Weekly Words from The Rock

Warning to Jerusalem. Msgr. Charles Pope, in the April 10, 2016 edition of Our Sunday Visitor, page 15, looks at a question regarding the warning of Jerusalem by Jesus in the Passion story.

Question: What did Jesus mean on the way of the cross when he said to the women who lamented him: "For if these things are done when the wood is green what will happen when it is dry?" (Luke 23:31).

Answer: Most of the commentaries, ancient and modern, see this as a contrast between the innocent and virtuous Lord and a people grown sinful and lacking in virtue. Jesus is the green wood, and green wood has life and bears fruit.

So Jesus says, in effect, to the women who weep: if then the Romans have so raged against me, a fruitbearing and ever-flourishing tree, what will they not attempt against a people who are a dry tree, destitute of every life-giving virtue, and bearing no fruit?

Historically, the Lord was indicating the destruction of Jerusalem. That destruction did come 40 years later when the Romans, on account of a Jewish uprising, utterly destroyed Jerusalem. Josephus, a Jewish historian of the time, said that 1.2 million Jews lost their lives in the final siege and destruction of Jerusalem. It was indeed a horrible suffering and atrocity.

Jesus' lament with this women on his way of the cross echoed his sad lament earlier, a desire to save his people: "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how many times I yearned to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, but you were unwilling! Behold, your house will be abandoned" (Luke 13:34-35).

And similar historical patterns have beset individuals, nations and empires that fall away from the green wood of virtue to become the dry wood destined for fire.





Prayer, fasting, almsgiving. This week: prayer.

For my prayer today, I thanked God for all the suffering I've faced throughout my life, including the classmates that bullied me, the teachers who belittled me, my bouts of loneliness and depression, the church that told me I wasn't welcome, watching those dear to me suffer or die, moving to the desert, the stomach problems I used to have, and all the times I selfishly hurt others. Many of you are probably reading this and thinking, "Why? Is she crazy?" Well, in answer to the latter, yes, and proud of it!

As to the former, I challenge you to think about the suffering you've faced in your life, and I ask you: Have you grown because of them? Being victimized taught me more about compassion for others than I could have ever learned elsewhere, especially for the victimizer. Grieving those I've lost allowed me to confront my morality and seek a greater desire to live a life of Christ on earth. Living in areas I never wanted to be taught me humility and an acceptance to follow God's will.

Suffering is difficult, painful. I know I don't have to tell you that. But remember that suffering, more than anything, brings us ever closer to Christ. Through it, we are given new opportunities to learn and love in ways we never could have before. So thank God for the heartbreaks, the grief, the sorrows, and the pain, and offer them all up to his Holy Name. And if the pain becomes too much for you, don't forget that there is a community right here desiring to listen, love and support you.

News from Sheila, Birth-KG, Grs 6-12, Children & Youth Ministry, dresscm@rescathroch.org December 8th, 2020 marked the 150th Anniversary of St. Joseph being declared the Patron of the Universal Church. With that, Pope Francis proclaimed a "Year of St. Joseph" through December 8th, 2021.

To honor the year of Saint Joseph, Faith Formation students learned about the foster father of Jesus. Students were introduced to praying novenas and even kicked off day one of the Novena to St. Joseph which began on the same night as Faith Formation Class– March 10th.

The following excerpt is from the EWTN website (https://www.ewtn.com/catholicism/devotions/novena-to-st-joseph-304): We know Joseph was a man of faith, obedient to whatever God asked of him without knowing the outcome. When the angel came to Joseph in a dream and told him the truth about the child Mary was carrying, Joseph immediately and without question or concern for gossip, took Mary as his wife.

When the angel came again to tell him that his family was in danger, he immediately left everything he owned, all his family and friends, and fled to a strange country with his young wife and the baby. He waited in Egypt without question until the angel told him it was safe to go back.

Remember, O most pure spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, my great protector, Saint Joseph, that no one ever had recourse to your protection, or implored your aid without obtaining relief. Confiding therefore in your goodness, I come before you. Do not turn down my petitions, foster father of the Redeemer, but graciously receive them. St. Joseph, pray for us. Amen.
