Lenten Penitential Observance of Fasting and Abstaining.

- Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstaining.
- All Fridays in Lent are days of abstaining.
- Abstaining is defined as not eating meat. It is followed by those who are 14 years of age and older.
- Fasting is defined as only one full meal each day, nothing between meals. It pertains to those who are 18-59 years of age.

Stations of the Cross. Just a little history on my thoughts of the current Stations of the Cross in the church proper (not the Adoration chapel). The first time I saw the stations I could not determine which was the first station. With time, I guessed it to be by the Adoration chapel. Even so, I wasn't certain. A cross with two scales? Is this to depict Jesus being condemned to death? For me, as in the case of the first station, many of the stations are difficult to comprehend. Take the twelfth and thirteenth station. The twelfth station is the crucifixion. The current set of stations is represented by a simple cross. It shows no body of Jesus. The thirteenth station is the body of Jesus being taken down from the cross. We currently have the thirteenth station depicted by a piece of the cross removed and laid at the base of the cross. The body of Jesus is not present.

In light of this, I have had visitors to our parish wonder about the stations. As well as I explain, they seem confused.

What I would like to do is purchase a new set of Stations of the Cross with images of each scene leaving no confusion as to what each station depicts. This would leave the location of the first station evidently clear. They could remain where they are presently found or, depending upon size, placed in another location (such as the back wall of the church).

Issues, such as this, are sensitive and I want to respect people's thoughts and feelings. I want to respect a nyone who may have donated the current set of Stations of the Cross which adorn our walls. What I would like to do is provide people the opportunity for feedback through April 1. Finally, the current set of stations, if they are replaced, would be respected in a way consistent with their dignity. Thanks for any input.

Happy St. Patrick's Day! This Tuesday marks the Feast of the great Irish patron. Since coming to Resurrection, I have made it a tradition of singing Ag Críost an Síol after Communion the weekend nearest the holiday. This Irish-language song has a disputed origin in terms of the poem. However, we do know that the music was composed in 1968 by the great Irish liturgical composer, Seán Ó Riada. It is popular at both weddings and funerals in Ireland.

#### Here is the Irish text:

Ag Críost an síol, ag Críost an fómhar; i n-iothlainn Dé go dtugtar sinn. Ag Críost an mhuir, ag Críost an t-iasc; i líonta Dé go gcastar sinn.

Ó fhás go h-aois, is ó aois go bás, do dhá láimh, a Chríost, anall tharainn. Ó bhás go críoch, ní críoch ach athfhás, i bParthas na ngrás go rabhaimid.

#### Here is the English translation:

Christ's is the seed, Christ's is the crop, in the barn of God may we be brought. Christ's is the sea, Christ's is the fish, in the nets of God may we be caught.

From growth to age, from age to death, Thy two arms, O Christ, about us. From death to end, not end but rebirth, in blessed Paradise may we be.

Another fun fact: "Gaelic" is the GROUP of languages spoken by those in Ireland, Scotland, and the Isle of Man. "Irish" is the language spoken in Ireland. (Not widely, mind you, but it is a compulsory subject in the schools!) However, the Irish word for the language is Gaeilge, which does make it confusing!

For all Families:

" What do we do when our children don't want to come to church, or for that matter, when we as parents struggle with coming to Mass?"

Working at the parish, I hear many stories of families struggling to commit to weekly Mass attendance. Sports and work schedules seem to be the main culprit. The good news is that

our Rochester Catholic parishes offers many different Mass times. This past weekend my family and I attended 4:30pm at St. Francis on Saturday. Other Saturday Mass opportunities include: St. Pius at 4pm, Holy Spirit, Co-Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, and St. Mary's Hospital all at 4:30pm. St. Bernard's at 5pm, Pax Christ at 5:15pm, and here at Resurrection 8pm. When we put our mind to it, we can figure out a time that works. I have a print out of all Rochester (and Stewartville) Mass times if you are interested in a copy email me!

"That's great and all but what can we DO to change the temperament of our hearts desire to attend Mass?" Here is a quote and a suggested action that I read in a short book "Pep Talks for Catholic Parents Encouragement, Support, Guidance" by Connie Clark. "We can do nothing on our own, but Jesus will bring our children to him in his time and way. Trust him." To me, that means pray and ask Jesus for help. Here is a "to do and prayer" that I have found indeed make a difference:

TO DO: Get some holy water from church to keep in your home. Bless your car, your child's room, bed, and toys—anything with it!

PRAY: Angel of God, stir up the waters of baptism so that my child may respond to the Father's love.
