Lenten Pastoral Answers

Question: I am a contractor who did some work for some cousins. They cheated me out of a significant amount of money. Strangely, I still get invited to family functions by them as if nothing happened. But I don't want anything to do with them. Does forgiveness require me to accept invitations and be friendly?

Answer: Forgiveness involves letting go of the need to change the past. Through forgiveness, we are able to let go of our resentments, our desire for revenge, and wrathful anger that often accompanies hurts or injustices we experience. In most cases, forgiveness does permit us to resume or stay in relationships with people. In many situations, the hurts are slight, and the issues are more of the moment rather than involving ongoing and very unhealthy aspects of our relationships with others.

But there are times when it is simply not wise to continue in relationships where there is ongoing sin, injustice or harm. A woman may forgive her husband for the repeated physical abuse he has inflicted on her in the past. She may understand that his anger comes from the fact that he himself was abused as a child. She may, by the grace of forgiveness, harbor no anger or resentment. But it does not follow that forgiveness means she should resume a common household with him. This might further endanger her and her children. It might also deepen the father's pathology and delay him getting the help he needs.

In your case, there may be reasons for you to stay clear of the family members who cheated you. You would not be rude or wrathful to them, but it does not mean you are required to be jovial and pretend that nothing happened. On the other hand, what is to prevent a forthright conversation between you all about what happened? Too often, enough effort is not made to find greater understanding.

I cannot say what is best for you. I can only communicate the principles that forgiveness does often mean that the parties involved share this gift in order to further and deepen the relationship. But as stated, there are exceptions to this and forgiveness does not always require resuming unhealthy situations that really benefit neither party. (Taken from Msgr. Musings from Joy

This week we will explore the final part of our NPM article, "**Come and See…and Hear…and Sing**." Remember from last week, it considered the "invitation" to participation:

"When we think about inviting young people through our" own witness and encouraging them to be witnesses themselves, and when they think about doing that for us, we need to remember that the Father's house has many dwelling places (John 14:2) and that there are many paths on which people are guided by the one Spirit. There is a rich treasury of music that we can use at worship. **In** our diversity, not everything will appeal to everyone, just as not every form of private prayer or every form of spirituality will appeal to every believer. <u>We</u> can't offer everything for everyone; after all, music is a servant of the liturgy, not something added onto the liturgical act or stuck in to provide entertainment. But what we can do is this: Realize how foundational music ministry is in expressing and proclaiming the faith and then treat our ministry accordingly. What we do, after all, is proclaim the Word of God and the mystery of faith in song; we should do that as well as we can, using the best resources available, being the best witnesses we can be, so that everyone can hear the invitation we sing: "Come and see."1

I cannot express how much this summary does in terms of putting music ministry into focus for all to understand. Indeed, music at Mass will never be universally liked. "We can't offer everything for everyone." However, we can do the best we can with the resources we have and with the ministers we are blessed to work with. What are your thoughts on this?

With the changes coming to the Mass times this summer, I have been praying long and hard about the direction the Music Ministry is heading in for the future. Although I won't give away too much yet, I sincerely hope that our offerings next school year for Music Ministry participation will appeal to many of you. My hope is that anyone who wants to participate in Music Ministry in ANY capacity will be compelled and able to do so, no matter which Mass one attends over the weekend.
