Weekly Words from The Rock

I want to address three questions asked of Bishop Frederick Campbell and his subsequent answers.

Question 1: In the Gospel of Matthew (26:26-27), it reads, "Then he took the cup, gave thanks and offered it to them saying, 'Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for the many for the forgiveness of sins.'" Can you explain to me the "new covenant?"

Answer: The term "covenant" is used in both the Old and New Testament to describe the relationship between God and his people. This relationship is marked by God's faithfulness to his promises, his merciful love and the willingness of his people to follow his law. The covenant was sealed by a blood sacrifice (e.g., Exodus 24:3-8).

At various times, the people broke the covenant through their faithlessness and sin, but God, in his fidelity and love, would call the people back. The prophet Jeremiah spoke of a new and everlasting covenant that God would write on the hearts of his people (Jeremiah 31:31-34). Christians believe that Jesus fulfilled this prophecy and established the new covenant in his blood shed on the cross, a covenant in which faithful Christians participate when they participate worthily in the Holy Eucharist – receiving the body and blood of Christ – and follow the commandments of Christ.

Question 2: In our present time, I have heard some talk about the "just-war theory." What is this, and how did it come about?

Answer: The just-war theory is the result of a long theological discussion seeking to provide an answer to the question, "Can a Christian go to war?" The question became pertinent when Christianity was recognized as a legal religion in the Roman Empire, although it was not until the 16th and 17th centuries that the just-war theory developed into its present form. A complete discuss of the theory would require (and has already) a book-length examination. In

the most simple terms, the theory has two parts, one dealing with the decision to wage war and the second the manner in which war is to be waged.

No matter how sophisticated the theory seems, it is rooted in a fairly straightforward belief that there exists a serious obligation, in charity, to defend innocent life from unjust attack, whether in defense of another or in self-defense. More recently, there has been a great deal of discussion about the adequacy of parts of the theory to modern conditions and the relationship of this theory to Christian pacifism and nonviolence. Pacifism remands the choice of any individual Christian as a powerful sign of the peace of God's kingdom. Yet, governments, although always to be peaceable, cannot be strictly pacifist, for they have a fundamental responsibility to protect the lives of their citizens from the unjust attack of the aggressor.

Question 3: How did the symbols of a young man, a lion, an ox and an eagle come to be associated with the evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke and John?

Answer: The association of these symbols with the writers of the Gospels originated in a vision found in the Book of Revelation (4:6-10) of four beasts surrounding the heavenly throne. This vision is itself a reflection of the vision of the prophet Ezekiel (1:10-12). The young man came to be connected with Matthew apparently because his genealogy stresses the human origins of Jesus. Tradition associated the lion with Mark because this beast represented the resurrection from the dead and the inheritance of King David, the Lion of Judah. The ox represented patience and sacrifice, themes stressed in the Gospel of Luke. The ancient world thought that the eagle was the bird that could fly nearest to heaven and could gaze directly into the sun. The early Church believed that the Gospel of John was the most theological and spiritual of the four Gospels and expressed most deeply the meaning of Christ. Therefore, the association of the eagle with John.
