Weekly Words from The Rock

Your Questions Answered...Angels

Our Sunday Visitor provided an "In Focus" on angels in its September 29-October 5, 2019 edition (pages 9-12). There is a certain fascination about angels so let us see what we can learn.

Who are the seven archangels? From our review of angels last week, we noted that archangels are God's messengers. They are considered leading angels, as St. Michael led the battle against Satan. The seven are:

Michael, whose name means "who is like God?" is considered Prince of the Heavenly Hosts, making him a seraph and an archangel. He appears three times in the Book of Daniel and is the only one in the Bible referred to as an archangel (cf. Jude 1:9). He most famously plays a major role in Chapter 12 of the Book of Revelation, leading God's armies in the war in heaven against the Satanic rebellion.

Gabriel appears as a herald throughout the Bible, namely to Daniel, Zechariah and the Virgin Mary. Gabriel is the patron saint of messengers, those who work in radio and television, and postal workers.

Raphael first appears disguised as the human traveling companion of Tobit's son, Tobiah, and is generally associated with an unnamed angel mentioned in the Gospel of John, who stirs the water at the healing pool of Bethesda. He is considered the patron of travelers, the blind, medical workers, Christian marriage and Catholic studies.

The four remaining archangels are mentioned in other Jewish texts, and their names have been passed down through Tradition.

Uriel, whose name means "God is my light," is found in the ancient Jewish apocalyptic Book of Enoch. He is the angel of repentance. Up until the eighth century at the Council of Rome, Uriel was venerated in the canon as an archangel in the Roman Catholic Church, and Orthodox and Anglican tradition still follows

this practice. He is the patron saint of the arts and sciences.

Raguel, whose name means "friend of God," is considered the Angel of Justice. In the non-canonical Book of Second Enoch, he carried Enoch as a mortal to and from heaven. His role is to destroy evil spirits and cast fallen angels into hell.

Remiel is mentioned in the apocryphal Book of Second Baruch where he is responsible for divine visions and guides the souls of the faithful into heaven. The name Ramiel means "thunder of God."

Saraqael (or Sariel) is mentioned in the ancient Jewish apocalyptic Book of Enoch as one of the holy angels who look upon the bloodshed on Earth, along with Gabriel, Michael, Raphael and Uriel.

Next week, we will look at into the devotion of Saint Michael the Archangel.

I have been reading a book entitled The Wisdom of Fulton Sheen. The book shares a thread of Bishop Sheen's wisdom for each day of the year. In the weeks ahead, I would like to share some of his wisdom.

April 14 – "Let those souls who think their work has no value recognize that by fulfilling their insignificant tasks out of love of God, those tasks assume a supernatural worth. The aged who bear the taunts of the young, the sick crucified to their beds, the ignorant immigrant in steel mill, the street clearer and the garbage collector, the wardrobe mistress in the theater and the chorus girl who never had a line, the unemployed carpenter and the ash collector – all these will be enthroned above dictators, presidents, kings and cardinals if a greater love of God inspires their humbler tasks than inspire those who play nobler roles with less love."

April 28 – "No man hates God without first hating himself."

April 29 – "If you are really humble, if you realize how small you are and how much you need God, then you cannot fail."

April 30 - "I am often asked, "After Mother Teresa who?" That will be no trouble. God will find someone who is more humble, more obedient, more faithful, someone with a deeper faith, and He will do still greater things through her."


Parish News

Did you know that St. Thomas Aquinas composed some hymns?

One of them is called "Sacris solemniis." While I'm sure you don't know it by the title, you might know the last two stanzas that we still sing today, called "Panis Angelicus." My voice teacher laughed every time she heard it sung because she knew that hardly anyone listening understood the Latin text. But there was one thing I noticed that I think she missed. The congregation as a whole might not have known the literal translation, but they were able to feel Christ's presence through the beauty of the Latin text and the beauty poured out through the music. So in a way, they understood the meaning of the song perfectly.

Based on the music I pick at Mass, many of you might think that I don't like older, traditional hymns. In fact, I have a deep fondness for them. After all, they were the songs I grew up with and sang as a young cantor. But there's a reason I don't choose them often. It's because our English language has changed quite a lot since these hymns were written, so many people don't understand what they're singing.

My favorite example is the hymn "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy." I can't tell you how many people I've asked what they think that means and hear the response, "God is wide." That being said, I still choose them because just like "Panis Angelicus," we can feel Christ's presence pour out through them.

This week, I encourage you to pick one of your favorite hymns, Latin or English, and spend some time understanding the text. You might be surprised at how much theology is in there!


Faith Formation

Grades 1-5: No class on October 25th. Enjoy this extra day off from Faith Formation classes. We will come back to classes on Monday, November 1st, All Saints Day, at 6:00pm.

St. Simon and St. Jude, Apostles: On Thursday, October 28th, we celebrate two of the apostles that followed Jesus. In the Gospel of Luke, Simon is called "the Zealot," meaning he may have belonged to a radical anti-Roman group. Jude, the son of James, spoke with Jesus at the Last Supper. The two saints preached and were martyred together in Persia. These Apostles remind us to carry out the will of God with a sense of passion. Prayer: O God, we thank you for the glorious company of the apostles, and especially on this day for Simon and Jude; and we pray that, as they were faithful and zealous in their mission, so we may with ardent devotion, make known the love and mercy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.



Consecration to St. Joseph: After 33 days of prayer and meditation, our parish members will be making a consecration to St. Joseph next weekend. Consecration means that we acknowledge St. Joseph as our spiritual father, and we want to be like him.
