Weekly Words from The Rock

What If...

What if... How many times we hear those words. What if I was tall. What if I was short. What if I was smart. The list never ends. So let us add one to it today. What if Father Schuster had a metal detector. It isn't such a far-fetched thought. Take it to a park or beach and see what he could find. Let us lay out a story.

One day I decide to set out on a metal detecting adventure. I start my search in the backyard of the rectory. I get a hit and dig. Hoping it is gold, it turns out to be a nail. I get another hit and temper my expectations. This time it is a steel bolt. This goes on and on until finally my metal detector goes wild. This signal is beyond any Father Schuster has ever encountered. With that, the digging begins. I dig and dig and dig. Each time I pause I check my digging with the metal detector thinking I have been fooled. However, the signal becomes stronger. With renewed hope, the digging commences.

This dig turns into hours until all of a sudden I feel a heat so intense that it makes 100 degree heat feel like a deep freeze. Next, I begin hearing sounds of agony, pain and anger. Finding this strange, I finally dig myself to an opening and look through. Lo and behold, Father Schuster has dug so deep that he has found his way to the gates of hell.

Then things get "heated." A face appears in the hole. It is menacing, angry and hostile. The voice says, "Would you close up the hole? You are letting out the heat down here." I say, "Not so fast. Who goes there?" The voice responds, "This is Satan." "Satan," I respond, "why is my metal detector still giving me a ping? There is no gold in hell." Satan responds, "You fool. What you are after is on the other side of hell. If you would have begun digging on the other side of the world, you would have what you are after and would be leaving me alone. Now get out of here." "Hold it," I say, "I am going to ask a few questions of you. Question 1: Why don't you call Mary, the Mother of Jesus by her real name. You always say things like "that woman." The response comes, "Because I hate her. She never sinned. She gave birth to someone who claims he can destroy me. The list or reasons could go on and on but "that woman" makes angry to the point of fury. She actually prays for people to be away from me."

"So Satan, here is my next question. What do you think of priests?" Without skipping a beat, "I hate them too. They pray asking "that woman" to help them. They preach words of hope and peace. Such things disgust me. But above all, they feed people with the Eucharist. But from what I can hear, there is a lot of anger, groaning and pain in hell. From the sounds of it, business for you is good, too good. Many people are only fooling themselves thinking that going to heaven is an automatic. I, as a priest, am going to set out and hope to change things for you. Too, I hope that I never see you again." With that, I close the hole and figure the ping on the other side isn't worth the rest of the dig.

I, for one, do not want to get back to normal. I'm not sure what "normal" even looks like anymore. We can not return to a lackluster, wishy-washy faith after what we have endured over the past year and a half. We have been changed in ways that we are only beginning to understand. Certainly, some of us have changed for the better. Others of us have some serious work to do. I mean work physically, mentally, emotionally,

and spiritually. If our normal faith life includes weekly Mass, daily prayer, reading scripture, adoration and reconciliation when prompted by the Holy Spirit, then I'm all for it! However, this does not truthfully describe most of us. We have been given a break, given in to temptation, or given up altogether.

Let's create a new normal for ourselves. As we go forward, let our great faith, hope, and love help us carve a better way. Starting today, make a commitment to attend Mass every weekend to receive the strength and grace of the Eucharist. Fully participate in the liturgy by focusing on the words, the music, the prayers, and the consecration of the host. Spend 5 minutes a day reading the daily readings (find at USCCB.org). Take 5 minutes to talk with God at the beginning of the day and another 5 minutes at the end of your day (this is called prayer). So let's not be content with getting back to normal. Let's move forward in a better way.

Let's remember who we are: Children of God, Alleluia People, Saints in the Making! We need to start believing who we are and serving each other with love.
