Weekly Words from The Rock

The Four Last Things

In the December 17-23, 2017 edition of Our Sunday Visitor (pages 9-12), we learn about the Four Last Things – death, heaven, hell and purgatory. Last week we looked at what the article said pertaining to death. Let us begin today by looking at purgatory and judgment.

On Purgatory – Purgatory is not one of the four last things because, as a preparation for heaven, it is not eternal. Souls who are in purgatory are being purified by God's mercy so that at the proper time they will be with God in heaven.


On Judgment – The Church's teaching on death can have both a comforting and sobering effect. It is comforting to know that life continues, but the fact that one's time on this earth is limited should bring some weightiness to one's decisions. But if death fails to do this, then the Church's teaching on judgment hopefully will (note that the Church uses "man" in the universal sense, meaning "man and woman"): "Each man receives his eternal retribution in his immortal soul at the very moment of death, in a particular judgment that refers to his life to Christ: either entrance into the blessedness of heaven through a purification or immediately, - or immediate and everlasting damnation" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, Paragraph 1022). There will also be a universal (or last) judgment of the entire universe at the end of time.

The basic meaning of the Church's teaching about judgment is that the choices one makes have value – they can be good or bad. Also, God determines the value of one's choices and metes out the appropriate reward or punishment. The teaching tends to evoke two dominant feelings in people: fear and satisfaction.

Fear, of course, is not a bad feeling to have if one is living a sinful life; it might even prompt one toward conversion. Fear, in the sense of awe, is appropriate too, for God is able to judge everyone and every act in perfect justice and mercy. Only God knows the depths of each person's heart; only he knows the advantages and disadvantages a person had; only he knows the full circumstances of every person's life and every situation. God knows the full truth and will judge accordingly. The only bad kind of fear to have is one that is distrustful of God's judgment, for how could God mistreat the very people he created and saved out of love?

Satisfaction is the other common feeling many people have regarding God's judgment, which is good if by "satisfaction" one means a sense of contentment concerning God's ultimate victory over all evil. A person who is content with God's judgment is able to work diligently for justice on earth without vindictiveness or impatience, knowing that every good effort made at telling the truth, building solidarity, or righting wrongs cooperates with God's victory. A "satisfaction" that hungers for revenge is not a good thing, for it reveals a distrust in God's perfect judgment, which will have the final word (see Romans 12:17-21).

Baby Bottle Campaign Offers Real Hope and Help to Women and Children

Dominique is a single mother of two young kids. She works full time and takes online college courses in the evening. When her voungest daughter was born, she took an unpaid

maternity leave for 6 weeks and relied on savings to get through. She started to miss work days when her daughter got sick and couldn't attend daycare, and Dominique fell behind on bills. Dominique received a shutoff notice for her electricity, which would have gotten her evicted from her government housing. Dominique called Catholic Charities and met with a social worker to apply for the Mother and Child Assistance Fund. Catholic Charities was able to get her caught up on her electric bill, which allowed her to keep the lights on and stay in her housing. Her social worker got Dominique connected to community resources that helped provide diapers and baby needs. Catholic Charities provided her with a pack n play through a partner program so that she had a safe place for her baby to sleep. Dominique continues to work and has expressed gratitude to Catholic Charities and the donors that make the Mother and Child Fund possible.

<u>Multiple Ministries</u> We have been going over the guidelines for partaking in **multiple liturgical ministries during a single weekend Mass** with several groups of the ministers. If you serve in more than one liturgical ministry, this is especially important for you:


- 1. The **norm** (the exceptions being laid out below) should be that someone focus on **one ministry per Mass**.
- 2. In cases where we are short of ministers, **a person can assist in another ministry**.
- 3. It **should not be the norm** that someone be involved in **more than two ministries per Mass**.
- 4. Should it be that someone is **scheduled for two ministries in a Mass**, this should only be done **once per month**.

We will do our best to avoid having you scheduled for multiple ministries, but no person or computer is infallible! *Use this as a guideline for yourself*. Indeed, we are so grateful for the time, talent, and treasure given by each of our parishioners in a variety of capacities.

If you haven't joined a liturgical ministry yet, please consider doing so! I am happy to train anyone as a Eucharistic minister, server, greeter, lector, or usher at any time.


