Weekly Words from The Rock

Msgr. Charles Pope

We often wonder with the Assumption of Mary about whether she died or was still alive when assumed. From Msgr. Charles Pope (*Our Sunday Visitor*, October 1-7, 2017, page 11), we are taught, "If Mary died or did not die at the moment of the Assumption, we don't know for sure. It is not infallibly defined or taught by the Church. There are different traditions in the Church. Each tradition clearly asserts that Mary's body was taken up and is in heaven now. However, whether she died and how long her soul and body were separate is what distinguishes these views.

Orthodox Eastern Christianity generally holds that Mary died a natural death and that her soul was received by Christ, and that her body was resurrected on the third day after her death and taken up into heaven in anticipation of the general resurrection. Her tomb was found empty on the third day. The tomb of Mary is venerated in Jerusalem near Gethsemane.

Western, Roman Catholic teaching holds that Mary was "assumed" (taken up) into heaven body and soul, but there is no detailing of her burial or the number of days before her body was taken up. The question of whether Mary underwent physical death remains open in the Catholic view. There also is a greater openness to the possibility that she was assumed in Ephesus, not Jerusalem.

Some base their reasoning on Mary not dying on the fact that she did not have original sin and, for that, she did

not suffer the penalty of death. But this is a weak argument. For Jesus, though sinless, suffered death. Further, if one argues that freedom from original sin should have exempted her from death, would it not also follow that she should have been kept in a garden paradise, free from suffering? In fact, she lived with us in "paradise lost" and suffered from the sins and injustice of the world around her. So, while free to hold that Mary did not die, her status as immaculately conceived is not a particularly strong reason to do so."

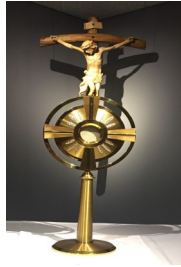

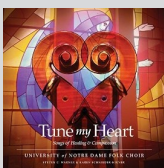

Works of Justice- A Fund to aid the Work of Social Justice. Most parishioners are aware of the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) that conducts a collection in our parishes in November. CCHD is the national, anti-poverty program of the U.S. Catholic Bishops. The Bishops have given CCHD the mission to address the root causes of poverty in the United States by promoting and supporting community-controlled, self-help organizations. You may not be aware that 25% of the funds collected in the CCHD campaign remains in our Diocese. These proceeds help support "Works of Justice" fund, which awards up to \$5,000 for organizations that meet the criteria of operating local anti poverty programs. Works of Justice Funds are available for all organizations that fit the criteria of addressing root causes of poverty. 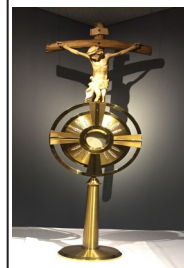

Stacey Shares: A recap from the All Saints Learning Centers, over 65 families (145 participants- children in grades 1-5/ parents/grandparents/siblings) found out what it takes to become a Saint.
