Weekly Words from The Rock

Tree of Jesse. Our Sunday Visitor provided an "In Focus"

on the Jesse Tree in its December 2-8, 2018 edition (pages 11-14). The Jesse Tree depicts the ancestry of Jesus Christ. Through the eyes of Our Sunday Visitor in the weeks ahead we will look at the events and people who shaped the coming of Jesus Christ. December 9 – Joseph: The favor showed to Joseph by his father, Jacob, mirrors the favor God showed to his own Son. But this favor included rejection and suffering. As members of Christ's body through our baptism, we should see ourselves no different than him and Joseph. But we also know that God's love triumphs through their suffering and results in exaltation.

December 10 – Moses: Because of their sins, God's chosen people ended up in Egyptian slavery. But God didn't abandon them. Moses, despite his weaknesses, was chosen by God to lead his people from their bondage. God led them from slavery to freedom, yet they resisted, grumbled and even turned away from him – all an abuse of their freedom. So that his people would no longer be enslaved by sin, he gather them the Law as a means to true freedom.

December 11– Joshua: Faithfulness to God was seen in Joshua's repeated success and conquests on the battlefield on behalf of God's people. He led God's people into Canaan, which God had promised them. Jesus' ancestors gave God thanks for this victory and offered to him their loot as a sacrifice. Jesus descends from these as the one who makes the true and final sacrifice.

December 12– Rahab: The story of Rahab, the second woman mentioned in Matthew's genealogy of Jesus, identifies how God's purposes are at work even outside the community of believers. Rahab betrayed her own people and aided the Israelites to achieve God's will. For this she was remembered as an example of great faith. Her family was incorporated into the Jewish people, a sign that God's truth and his plans are open to all people.

December 13 – Ruth: God instilled in his people an intense respect for familial relationships, which is at the heart of the story of Ruth. She chose to work to

support her mother-in-law, who lost her husband and sons to death. Ruth offered her life for Naomi, and in return she fell in love with Boaz, whose heart she won by her kindness. They married and together became ancestors of their long-awaited Messiah, the Lord Jesus. December 14 – Samuel: To help his people gain freedom from the Philistines, God instructed the wise and holy prophet Samuel to help establish the monarchy. This arose from the need for unity among God's people. Samuel first anointed Saul to be king, but his weakness prohibited any effective leadership. Rather than be captured, he ended his own life. God's people remained further divided until the kingdom unified again under David.

December 15 – David: Jesus is tied to David's lineage, which is crucial to be acknowledged as Messiah. David brought unity to God's people, establishing a capital and announcing his plans to build a temple for God and dwell among his people. God's favor for David earned him the title of God's son. Despite David's moral failures, God remained true to their covenant, but David was deprived from building the temple. And yet, God's son descends from his line.

December 16 – Bathsheba: King David's great moral failing was the extramarital affair with Bathsheba and the murder he arranged of her husband so to acquire her as his own. When her son Solomon became king and built the temple in Jerusalem, Bathsheba was an advocate for the people with her son. She is the fourth woman mentioned in Jesus' genealogy, and in some ways prefigures the intercessory role of Mary with her divine Son. We will pick it up next time with Dec. 17.

The Wisdom of Fulton Sheen. The book shares a thread of Bishop Sheen's wisdom for each day of the year. September 1 – "Since the basic cause of man's anxiety is the possibility of being either a saint or a sinner, it follows that there are only two alternatives for him. Man can either mount upward to the peak of eternity or else slip backwards to the chasms of despair and frustration. Yet there are many who think there is yet another alternative, namely, that of indifference. They think that, just as bears hibernate for a season in a state of suspended animation, so they, too, can sleep through life without choosing to live for God or against Him. But hibernation is no escape; winter ends, and one is then forced to make a decision – indeed, the very choice of indifference is itself a decision. White fences do not remain white fences by having nothing done to them; they soon become black fences." Till next week! Father Peter Schuster

At every Mass, we hear these words: "Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever." There are some very important prepositions here. The prayer is addressed to God the Father, through God the Son, and in the Holy Spirit. To explain, read these words by Father Jeremy Driscoll from What Happens at Mass:

"Yet what we are dealing with here is the form, the dynamic, the very shape of God's saving activity on our behalf; namely, that God the Father gives Himself to the world by giving His Son...This direction of movement in the liturgy reveals that the Father gives His Son in and by the Holy Spirit who is the Spirit of the Father. The Father gives His Spirit an assignment, as it were; namely, to effect and illumine and clarity and arrange everything in such a way that the Son be known and that all who believe in him might live their lives entirely from the Son's life. It is...concretely and specifically that the Father gives Himself to the world in the giving of His Son, a Son at every moment accompanied by the action and work of the Holy Spirit."

While this only scrapes the surface to explain the Trinity, it does show us the importance of every single element and word of the Mass. There is so much incredible theology behind everything we say and do. So this week, consider picking a part of the Mass and researching the underlying theology.

The more we understand the Mass, the more we can embrace the love from God the Father in the Holy Spirit through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ.


Faith Formation

Grades 1-5: We have Faith Formation class for grades 1-5 at 6:00-7:00pm on Monday, December 13th (St. Lucy Day). What do you know about St. Lucy? What is she the patron saint of and why? Where was St. Lucy born? She is often portrayed with a wreath with candles on her head, do you know why?

The Third Sunday of Advent: Today is the day we light the pink candle on our Advent Advent wreath and the priest wears the rose colored vestments. It is Gaudete Sunday and the readings reflect the JOY we anticipate in the arrival of Baby Jesus. The first reading tells us to "Shout for joy...Sing joyfully." The responsorial psalm is "Cry out with joy and gladness, for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel." The second reading emphasizes: "Rejoice in the Lord always, I shall say it again: rejoice!" It is the time to rejoice in the warmth and joy of family. We invite each member of our parish family to pause each day this week to share something that brought them joy and to thank God for it.
