# Weekly Words from The Rock

My Catholic Life has a series of questions and answers on the Catholic Faith. It can be found at the site "Catholic Questions and Answers: Questions and Answers from My Catholic Life!" I am going to share with you some of their questions and answers in the weeks ahead

Q. Why is it that on Sundays you can do whatever you gave up for lent?

A. Ah, yes, this is one of those things that many people do not realize. I think the answer could be given in two different ways. There is no clear teaching on this since giving something up in Lent is more of a personal sacrifice, even though it is encouraged as a Church discipline. Let me share the two approaches you could take.

First of all, there are those who prefer to give something up all of Lent. That means from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday and every day in between. This is certainly a good practice and one that will bring with it much merit. The rational would be that Jesus fasted in the desert for forty days and did not have any breaks or moments of feasting. Additionally, as a Church we do have a penitential attitude even toward Sundays in Lent, in that we keep the Church decorated in a very simple way, wear purple as a sign of penance, and refrain from singing the Gloria and the Alleluia. These are all ways we keep the attitude of penance even on Sundays.

However, with that said, it's also important to point out that Sundays are Solemnities within the Church. A Solemnity is a day of the greatest celebration and especially focuses upon the entire action of Christ's life, death AND resurrection. So Sundays are not technically to be days of fast; rather, they are to be days of feasting!

As a child I remember approaching Lent in this way and have always continued this practice. For me, it has always been a welcome moment of rest from the penance of Lent and has helped me remember that the joy of Easter is the final goal of any fasting and penance. Psychologically and spiritually it seems good to celebrate these mini-celebrations of Easter every Sunday, and it seems to help make the days of fasting more meaningful. It adds a certain rhythm to the week, focusing on both celebration and penance at the appropriate times.

Additionally, there are two other solemnities within Lent that some will choose to treat as a Sunday. The Solemnity of St. Joseph is on March 19, and the Solemnity of the Annunciation is on March 25 (nine months before Christmas marking the Incarnation). These days, being Solemnities within our Church, are celebrated with the same joy as Sunday. Therefore, it would be understandable if you decided to give up your Lenten sacrifice on those days also.

The bottom line is that sacrifice and penance is for a purpose. It's a means to an end, not an end in itself. In other words, our ultimate goal is not sacrifice and penance; rather, our ultimate goal is the resurrection. Penance helps us on that journey but penance should never be seen as the final end.

So my recommendation is to celebrate and to celebrate all Solemnities within our Church well. This will only help make the days of penance more fruitful.

Q. My child was invited to a sleep-over at a friend's house on a Friday during Lent. I told him he could go if he promised not to eat any pizza with meat on it. When he got there, all they had was sausage and pepperoni and he had some. How do we handle this in the future? And why is meat OK on Friday the rest of the year?

A. Meat or no meat...that is the question.

It's true that the requirement to abstain from meat now only applies to Lent. In the past it applied to every Friday of the year. So one may ask the question, "Why? Is there something wrong with meat? Why is it ok during the rest of the year but not Lent?" This is a good question. Let me explain. (continued on next page).

First, there is nothing wrong with eating meat itself. Jesus ate meat and this is a part of God's plan for our lives. Of course there is no obligation to eat either. One is free to be a vegetarian, but not required.

So what's the deal with not eating meat on Fridays in Lent? It's simply a universal law of abstinence decided upon by the Catholic Church. What I mean is that our Church sees great value in offering sacrifice to God. In fact, our universal Church law is that every Friday of the year is to be a day of fasting of some sort. It's only in Lent that we are asked to sacrifice in the specific way of giving up meat on Fridays. This is of great value to the entire Church in that we all share in the same sacrifice during Lent together. This unites us in our sacrifice and enables us to share a common bond.

But your question also has another component to it. What about your child accepting an invitation to a friend's house on Fridays during Lent in the future? I'd also suggest that this could be a good opportunity for your family to share your faith. So, if there is another invitation, you could simply share your concern with the other parent that, as a Catholic, you give up meat on Fridays in Lent. Perhaps this will lead to a good discussion

And don't forget that this small sacrifice is given to us as a way of better sharing in the one sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross! Therefore, this little sacrifice has great potential to help us become more like Him.

I love it when my friends start conversing about faith, especially when one of them spouts off some fancy term that no one else in the room has heard of before. When that happens, the rest of us react using of three scenarios:

Scenario One: We pretend that everything just said is obvious, common knowledge to anyone who knows anything.

Scenario Two: We realize we need to call that person from the place with the thing and hightail it on out of there.

Scenario Three (And by far the least common): We ask what that term means.

It can be hard for us as humans to admit we don't know everything, especially when it comes to our faith. In reality, there are a lot of things we cannot fully understand, even in our own relationship with God. We don't call it Christ's Paschal "Mystery" for nothing! But let me ease that fear with a quote from Sister Kathleen Hughes when she explained the beauty of liturgy: "The mystery of Christ is made visible when God's holy people actively participate in the same Eucharist, at a single altar, each according to his or her role."

So what does this mean, exactly? Well, it means that if we are active in our faith, Christ will always become visible to us and through us. How incredible is that, really? So when you have questions, be active and ask them aloud. Read the bible and other sacred texts. Have discussions about your faith. Participate in the Mass. Pray. Let's be an active church, one Body of Christ, that makes Christ visible for others to see.

Survivors often carry guilt about not telling, even though that protective behavior is very, very common. Many survivors wait years or decades before speaking their truth. This training goes into detail about why for many survivors disclosures are either delayed or don't happen, the process of disclosing, and what disclosure teaches us about prevention.

Presenter is Alison Feigh, MS, Director of Jacob Wetterling Resource Center, a program of Zero Abuse Project. In her role as a subject matter expert on child and teen safety, she works with students, parents, youth workers, faith leaders, law enforcement and the media to help prevent childhood abuse and abductions. Alison's work also includes writing curriculum for youth-serving organizations, training professionals about online challenges kids face and advocating for families of the missing.

**Grades 1-5:** Faith Formation classes are meeting on Monday, February 1st at 4:30 and 6:00pm. It is great to have the children, parents, and catechists back in church again.

First Communion: If you missed our parent meeting on Monday, January 18th, please contact me to set up a time to pick up your child's yellow folder and cover the information related to First Communion this year. Families will be doing chapter 1 and 2 in your Eucharist workbook.

**Teaching Kids to Respect Others**: This week our focus chapter is called "Sometimes We Fail to Care." When we prepare children for their first reconciliation, we use the language of loving/unloving choices.

The unloving choices are sins they want to confess, receive absolution, and make amends. One way to teach children about unloving choices is to practice reconciliation among family members and then going to confession from time to time. Children learn when parents model the choice to go to confession. Give children the choice, don't make them go. Teaching them sincerity will foster a better appreciation for the sacrament.

It is a Christian virtue to acknowledge our sinfulness, ask for forgiveness, and to be merciful toward others. Yes, sometimes we fail to care for others, and sometimes it is a loving choice to let someone else love them. Either way, we know it is always right to pray for others because they are all God's children.
