

Musical Musings from Joy

This week, we will look at the fifth and final principle from our NPM article, "How Firm a Foundation": "5. Music Is an Integral Part of the Solemn Liturgy.

Of all the arts, music is the one most useful to and expressive of liturgy's goals because it unites to the texts we proclaim in such a way that it adds delight to prayer, fosters oneness of spirit, and invests the rites with greater solemnity (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 112). Music is ubiquitous in authentic Roman (Latin) Rite liturgy, not only in the specific musical selections that the rite includes but also in every element of ritual celebration: tempo, rhythm, pitch, silence, timbre, tension and release, harmony and dissonance.

Music contributes to the complex set of symbols that constitute the liturgy in a unique and irreplaceable way that enlivens the other symbolic elements. Its purpose as an integral part of the liturgy, in other words, is the same as the purpose of liturgy itself: "the glory of God and the sanctification of the faithful" (SC, 112)."1

What thoughts strike you in reading this? Think back to various churches or parishes you have been involved with in your life...

What was the music like?
Did it aid or hinder your worship?
What style of music means the most to you?
Do you participate in music, either as a member of the congregation or the choir? Even if you do not sing along, do you still open the hymnal and read the words as they are being sung? Why or why not?

I hope you have enjoyed this series on "How Firm a Foundation: Basic Principles of the Liturgy," that we have been exploring over this last month. It is my hope that this information only strengthened what you already know about the Mass and liturgies you experience.

Faith Formation

News from Stacey, Grades 1-5, Family Ministry, dre1to5fm@rescathroch.org

When people ask me what I do, I have several ready responses because my mission changes a little bit every day. While I am called to be wife and mother, I have a mission field with the elementary age children and their families. Some days I'm a director of faith formation or a



catechist, and other days, I'm a person who guides or prays. Sometimes, I tell others that I work

for God, and sometimes, I say that I'm a gardener. Yes, a gardener for God! I am in the business of planting seeds. Small bits of faith knowledge are sown and reaped every day. It's my mission to plant as many seeds as I can



while I'm still living. As faith formation director at Resurrection, I prepare the lessons for the catechists that meet for classes on Monday evenings. Each grade has a workbook to read from and many extra activities that make for a fast, fun, and faith-filled hour. I'm always looking for more workers. In Luke 10, we heard that "the harvest is abundant, the laborers are few." The same goes for faith formation at all levels, from birth to death, but especially in the elementary, middle and high school years. We are all called to pass on our faith to the next

generation, and they desperately need us to cultivate, water, and weed for them in our secular world. Our children and youth are being trampled and eaten alive while we sit, watch, worry, and judge. If you see this to be true and you want the world to be a better place for all but especially our children and grandchildren, then I challenge you to do as you are called to do. You do not need a degree in education, theology or psychology to give our children the knowledge, reverence, and love of our faith.

Let me tell you about one of our catechists that shared her faith with our second and third graders last year. Heidi Miksanek told me about one of the discussions she had with one child. Here's Heidi's story: "It was a typical Monday, rushing from work to get to Resurrection to teach the 2nd graders religion at 4:30. What is also typical is how 2nd graders still have a lot of energy at 4:30. Sitting still to read through the lesson is sometimes a challenge, so I mix it up with sitting and standing for various parts of the lesson—sound familiar to



something we do at Mass? On this particular Monday, we were studying the part of the Mass that is so important to our faith, the Eucharistic prayer, and we were going over our part. One of the three responses to choose from caught one child's attention. She bolted from across the room from where she was sitting and sat down next to me. She quickly pointed to the words on the page with such excitement, "Look what I just noticed! We proclaim your death and profess your resurrection, until you come again!" I said "yes, Jesus could come tomorrow or maybe not for a thousand years." Then she said, "So he could come tomorrow and say 'SURPRISE!" or if we die, we'll go to heaven and say... 'SURPRISE!" Every time we say these words at Mass, I hear her voice in my head. When rushing to Resurrection on Mondays, it

is not me teaching the 2nd graders, it's them teaching me. Thank you, Holy Spirit, for using the words of a child as an instrument to teach me to hear your Word of love with the ears of child."

As adults, we think we're the teachers. When it comes to our faith, we are told to have childlike faith. In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches us how to pray, explains that persistence pays, and tells us to knock, ask, seek, and find our way to the Father.

Do you pray about what it means to fulfill God's will in your life? Where do you find your faith is leading you? What is God asking you to do? When are you going to start living like a saint? Can you hear knocking?

God's mission field is plowed and ready for planting and I'd like you to join us on Monday evenings.
