## Weekly Words from The Rock

### Question and Answer

Question: I recently became Catholic and keep hearing about all of the stuff you have that is “blessed.” Someone gave me a holy card that they said had been blessed. I like the idea; I just don’t know what it means for something to be blessed.

Answer: You are correct in noting that almost anything can be blessed. For a thing to be blessed means that it becomes holy. In fact, we often use the two words interchangeably. They convey the same sense of being “set apart.” In the Old Testament, God calls his people to be holy, or he tells them that the Sabbath day will be “holy unto the Lord.” This particular sense of holiness highlights the “otherness” of someone or something which is blessed. It is no longer ordinary but has been “set apart.”

If we stop a moment and consider what it meant for Israel to be holy in practical terms, we quickly see that it means that they had to be different. For God’s Chosen People to be “blessed” or “holy,” it would mean that they couldn’t just look like everyone else. They would have to conduct themselves differently. This is one of the reasons the People of Israel had so many unusual laws governing what they ate and what they wore. They were set apart, and this meant that they had to live the blessing – they had to live differently.

Now, to be “blessed” did not merely mean to be “set apart.” It meant to be set apart for something. There is no virtue in simply being different. Israel was holy because it was set apart for the Lord. To be blessed (or to have an object blessed) is to be set apart for a purpose.

Another way to word it: To be blessed is to be set apart for God’s purposes. It is not simply to be “removed from use,” but to be “elevated to a higher purpose and use.” You could also think of the term “consecrated.” In this sense, you could see how certain people or things were “consecrated” for a purpose: how Samson and John the Baptist were both consecrated from the womb, or how the altar in the Temple was consecrated for the worship of God.

When we bring forth an object or a person to be blessed, we are presenting that person or thing to God so that (by the power of the Holy Spirit and the invocation of the name of Jesus), they would be set apart for God’s purposes. For example, many people will ask me if I can bless their cross on a chain or a bracelet. When they bring it to me, it is merely jewelry. But after it is blessed, it ceases to be jewelry that is nothing more than an accessory to one’s outfit: That object has been set apart for a purpose. It will still be worn like jewelry, but the purpose for which it is worn has been changed because the object has been consecrated for a higher

purpose. In the case of the cross around one’s neck, the higher use is that it will, from then on, only point to Christ and his saving death and resurrection.

Why do we do this, though? Why bless ordinary objects around us? We do this for the simple reason that we are very much like ancient Israel. Our tendency is to want to be just like everyone else. Having all of these reminders around us that have been consecrated to the Lord assists us and reminds us that we too have been consecrated to God.

Think of part of the Mass on the feast day of St. Blaise, February 3. On that day, people show up to have their throats blessed. The prayer reads like this: “Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may the Lord deliver from every disease of the throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.” It is a prayer of healing and blessing. But consider this: for a thing to be blessed is for that thing to be consecrated for a purpose. All of those who present themselves (and their throats) to be blessed are essentially offering their throats to be set apart for God’s purposes. I like reflecting on this and being reminded that I must use my throat – my voice for God’s purposes only. If my throat has been blessed, then it is no longer merely “my throat,” and I cannot use it however I want; I have to use it to point to Jesus and his saving death and resurrection.



### Ministers to Sung Worship: The Choir

Over the next several weeks, I will be sharing with you an article from the National Association of Pastoral Musicians on “The Choir.” I ask each of you to reflect on its message and pray about whether or not Music Ministry may be something you want to try!

*“When congregational singing was introduced into the celebration of the Sunday liturgy in the 1960s, many musicians, clergy, and ordinary Catholics thought that there would no longer be a need for choirs. As it turned out, however, **choirs are more needed than ever.** Liturgical documents highlight the choir’s ministry, and pastoral experience has demonstrated **the choir’s importance in supporting and leading the singing of the whole assembly.** In fact, many parishes today boast a variety of choirs that sing music in various styles. In addition to the standard **mixed-voice adult choir**, there are **Gospel choirs, contemporary music ensembles, children’s choirs, youth choirs, funeral choirs, and family choirs.**”<sup>1</sup>*

As you can see, Resurrection has a group for several of the various choirs suggested by this post. What Mass do you most often frequent? Do you hear the Adult Choir regularly at the 8:30am Mass? What about the Family Folk Group at 8pm? Our various young voices minister at 10am, and our new, contemporary St. Cecilia Singers are at 11:30am. Do you prefer when a choir leads the singing, or when it is a cantor alone? How do you feel about seeing a mix of generations in the choir area at a given Mass?


