Weekly Words from The Rock

My Catholic Life has a series of questions and answers on the Catholic Faith. It can be found at the site "Catholic Questions and Answers: Questions and Answers from My Catholic Life!" I am going to share with you some of their questions and answers in the weeks ahead.

Q. If Adam and Eve didn't eat the fruit, would Jesus still die on the cross?

A. No. Jesus' death was because of our sin. Therefore, had sin never entered the world, Jesus would not have had to die. This question, however, can only be answered in a "theoretical" way since Adam, Eve, and all of us did sin.

Though this question is difficult to answer in a short and simplified way, let's consider an analogy. Let's say that your parents ate poison. The result of this poison is death. The only cure for this poison is to receive a transfusion of new and healthy blood from someone not affected. By analogy, you could say that Jesus entered the world without any effects of this "poison" so that He could offer the divine "transfusion" to Adam and Eve and all their descendants affected by the poison of sin. Thus, the blood of Jesus is what heals us as we receive this blood poured forth from the Sacrifice of the Cross. We receive His saving blood by accepting Him into our lives, especially through the Sacraments and faith.

But this question brings up another more interesting question. If Adam and Eve (and all us who descended from them) never sinned, would God the Son have become human? Would He have taken on human flesh through the Incarnation by the Virgin Mary? Though the death of Jesus was on account of our sin, His Incarnation (becoming human) was not solely so that He could die for our sin. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains that one of the primary reasons for His Incarnation was "in order to save us by reconciling us with God," but it also identifies three other reasons: "so that thus we might know God's love" "to be our model of holiness"; and "to make us 'partakers of the divine nature" (See CCC #457-460). Therefore, it is speculated by some that even if there was no sin, God would have become flesh so as to fulfill these other effects of the Incarnation. Perhaps that's a bit deep and is only speculation, but it's beautiful to reflect upon nonetheless!

Quite a Problem for Father Schuster?

It has been a few weeks still I should tackle the question I posed in my column of May 3. The inland lakes for Iowa opened to walleye fishing the weekend of May 2-3. I had an invitation to fish off a man's dock on Spirit Lake. Here were some of the musings going through my mind:

-Should I go? After all, it is about 180 miles one way. -In determining the answer to the above question one should ask, when does the best bite occur fishing off a dock? The best bite occurs at sunset and into the night. Thus, one might have to fish till midnight then make the 180 mile drive home.

-Should I purchase a one day, five day or yearly license?

-With so many people fishing on a dock, I considered pulling my boat. Do the math. The gas mileage one gets while pulling a boat is 11 miles per gallon at best. To make 360 miles, I would need 33 gallons of fuel. My pickup holds 26 gallons so at some point during the trip I would have to stop and fuel up.

So what happened? In the end, I chose not to go. I just felt it was too far to drive for three hours of fishing. Wise? Foolish? I leave that to your judgment.
