## Weekly Words from The Rock

### Lenten Pastoral Answers

Question: Matthew 5:48 says, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." It seems to me that, knowing man's fallibility and knowing the impossibility of man being perfect, that perhaps Jesus was not saying "perfect" as we understand the word to mean. Could it mean "strive to be complete" or some such thing?

Answer: It is true, the Greek word here, (teleioi), speaks more of perfection in the sense of completion. Thus, we are to attain to a state of being complete, full grown or of full age. It also has the sense of "reaching the goal." So we are not dealing with a merely moral perfection, but a completeness of character that is not merely absent of sin, but is possessed of all the virtues.

Clearly this is more than a moral injunction for the moment but something attained by God's grace in stages and accomplished fully only after a journey with the Lord. St. Paul speaks to this when he says, "And [the Lord] gave apostles, prophets, evangelists, shepherds and teachers to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ..." (Ephesians 4:11-13).

But we ought not consign the Lord's words to a sort of flourish or exaggeration and see our perfection as impossible. No, this is our dignity and our future if we persevere to the end. The saints in heaven have attained to this by the Lord's grace which has been accomplished in them already.

To the degree that this seems impossible, it only seems so from the standpoint of human achievement unaided by grace.

In the Sermon on the Mount, the Lord is setting forth a moral vision. He is describing the transformed human person. He is doing more than uttering moralisms or new duties, he is painting a picture of what happens to us when he lives his life in us through his indwelling Holy Spirit. You might say he is describing the normal

Christian life, which is to be in a life-changing, transformative relationship with God. It is in this way that we attain, in stages to being perfect as the heavenly Father is perfect.

Thus being perfect isn't just something we start doing today. It is something we grow into, until it is... perfected in us.

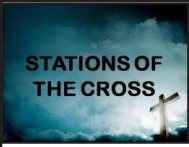

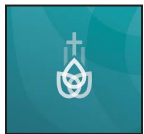

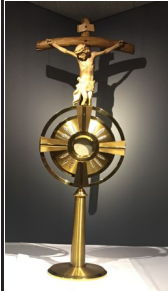

## Musings from Joy

Over the next several weeks, I would like to share with you another article from the National Association of Pastoral Musicians titled, “**Come and See...and Hear...and Sing.**” Here is Part I:

*“What do young Catholics want from the liturgy? How do ‘we’ (whoever we are) reach ‘them’ (whoever they are)? How do ‘they’ reach ‘us’ to answer questions or to proclaim the faith that is in them? How do we work together to be faithful people? The first mistake in asking questions like this is considering that ‘young Catholics’ all have similar interests, similar understandings of liturgy and Church, and even similar interests in music. **Young Catholics are not a monolith; they are as diverse as any other age group.** And what will draw them into the Church’s liturgical life and keep them interested while they deepen their understanding and participation is as diverse as Gregorian chant and Matt Maher, organ and drum sets, Latin and vernacular translations, simple and elaborate ritual, country churches and great cathedrals. What young Catholics do have in common is what we all have in common: the need for witnesses who show us by their lives what is important, what has meaning, and how to be whole. **We don’t have to agree with these witnesses all at once; we may even argue with them or choose for a time to ignore them.** But these are the people who make us wonder about the way we’re living and what it means, who offer us an alternative way to exist that, finally, becomes a way that we’re willing to make our own. In this sense, we’re all like those disciples of John the Baptist who approach Jesus in the early chapters of the fourth Gospel. Jesus asks them—as he asks us: ‘What are you looking for?’ When they stammer out that they’d like to know where he lives, he says: ‘**Come and see...**”<sup>1</sup>*

I was inspired to share this with you because of its consideration of our younger parishioners. As with many things, it is impossible to please everyone all at the same time. How can we be more aware of our young people and the myriad of things they desire out of music in the liturgy? As an adolescent myself, my taste in church music would have been very different from my peers. How can we reconcile this?

**First Communion:** Please join us for the Praying in Color Learning Centers for children and parents.

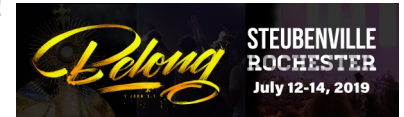
