In today's Gospel, Jesus' disciples face a classification problem. They've seen another person driving out demons in the name of Jesus. They recognize him, a non-Apostle, as clearly "out." And yet "Jesus replied, 'Do not prevent him, whoever is not against us is for us." Jesus recognizes real faith in the would-be exorcist. In our own lives, Jesus invites us to recognize others' good intentions. They should not be cut off simply because they do not line up with all our personal preferences. What, then, is deserving of such a fate? "If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off? if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out." When his listeners blame others, Jesus tends to pivot the conversation to their own lives. In this case, the message is clear. What we really need to cut out is that which keeps us from Jesus. If over-commitment causes us to lose patience with our family, doubt God's providence, and become consumed with self-reliance, cut something out. If certain friendships lead us time after time into gossip and slander, cut it out. In today's Gospel, Jesus invites us to live intentionally in our discipleship. Are we ready?

# Weekly Words from The Rock

Another Thought on St. Paul's "Thorn in the Flesh" Recently, St. Paul's passage on his "thorn in the flesh" appeared in our Sunday readings.

St. Paul in his second letter to the people of Corinth writes, "Therefore, that I might not become too elated, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, an angel of Satan, to beat me, to keep me from being too elated." Three times I begged the Lord about this, that it might leave me, but he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness.' Volumes of writing have been given to these three verses of 2 Corinthians 12:7-9.

Numerous possible meanings have been given to try to understand what is this "thorn in the flesh." Is it a sin? Is it a weakness of Paul's character? Is it a group who opposes him? In my homily the weekend the passage appeared, I spoke of what I perceived to be Paul's "thorn." It isn't a sin, a weakness of character or a group in strong opposition. In my reading and studies it seems that Paul is referring to a physical ailment, specifically, seizures. Am I the final authority? Certainly not. What I would like to do is provide another thought, a different thought on this passage from St. Paul.

In the latest edition of *The Priest* magazine, September 2018, Brother Elliot Maloney shares what he believes to be the "thorn" of St. Paul. On page 24 he writes, "I think he (St. Paul) may be talking about the repeated flare-ups of a skin condition, one that, evidently, had plagued him for at least 14 years (see 2 Corinthians 12:2).

Though undifferentiated by ancient physicians, such recurring inflammations such as shingles, lupus vulgaris (a chronic tubercular infection of the skin) and erysipelas (bacterial reddening inflammation of the skin) were well known. In another text, Paul says, "I bear the marks of Jesus on my body." (Galatians 6:17)

What Brother Maloney believes is that the "thorn in the flesh" of St. Paul was a skin condition, a mark one could clearly see on his body. Again, it is another thought. Will we ever know of what "thorn" Paul is writing? With certainty, the answer is "No." However, the passage does teach that whatever "thorn" God has given us, and each of us has one, the grace of Jesus Christ will overcome.

**A Question** In the August 19-25, 2018 edition of *Our Sunday Visitor*, page 59, a question is posed about lying.

Question: We are told not to lie, but the Bible says Rahab the prostitute lied to protect the Jewish spies. The Bible later praises her as being justified for doing this. Does Scripture praise lying, which is a sin?

Msgr. Charles Pope responds, "No" (Scripture does not praise lying). We should be careful to recall that the Bible records many things that are not praiseworthy. There are murders, rapes, theft, polygamy, adultery and the like. The mere reporting of these behaviors is not approval of them. In many cases such behavior becomes an object lesson to illustrate what happens when such bad behavior ensues. In other cases, the sinful behavior simply goes unremarked. But silence is not the same as approval.

It is true that Rahab lied. Here is the account of it: "So the king of Jericho sent Rahab the order, 'Bring out the men who have come to you and entered your house, for they have come to spy out the entire land.' The woman had taken the two men and hidden them, so she said, 'True, the men you speak of came to me, but I did not know where they came from. At dark, when it was time to close the gate, they left, and I do not know where they went'" (Joshua 2:3-5).

The incident is simply recorded. And while the two Hebrew spies benefit from her lie (indeed she had hid them and knew of their whereabouts) and even promise her reward for her protection, there is no explicit praise in the text for the lie itself.

Later in the Scriptures there is praise of Rahab, but there is no mention of her lie, only her act of receiving the spies and sending them out by a protected way. Here are those texts: "By faith Rahab the harlot did not perish with the disobedient, for she had received the spies in peace" (Hebrews 11:31). "And in the same way was not Rahab the harlot also justified by works when she welcomed the messengers and sent them out by a different route?" (James 2:25).

Hence we should be careful not to say that the Scriptures affirm lying in this matter. There is a care in the sacred text to focus the praise on her overall benevolence, not the lie. St. Augustine affirms the stance: "That therefore which was rewarded in them was, not [her] deceit, but [her] benevolence; benignity of mind, not iniquity of lying" ("To Consentius, Against Lying," 32).

# Stacey's Suggestions

I am often asked if I would recommend a scripture verse, a source, a book, a movie, a video, a blog, etc. Sometimes, I'm simply asked for my advice on a topic. As the faith formation year begins, now seems to be the time to widen my horizons and start scattering seeds.
