor who:

- Acts as a personal connection between the candidate and community;
- Provides support and encouragement;
- Answers questions the candidate or catechumen might have;
- Is available;
- Listens to and shares personal faith stories;
- Prays with and for the candidate or catechumen;
- Introduces the candidate or catechumen to other members of the community;
- Participates in instructions, gatherings and ceremonial rites wherever possible.

Godparent: Is chosen by the catechumen. It is common that the godparent also serves as sponsor to the catechumen. The godparent:

- Accepts a lifetime commitment to help the neophyte keep his/her baptismal commitment;
- Must be fully initiated themselves, having received baptism, confirmation and Eucharist;
- Must be approved by the pastor;
- Must be reasonably informed on current Church teaching.
