#### Your Questions Answered....Angels

Our Sunday Visitor provided an "In Focus" on angels in its September 29-October 5, 2019 edition (pages 9-12). There is a certain fascination about angels so let us see what we can learn.

Where do angels appear in Scripture?

1. Angels appear throughout the Bible in both dreams and bodily form. The Book of Revelation recounts a vision of seven angels with trumpets standing before God (cf. Revelation 8:1-2). In the Old Testament, Jacob dreams of a ladder with angels ascending and descending (Genesis 28:10-12).

2. Angels are sent to exhibit God's strength. An angel remained guarding the tree after Adam and Eve were cast out of the garden (Genesis 3:20-24). King David and the Israelites were to be punished by God by an angel, but with repentance and sacrifice of the king, the angel relented in the plan to destroy Jerusalem (2 Samuel 24).

We will continue to learn where angels appear in Scripture next week.

The Wisdom of Fulton Sheen

I have been reading a book entitled The Wisdom of Fulton Sheen. The book shares a thread of Bishop Sheen's wisdom for each day of the year. In the weeks ahead, I would like to share some of his wisdom.

January 28 – "Curiously enough, it is a fear of how grace will change and improve them that keeps many souls away from God. They want God to take them as they are and let them stay that way. They want him to take away their love of riches, but not their riches – to purge them of the disgust of sin, but not a pleasure of sin."

February 1 – "In all other religions, one has to be good to come to God – in Christianity one does not. Christianity might be described as a "come as you are" party. It bids us stop worrying about ourselves, stop concentrating on our faults and our failings, and thrust them upon the Savior with a firm resolve to change."

January 26 – "Charity is to be measured, not by what one has given away, but by what one has left."

I was bullied a lot growing up. I won't go into the specific physical and emotional trauma, but let's just say that my childhood was incredibly rough. Every day I came home depressed, my mother shared her own difficult childhood stories of growing up and told me that, as terrible and wrong as it all was, I could see this as an opportunity to learn and grow. And she was right. Today, I feel like a more compassionate person because of the trials I faced growing up.

However, there was one aspect of my life I was unable to learn and grow from for a long time. I was unable to forgive all the people that hurt me. I allowed hatred and bitterness to control me in those moments, so much so that I could not see these bullies for what they really were: brothers and sisters in Christ who needed God's grace just as much as I did. How could I consider myself to be a more compassionate person when I refused to offer it to the very people in my life who needed it the most?

It does no good to hold onto grudges or refuse to forgive. The thing you hurt the most is your life in God's grace. So for any grudges you might have, contemplate on this: Jesus chose to live among us knowing that he would be denied, betrayed, scorned, beaten, and nailed on a cross to die by the people he loved, yet he unhesitatingly forgave us and opened the gates of heaven so that we might have eternal life through him. Let's live up to Christ's example and offer his compassion and grace to everyone we meet.


News from Stacey, Grades 1-5, Family Ministry, dre1to5fm@rescathroch.org.
