Our Next Questions and Answers

My Catholic Life has a series of questions and answers on the Catholic Faith. It can be found at the site, "Ouestions and Answers from My Catholic Life!" I am going to share with you some of their questions and answers in the week ahead. With that, let us begin.

Q. Why did Adam eat the apple? A. The simple answer is that he was persuaded by the serpent (the devil) that eating the apple would be to his benefit. That he would "become like God" if he ate it. Sadly, Adam believed this lie and chose to disobey God who told him not to eat it. This was the first sin and resulted in humanity falling from what we call Original Innocence. But to give a more thorough explanation, let's consider the entire story in a broader way.

First of all, did Adam actually eat the apple? Perhaps, but perhaps not. It's important to understand that this story is not to read in a "literal" way. But that doesn't mean it's not true. A good explanation of this comes from Cardinal Ratzinger in his book "In the Beginning A Catholic Understanding of the Story of Creation and the Fall" (Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing). In that book, Cardinal Ratzinger (who later became Pope Benedict XVI) stated, "It has become clear that the biblical creation narratives represent another way of speaking about reality than that with which we are familiar from physics and biology." He went on to explain that these stories "represent truth in the way that symbols do — just as, for example, a Gothic window gives us a deep insight into reality, thanks to the effects of light that it produces and to the figures that is portrays." In other words, the story of Adam and Eve is true, but not necessarily in the way a science book is. A science book presents truth in a literal way, explaining the physical truths as they are in this world. The story of Adam and Eve presents truth in the form of a symbolic narrative. Whether or not Adam actually ate the apple in the literal way explained in that symbolic narrative is not important. What is important is the truth that narrative presents.

So what is the truth it presents? The fact is that our first parents turned from God in disobedience. The consequence was a fall from the original state of innocence and union with God that they were made for. Therefore, the answer remains that Adam "ate the fruit" for selfish motivations because he believed the lie that disobeying God was better for him. He was selfish and failed to trust the truth of God.

We are considering options for holding the event at a future date, but no decisions have been made as of yet about when or how this might happen.

Guidelines when we have public Mass

Once public Mass is re-opened the following guidelines will be in place:

- A. The dispensation from the obligation of Sunday Mass remains in effect until further notice.
- B. Those over age 65 and those with underlying health conditions will be strongly encouraged not to attend.
- C. Anyone showing any symptoms of sickness, or anyone who has a household member who is sick or showing signs of sickness should not come to Church. While much effort will be put into sanitizing the parish facilities, risks still remain for those who choose to attend.
- D. The worship space will be thoroughly sanitized before and after each service, including entryways and doors.
- E. All fonts which contain holy water will be empty. This includes the font from which people take holy water home. If you would like holy water to take home, call the Parish Office to set a time to have a priest bless water for you.
- F. Hymnals will be removed.
- G. Hand sanitizers will be available at all entryways.
- H. People will be instructed not to greet each other by touching.
- I. To reduce the spread of the virus, parishioners are encouraged to attend Mass only at their parish.
- J. Face coverings such as masks are highly encouraged.

While still not knowing when public Mass will be held, we are in the process of beginning to implement procedures once public Mass is re-instated.

We will need to sanitize our church, along with the church and entry doors after Daily Mass. Before Daily Mass can be held, we will need volunteers that will stay after Mass to sanitize. We will have the cleaning/disinfecting supplies available. Please contact the office to volunteer.
