

Advent

On the First Sunday of Advent, I offered the following thoughts on Advent. I will keep these thoughts in my column during Advent to inspire us during this season.

The A of Advent means Anticipate. Advent anticipates Christmas and for many, we can't wait for Christmas to arrive. This Advent do not wish the days away. Do one thing each day of Advent which makes you grow closer to Jesus Christ.

The D of Advent means Don't. Don't forget the state of your soul. Celebrate the gift of God's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance.

The V of Advent means Volume. This is a difficult time of the year for many people. Reach out to them (volume) and let them know you are keeping them in prayer.

The E of Advent means Emulate. If we claim to be believers of Jesus Christ, let us show people that we believe by the life we live.

The N of Advent means Never. Never forget what makes this time of the year special. It isn't the food, gifts or parties. It is Jesus Christ.

The T of Advent means Time. As Jesus Christ came to us in the Christmas story which Advent anticipates, God has given us a precious gift in our time on this earth. We must never forget the way we live our time on this earth will determine our journey in eternity.



Musings from Joy

Happy *Gaudete*! Did you know that today's *Gaudete* Sunday is named for the day's *Introit*? (The "Processional Hymn" as proscribed by the Roman Missal.) The first line of the original Latin reads, "*Gaudete in Domino semper*," meaning, "Rejoice in the Lord always." Therefore, *gaudete* means "rejoice," the root word being "joy." Fun fact: I was actually baptized on Gaudete Sunday as an infant!

With this weekend finally comes the lighting of the rosecolored candle on the Advent Wreath. As promised, I will take some time this week to explain this tradition.

Though this may be surprising to some, the Advent Wreath was originally a Lutheran tradition, though it developed over time and was adopted by many other Christian denominations. It was not common in the Catholic Church until the 1920's/1930's. Candle colors will vary by denomination, but the Catholics will always use violet and rose in order to match the liturgical colors of the given Sundays.





The wreath is used to mark the passage of time in Advent, though many other symbolic observations have been

made. For instance, by lighting the candles

each week, more light is added, pointing to the coming of the *Light*, Jesus himself. The wreath is a circle, which can point to the infinite love of God. Some traditions give symbolic names to the violet-colored candles, as well, to represent, (in numeric order,) Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Sometimes, a fifth, white-colored candle will make its appearance in the center of the wreath, which represents the arrival of Jesus on Christmas. This is the liturgical color for that day, as well.

I encourage you to do a bit of research on the Advent Wreath and consider adopting one for your own home, if you do not have one already. This is a particularly fun tradition for children, and there's a lot to be learned from the season if you use it as an addition to your home prayer life.

...and, if you have not picked up your *Little Blue Book* yet, make sure you do and also grab a bookmark with an at-home Advent Wreath Blessing on it!

Stacey Shares: "Who was at the Nativity?" I asked the first graders. The first answer was "Santa Claus!" I said, "No, guess again." I think I heard a denial but the next guess was shouted, "I know, Rudolph!" Again, I sadly said, "No." I reluctantly gave them "Mary, Joseph and Jesus." "Who else was at the Nativity?" And I heard, "Those little green guys...ELVES!" Inside I was



screaming "NO! NO! NO!" but I continued with this line of questioning. I hinted, "Who announced the birth of Jesus? They are white, ... have wings, ... and sing in choirs." All the first graders shouted, "ANGELS!" Yes, the angels! Thank you, God, for sending us the angels. I saw this as a teaching opportunity. I thought back to my own childhood and remembered watching the Peanuts gang trying to put on a Christmas play. I loved it then and I appreciate it even more now. I want that same feeling for the children at Resurrection. We will be watching the Charlie Brown Christmas DVD during our classes on Monday. And I hope that next Advent, all the children will know who was at the Nativity, including the shepherds, animals, and wisemen.
