Weekly Words from The Rock

Tree of Jesse Our Sunday Visitor provided an "In Focus" on the Jesse Tree in its December 2-8, 2018 edition (pages 11-14). The Jesse Tree depicts the ancestry of Jesus Christ.

December 2 – Creation: No reflection on salvation history can begin without recognizing our origin from God. God made us is his own image, declaring us "very good." We know our calling is to dwell in his love, and yet we so often stray from him. Even then his love is unbounded, that he would send his only Son to bring us back to him. It is only then we can truly be "very good."

December 3 – Adam and Eve: Sin became part of the human condition through our first parents. Eating the apple was part disobedience and part wanting to be equal to God. While God made us to be like him, our incorporation into the divine life happens on his terms, not ours. Humanity's sinfulness results from skewed perspectives of creation, an inability to submit to the will of the One who made all things and to respect our proper role in the relationship we have with him. The result is God's plan of redemption, whereby he sends us his Son to show us the true way to be human.

December 4 – Noah: The story of Noah and his ark illustrates the corruptive and insidious nature of sin. Even the most personal of sins affect others, in ways we will often never recognize in this life. While God's action in this story offers an opportunity for a "new creation" through his covenant with Noah, we can rightfully understand this as foreshadowing the new life to be found in Christ, which requires us to leave sin behind and follow Christ's way.

December 5 – Abraham: All mankind has been created for a relationship with God. When God established his covenant with Abraham, he entered into a relationship with a people that will be particularly his own. This solidifies the relationship God has intended for his people from the beginning. Abraham's story reiterates that we must reject anything that keeps us from faithfulness to God. God learn through Abraham's ordeal that sacrifice is essential. When God asked Abraham to sacrifice his son Isaac – the one through whom all of the promises God made would come true – he was willing to give God everything. This foreshadowed the offering of God's Son in the new and everlasting covenant. **December 7** - Jacob: Jacob (or Israel) is a complex figure. He became the inheritor of God's covenant with Abraham despite having lied to achieve the birthright that made it possible. Nonetheless, God remained faithful in the context of Jacob's situation. God's love is indestructible.

December 8 – Tamar: Tamar's story represents how God's gifts can be misused, illustrating how God's love and generosity can even be exploited. Tamar was maligned after her first two husbands died, and she deceived their father, Judah, in order to secure a position of esteem in the line of Abraham. And she did, giving birth to twins and becoming one of only five women named in the genealogy of Jesus according to Matthew's Gospel. (To be continued next week.)

I have been reading a book entitled The Wisdom of Fulton Sheen. In the weeks ahead, I would like to share some of his wisdom.

August 21 – "Moral principles do not depend on a majority vote. Wrong is wrong, even if everybody is wrong. Right is right, even if nobody is right." August 24 – "Why did Our Blessed Lord use bread and wine as the elements of this Memorial? First of all, because no two substances in nature better symbolize unity than bread and wine. As bread is made from a multiplicity of grains of wheat, and wine is made from a multiplicity of grapes, so the many who believe are one in Christ. Second, no two substances in nature have to suffer more to become what they are than bread and wine. Wheat has to pass through the rigors of winter, be ground beneath the Calvary of a mill, and then subjected to purging fire before it can become bread. Grapes in their turn must be subjected to the Gethsemane of a wine press and have their life crushed from them to become wine. Thus, do they symbolize the Passion and Sufferings of Christ, and the condition of Salvation, for Our Lord said unless we die to ourselves we cannot live with him."

August 31 – "It was the "good" thief's last prayer, perhaps even his first. He knocked once, sought once, asked once, dared everything, and found everything."

A man knocked on a friend's door one day, and it was answered by the youngest boy. "Hello, chap," said the man, "Is your father home?" "No," answered the boy, "He's busy." "Well, then, could I speak to your mother?" the man continued. "No," came the reply, "She's busy." "Your older siblings, then, are they free?" the man tried again. "No," the boy said, "they're busy." The man, now curious, asked, "What are they busy doing?" The boy responded, "They're busy looking for me."

I can't help but compare this story to our own search for Jesus Christ. I find that even though I pray the same amount of time when I'm busy, my thoughts stray quite easily. Often I'll recite the first line of a Hail Mary and stop because my brain remembers everything I have to do later on that day. The harder I try to get through the prayer, the more hidden Christ feels from me.

Times of stress are the most difficult yet most important moments to seek Christ, for in him we can find peace in all the craziness and the strength to act with compassion.

Allow me to offer an idea as you look for Christ amidst your stress. Block off an entire evening on your calendar to spend with God. Fast like we do during Lent and pray in a space void of all distractions, including technology, day-to-day life, and interactions with others. Families, consider using part of the night as individual prayer and part for discussion and communal prayer. By removing time constraints, I pray that this evening helps you foster a relationship with Christ and allows you to find him more readily in the business of your daily life.
