## Weekly Words from The Rock

### Easter Reflection Answers

Happy Easter! The Easter story takes me back in time. When we were very young, on Easter morn, the Easter bunny used to come and leave an Easter basket for each of us children. It had what would be expected – chocolate, colored eggs, a marshmallow Easter bunny. As we got older, the Easter bunny became more creative. What used to be set out in plain sight was something that now needed to be searched for and found. The Easter bunny was good at hiding. Everything on the main level of our home was fair game – laundry room, dining room, kitchen, living room, piano room. I am still not certain if everything was ever found.

What the Easter bunny brings is gifts and Easter speaks of the greatest gift. It is a gift that is to be brought into every home. The gift is Jesus Christ. For three years, Jesus taught, healed and preached. He chose twelve apostles to journey with him and gave them the great commission before ascending to the right hand of the Father: "Go to all nations, make disciples, and baptize" (see Matthew 28:16-20). Within the words of that great commission, Jesus told his disciples to make disciples, meaning others, after you to carry my words to the ends of the earth. We, too, by our baptismal calling, are to make disciples; people after us who will continue to spread the gospel to the four corners of the world.

However, before that great commission, Jesus suffered the cruel fate of crucifixion. To many, it was a time of joy and relief. Finally, this Jesus had been silenced. 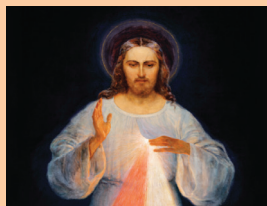

## St. Francis School News

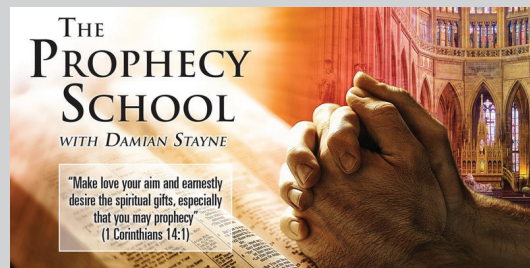
There will be No School on Easter Monday. Classes

# Musical Musings from Joy

Alleluia, He is Risen! I would like to take this opportunity to thank our choirs and musicians for all of their hard work and dedication over these last several weeks in preparing for the Triduum and Easter liturgies. The strength of our program has only grown since I began in 2017, and I am consistently in awe of all those who give so freely of their time and talent to the Resurrection Music Ministry.

If you are interested in giving the Music Ministry a free "try," mark your calendars for the weekend of June 15/16, when we will be having our first "OPEN SING" of the summer season. No rehearsal required – simply come on up to the choir and join us in singing at Mass!



The Easter sequence at all Masses on Easter Sunday, the "Sequence" was sung immediately before the Gospel Acclamation. (Christians, to the Paschal Victim.) What was this exactly? And does it only occur on Easter Sunday?



A Sequence is a chant or a hymn that is sung before the Gospel on many feast days throughout the Church year. It used to be immediately before the Gospel, but was reordered in recent years to be before the Gospel Acclamation, instead. Sequences actually fall into their own musical category due to rhyming couplets. Would you believe that *Adeste Fideles* (O Come, All Ye Faithful) was actually written as a Sequence?

After the Council of Trent in the 1500s, the number of Sequences in the Roman Missal was reduced to four: one each for Easter Sunday, Pentecost (*Veni, Sancte Spiritus*), Corpus Christi (*Lauda Sion/Laud, O Zion*), and All Souls Day (*Dies Irae*). Not long after, the Sequence for Our Lady of Sorrows (*Stabat Mater*) was added to the list. The *Dies Irae* met its end post-Vatican II, and is no longer used for All Souls Day. Only the Sequences for Easter Sunday and Pentecost are required, while the others are optional.

I encourage you to look up these Sequences and especially read over today's. What does it tell you? How does it put the Gospel into perspective? Do you think Sequences are too much, especially on longer feast days? I'd be curious to hear your thoughts!
