Food for Friends Ministry at Resurrection

Happy summer: This past school year our ministry was successful in supporting Ben Franklin Elementary. About 120 students were recipients of weekly food items from Channel 1, supplemented with extra food items from the food shelf. A family supplied bread each week

during the school year, which was an awesome gift. We expect the number of weekly distribution to be about the same as last year. We supplied the items for the food shelf, we met the needs of winter wear and supplied tennis shoes and a number of blankets. The sock drive in February was a huge success! The support has made a difference for the children and their families. Thank you.

Coming up, backpacks are ready for you to pick up and fill with supplies for the upcoming school year.

The school supply list will be in the backpack. You may complete a grade level of supplies, and/or families may go together and fill a backpack. Choose a grade, fill the backpack, write the grade level on the tag, (which is on the backpack), and return to the church by the weekend of August 21/22.

Ben Franklin may also receive backpacks from Running Start with only a few supplies. If you do not wish to fill a complete backpack, you are welcome to purchase a few supplies. Items we supplement are composition notebooks, 8 or 10 Classic Washable markers, box of 12 colored pencils, dry erase markers and erasers, glue sticks, 8 x 5 pencil cases, post-it or sticky notes, highlighters, quart sized zip lock bags and tissues. These items can also be left at church. Do not place in a backpack. Not only do the students love and need supplies, but it helps in their success getting a good start. The staff appreciates it too!

For the coming year, the plan is to continue supporting the needs. The Food For Friends room at Franklin is being called the Community Room. This room has the food pantry, shelves for winter gear, tennis shoes, socks, clothes, personal hygiene items, and extra school supplies. It is open for students to stop by any time they have a need. We will continue to work with Jennine Staven, who reaches out to families, and the administrative team at Franklin. Support from Church of the Resurrection is amazing. *Franklin is very, very grateful.*

Those in our music ministry know that my biggest pet peeve is when things do not start on time. It probably stems from the many rehearsals I've had where directors start incredibly late and end even later. I will therefore always start right on time, particularly regarding rehearsals, meetings, and performances.

So you can probably imagine how I reacted this summer when a rehearsal that was already going to be a long three hours went an extra thirty-four minutes. The only way I was able to get through the end of it was by praying the rosary twice.

Time is a big aspect of our culture in America. We now expect fast internet, quick service, and immediate responses, especially in big cities and businesses. Impatience, then, is probably a big temptation for all of us. And there are indeed strategies to overcome it. We can take slow, deep breaths and/or mediatate. We can pray using the rosary or spend some time in the adoration chapel.

The next time you're in this situation, however, I'm going to encourage you to think about it in a new way. Think about what time really means when referring to God. God is all time. He is the Alpha and the Omega. He is forever present, on earth, in our lives, and will continue to be forever present. Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, time then becomes transformed into an everlasting moment.

So the next time you find yourself impatient, reflect on not the time we see on the clock but upon the time we have with Christ. Live in that moment with Christ, and rejoice in his ever loving grace.

"Breathe Easier" by Julie Mickler: I found this summer message of hope and wanted to share it with others. I pray all of our families are breathing easier these days.

"Having grown up in a family that spent a lot of time outdoors, I always find that time in nature refreshes my soul.

Whether at the beach, the mountains, or in my own background, I breathe easier outdoors.

Although I see and experience God everywhere, I find I'm especially drawn to trees. Their majesty, strength, and beauty are such perfect qualities to help me understand myself, the world, and God.

Looking at the branches of a tree, I notice that some grow straight, others grow unevenly, and still others bow and bend in unlikely ways. They don't fight for space; they just move and adjust, allowing for each branch to reach just enough sun. Each one is beautiful and unique on its own, but together they create a canopy that is breathtaking.
